

CLIMATE CHANGE: WHAT CAN WE DO?

Hallam Diocesan Justice and Peace Conference Saturday, 8 November at the Hallam Pastoral Centre

The day will begin with registration at 9am in time for the opening at 9.30am. The first session will be conducted by Fr Augusto, a young theologian from Venezuela working for CAFOD, who will draw from Genesis on how ecology begins with relationships; how we are with each other. He will awaken our spirituality to the urgency of climate change, so that we are motivated to do something about it.

Following a break at 10.45am, three speakers - Michael Bayley, Nick Nuttgens and a CAFOD staff member - will present practical ideas and resources from Hope for the Future, Carbon Conversations and CAFOD's Live Simply.

The final session will be devoted to group work. At 11.45am Angela Powell, CAFOD Hallam Manager, will lead into "regroup" to talk with each other about ways and means of implementing good practice in parishes, networks, etc.

The conference will finish by 12.30pm. There will be a Traidcraft stall. The Diocesan Justice and Peace Commission envisage an ongoing collaboration with Ecology groups and organisations.

New Bishop opens Neighbourhood Centre

On Tuesday, 30 September, Bishop Ralph Heskett CSsR, officially opened and blessed the new Neighbourhood Centre at Cantley, Doncaster. The Neighbourhood Centre is an enterprise which has resulted from the efforts and prayers of parishioners of St Paul's Roman Catholic Church on nearby Goodison Boulevard.

It is based at St Wilfrid's Court, close to Cantley Library on Goodison Boulevard, Cantley, Doncaster. It provides a much-needed facility for people living in Cantley, Bessacarr and neighbouring districts. It is managed and run by trained and supervised volunteers from nearby St Paul's Roman Catholic Church. It opens between 10am and 2pm on five days each week, Tuesdays to Saturdays, and offers services to help local people to cope with the challenges faced by so many in the current climate of financial constraints and social need.

Bishop Ralph was welcomed to the Neighbourhood Centre by Fr Bernard O'Brien, Parish Priest at St Paul's. Also present were Deacons Bill Taylor and Chris Kime from St Paul's Parish and a number of clergy from other local Churches. The opening was also attended by local Member of Parliament, Rt Hon Rosie Winterton MP and by the Civic Mayor of Doncaster, Councillor Pat Haith, who both made speeches of appreciation to the Parish and to all the volunteers. Local Councillors were in attendance as were a good number of parishioners and friends of the Neighbourhood Centre.

A number of the volunteers who help to run the Neighbourhood Centre were also present – including some who are not parishioners but are still willing to give their time to help. Several of the skilled tradesmen who had given of their time and energy to help to repair and decorate the premises to make them suitable for purpose had also accepted invitations to the opening, and were thanked for their contribution by Fr O'Brien.

The Bishop conducted a short service of blessing at the Neighbourhood Centre to mark its official opening, sprinkling Holy Water liberally around the Centre, and seemingly taking some pleasure in splashing the attendant crowd, including distinguished guests! The opening ceremony was followed by refreshments prepared by members of the Parish Ladies' Group, in nearby St Paul's Parish Hall. Bishop Ralph had a chance to meet parishioners, volunteers and friends of St Paul's Church over a cup of tea and delicious cakes.

The Neighbourhood Centre has been in operation since June, 2014 and is proving popular with local people who are very happy to have a place where they can come for a friendly chat and some companionship over a cup of tea, with the opportunity to buy clothing and other household items at very affordable prices.

Several individuals have availed themselves of the opportunity to seek informed, confidential advice from the Citizens Advice Bureau trained staff who attend the Neighbourhood Centre each week. 'Wellbeing' staff are also available to provide information and advice on health matters and members of the Council Neighbourhood Team also attend the Centre weekly to meet with clients. It is anticipated that in the future there will be other services available at the Neighbourhood Centre, including advice for those seeking employment on how to fill in application forms and how best to prepare for

job interviews.

Parish Priest, Fr Bernard O'Brien said, "We are honoured that Bishop Ralph is taking time out of his busy schedule to come and preside over the official opening of the Neighbourhood Centre. This is a much needed facility for anyone who needs help or advice or even someone who just wants a cup of tea and a bit of companionship. People have the chance to buy good quality, affordable clothes and anyone with serious financial or other worries can discuss problems with Citizen Advice Bureau volunteers. People can also receive health and lifestyle advice from the Wellbeing members, or bring issues to the attention of the Council Neighbourhood Team who attend the Centre each week.'


Thanks must go to the schools that



ST ANNE'S RESIDENTIAL HOME IN BURGHWALLIS HALL

September 2014 saw the closure of St Anne's Residential Home, in Burghwallis Hall, near Doncaster. It has been a Catholic Home for the elderly and infirm since 1946. Over the years the ownership has passed from the Sisters of Charity of Our Lady of Good and Perpetual Succour, to the Dominican Sisters of Oakford, until in 1998 it was acquired by the Diocese of Hallam. After many years of striving to keep the St Anne's Home open, in January, 2014 the sad decision to close had to be taken because of long term financial deficits. Once the decision had been taken there then followed months of work ensuring that no resident was under pressure to leave the Home and much effort was given to facilitating a move that was sensitive to the needs of each remaining person. When this work was complete St Anne's Rest Home was officially closed.

History tells us that for centuries the Hall has been the home of the Anne family, who remained loyal to the Catholic faith during the Reformation

and ensuing penal times.

As a plaque in the Chapel shows: "Blessed John Anne, priest, martyr, was hanged drawn and quartered in York on March 16, 1589, for the faith".

Briefly, John Anne, from Burghwallis Hall, alias John Amias, ordained priest in Rheims in 1581, returned and worked among persecuted Catholics of Elizabethan England for several years, before being captured.

Other names on the plaque:

"George Anne, SJ, was imprisoned and died in York Castle in 1660, for the faith.

Richard Fenton, of Burghwallis Hall, was imprisoned and died in York Castle in 1600, for the faith.

Elizabeth Anne, Benedictine Nun, daughter of Marmaduke Anne of Burghwallis, died in a French Prison in 1791, for the faith".

Research shows other names, connected with Burghwallis, also suffered. The ancient building, Grade 2* listed, built in the fourteenth century has been added to from time to time. It contains the remains of an old chapel, disused for many years, and a priest's hiding hole, which was secretly accessible from the chapel, which was only discovered by Catherine Anne in 1908. In 1910, a book, "Forgotten Shrines", was compiled by a Benedictine, Dom Bede Camm, whose life was dedicated to the English Catholic Martyrs of the Reformation and their lost world. His

book, based on sound research and "onsite" visits, includes a chapter on Burghwallis Hall. It is over one hundred years since he visited and recorded what Mrs Anne told him, "The Hall has been the property of the Annes for more than 400 years and has had a Catholic Mission attached to it ever since the venerable parish church was taken out of the rightful owners' possession in the sixteenth century."

In 1987 a beautiful new chapel was built. Today it is used by a small group who hold a "Blessed John Anne Prayer meeting" on the evening of the first Wednesday of each month, praying for the canonisation of Blessed John Anne, vocations to the priesthood, renewal of faith in our country and the persecuted Church in the world.

Also, while a few residents remained, a Eucharistic service was held on Tuesday afternoons.

Grant for St Marie's

Rare alabaster sculptures, the historic Lewis organ and beautiful Victorian



ceramic tilework in St Marie's Cathedral will be restored thanks to a grant of almost £500,000 from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The alabaster panels date from the 15th century and are among a few in the country that survived the English Reformation.

Known as Nottingham Alabasters because Nottingham was a centre for alabaster carving in medieval days, the alabasters were presented to the Cathedral shortly before it opened in 1850, after being discovered buried in the neighbourhood of Exeter Cathedral.

The seven panels, depicting The Annunciation, Adoration of the Kings, Betrayal, Flagellation and Crucifixion of Christ, The Assumption and Coronation of the Virgin were believed to have originally stood around the altar of the Cathedral's Mortuary Chapel.

The panels were removed in the 1970s and put up for sale by order of the Bishop of Leeds to fund an earlier restoration of the Cathedral. However, no buyer came forward and the historic Alabasters laid forgotten in a cupboard until being rediscovered prior to the latest restoration.

After restoration they will go on display in the Cathedral.

The Lewis organ dates from 1875 and is the largest, unaltered instrument manufactured by Lewis and Company remaining in the UK.

Lewis and Company was an internationally important firm of organ builders, founded by Thomas Christopher Lewis, one of the leading British organ builders of the second half of the nineteenth century.

Its organs are highly prized, quite scarce, and have greatly influenced succeeding generations of organ craftsmen.

The beautiful ceramic tiles show pictorial scenes and are inscribed with the names of Sheffield parishioners and the clergy who served in the church.

Cathedral Dean, Fr Christopher Posluszny, said, "The whole community of St Marie's is absolutely delighted with the grant, which will allow us to share with the people of Sheffield and further afield wonderful stories and objects that have been hidden until now."

Hallam Diocesan Assembly Spirituality Series 2014 DOMINICAN SPIRITUALITY

On the morning of Saturday, 27 October people from across the Diocese gathered with Bishop Ralph at Blessed Trinity, Wickersley to hear the Most Reverend Malcolm McMahon OP, Archbishop of Liverpool, give a meaningful and entertaining talk about the spirituality of the Dominican Order, of which he is a member.

Archbishop Malcolm said that spirituality is a very broad subject and it is wonderful that the Church has so many religious orders, each with their own approach to spirituality. This diversity is to be welcomed because it allows us a choice of spirituality practice but we must also remember that all spirituality is founded in St Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, in which he says that our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. Whatever spirituality we adopt, its purpose must be to take the ember that the Holy Spirit has planted in each of us and fan it into a flame of faith, love and trust in God the Father

and Jesus. St Dominic

Founder of the Dominican Order Archbishop Malcolm then talked about St Dominic who was born in 1170 in Spain. He was the son of minor gentry and went to the Cathedral School in Palencia where he was taught by the Canons of the Cathedral. Later he joined the Canons and followed the simple rule of St Augustine. He went north to France to work with the Cathars, who had given up the practice of religion. The Cathars saw everything in very simple terms, in particular they regarded flesh as evil and the spirit as good. In 1206 Dominic and a colleague offered their services to Pope Innocent III with the specific purpose of saving souls and the offer was accepted. From then on Dominic did all his work on foot and roamed villages in France and Spain. He had nothing of his own and begged for food. Other men were drawn to him and the embryonic Dominican Order was formed. Eventually, Dominic and his small community moved to Toulouse in France and formally established the Order on 22 December, 1216. Dominic's approach differed from most religious orders of that time. These lived in monasteries and people came to them but Dominic interpreted Matthew's Gospel as indicating a need for an order that had vitality and went out into the world rather than calling people in.

În 1217 Dominic followed the example of Jesus and sent his friars out in pairs to preach the Gospel. This practice is still followed by Dominicans who even

business connected with the Order. Dominic continued to travel between Rome and Spain increasing his Order as he did so. In 1220 Dominican brothers gathered at Bologna to approve the Order's constitution and laws and the operation of colleges run by the Order. Dominican friars first came to England in 1221 and established themselves in

Dominic died on 6 August, 1221 and was canonised in 1234.

The Four Pillars of

Dominican Spirituality

Archbishop Malcolm said that since the days of St Dominic, the Order has been founded on four pillars which make a significant contribution to Dominican Spirituality. These are:

- Prayer
- Community or common living
 - Study
- Preaching

Prayer

This is at the centre of the lives of members of the Dominican order which comprises both male and female communities. Friars and sisters celebrate the Word by meeting as a community at least three times a day and reading and/or singing the Office of the Church. Even when the Order was formed St Dominic was particularly keen that each friar should have his own cell rather than sleeping in a dormitory. He saw the privacy of the cell as essential not just for sleeping, but also for private prayer and study.

Community or Common Living Dominicans take a vow of poverty which means they undertake to live a simple life shared with the other members of their community and free from the need to possess things so that everything is held in common. This is an attempt to imitate the apostolic poverty of Jesus. Archbishop Malcolm said that to live like this is a challenge but it is important because it changes you as a person in that it redirects your values and allows you to witness to the unlimited love and grace of God. The vow of obedience puts Dominicans at the service of the Church. Study

When the order was formed in the 13th Century most clergy were uneducated, consequently their ability to preach the gospel was limited. St Dominic sent his friars to the great universities of his time so that they could study, preach and eventually establish places of learning. This emphasis on study continues to this day with the primary object being study of the Word' which comes to us through Holy Scripture and Tradition. Creation reflects the light of the Gospel and is ac-



cessible to us through the intellectual development of our minds and reason.

Preaching

Dominicans do not study for their own benefit but so that, when they preach the Gospel, they can draw on the knowledge they have acquired and be all the more effective. In this way they play a part in the salvation of others by teaching the truth that saves. Preaching is at the heart of Dominican life and every Dominican answers a call to be a preacher, hence the initials OP (Order of Preachers) which they put after their names. Their preaching can be the conventional homily at Mass but also, it can be through the writing of religious books and articles, teaching and good works.

The aim is always to bring the word of God to those who are suffering or deprived.

Dominican Saints

Archbishop Malcolm then talked about the many members of the Dominican order who have been beatified and canonized, stretching from the Order's earliest days up to the 20th Century. Many were unfamiliar but some, such as St Catherine of Sienna and St Martin De Porres, are household names for

The Nine Ways of Prayer

Finally Archbishop Malcolm talked about St Dominic's teaching that because our body is the temple of the Holy Spirit we should use it in prayer. Dominic taught nine ways of prayer which include bowing humbly before the altar of Christ, prostrating oneself, repeatedly standing and kneeling, holding arms stretched out forwards or sideways in imitation of Jesus on the

cross, upright stretching the whole body up to-Heaven, wards and/or walking alone whilst reflecting on Scripture orthe Gospel. Archbishop Malcolm said that whilst lay people may not wish to follow these practices in full, they should at least consider trying aspects of them as a recognition that


