On page 3 read about some of the activities the St Wilfrid's community have been engaged in and enjoying as they live out their mission statement on a daily basis.







### Holy Trinity Pupils' Message of Hope to Ebola Medics

Pupils from Holy Trinity School gave army medics a ect, alongside art teacher, Louise Seagrave. welcome Christmas surprise when they sent cards and gifts to cheer members of the Ministry of Defence Medical Unit as they worked to help victims of the deadly Ebola virus.

The crisis caused by Ebola has led to the Ministry of

Defence Medical Unit being deployed to Sierra Leone in order to care for health workers who have caught the disease. Holy Trinity pupils came up with the idea of making sure that soldiers serving with the unit – who were away from their families for three months – had something to open on Christmas Day, after leading a school assembly about 'hope'.

Holy Trinity teacher, Chela Wilson, whose brotherin-law is a medic in the army, coordinated the projChela explained how the idea had come about, after the pupils had seen the Sainsbury's advert about the First World War soldiers at Christmas. "The kids were really quite moved by the theme of the Sainsbury's advert and soldiers being away from home in

tough places, so we decided to make and write cards for the soldiers in our British Forces who are away from their families at Christmas. Our aim was to give them some 'Hope'. The parcels contained useful items for the soldiers, such as toiletries, which they often run out of and cannot replace as there are no

shops nearby." The soldiers were overwhelmed by the packages and Chela was delighted to receive a phone call, asking

for their thanks to be passed on, followed by an email and photograph from one of the soldiers who had received a parcel. Now back in the UK, Private Emma Caton told of how well the gifts had been received. She said, "The parcels absolutely lifted the spirits of everyone that received a surprise parcel from the children. Especially on Christmas Day, as not everyone had something sent out to open from their families. It was really heart-warming that the children had put time and effort to put them together to make us smile on Christmas Day. I'd like to say a massive thank you.

The pupils at Holy Trinitywere delighted with the response – their comments are printed around the

them." "Christmas is an expectant time of waiting to celebrate Jesus's birth. The soldiers spent their Christmas in Sierra Leone fighting Ebola. It was lovely to make the soldiers feel loved and feel the Christmas warmth and love they would have experienced from their family. It was an unexpected surprise when we received a reply from the soldiers, especially as they are so busy and our efforts have been appreciated.



"I am happy that I brought a smile to someone's face at Christmas. I feel like a ray of sunshine has shone on my life and hopefully others too."



"As a form, we thought of what we could do to bring hope to soldiers in Sierra Leone. We thought Christmas cards, containing poems and hopeful wishes, would tell them how much we appreciated their help. We were glad they were overjoyed!'



This book continues from Part One of this history of Catholicism in and around Sheffield which covered from 1549 until 1850. The new publication tells the story of the Catholic life in Sheffield from the opening of St Marie's in 1850 until 1920. So this 65 page history, with lots of old sketches and photographs, covers the

Victorian times and the growth in Catholic life and involvement in the emerging city. Impor-tantly, in these centenary years, this book provides, for the first time, information about each of the parishioners killed in World War One and listed on the memorial within St Marie's. Deacon Bill Burleigh, the author, explained that he has deliberately gone beyond a history of buildings and priests and tried to capture the conditions of parishioners, the contribution to Sheffield life of lay people living

#### American Author Addresses Gathering at St Vincent's, Sheffield

Nearly 50 people crowded into a room at St Vincent's Church, Crookes, recently to hear the well-known writer and speaker from the USA, Anastasia Northrop, speak about practical ways to live St John Paul II's teaching on the Theology of the Body.

Anastasia Northrop spoke on the topic 'Living Life as a Gift – what God's plan means for you' and afterwards answered questions from the audience on topics as diverse as the beauty of marriage, the Church's teaching on homosexuality and the universal call to chastity and holiness.

Miss Northrop is the founder of the Theology of the Body International Alliance. She is an expert on St John Paul II's teaching about the human person, including its implications for single people. She is also the founder and Director of the National Catholic Singles Conference in the USA.

Kathleen Baster, who coordinates a Theology of the Body study group at St Vincent's and has helped to run a number of short courses on the topic in the diocese, said, "We were thrilled that Anastasia could take time out of her busy schedule to visit us in Sheffield and explain how St John Paul II's teaching calls us to make a gift of ourselves in order to live life to the fullest. It was great that so many people could attend her talk, both those who are familiar with the teaching and those coming across it for the first time. What impressed all of us, I think, is how the Theology of the Body is not a dry theory but is meant to be lived and casts all of the Church's teachings in the area of sexuality in a wholly positive light.'

#### Society of St Gregory Summer School



The Society of St Gregory was founded in 1929 to encourage people's participation in the liturgy – at that time by means of congregational singing of plainsong. It has never lost touch with original purpose, though the means of doing so was dramatically changed by the Vatican Council.In the renewed liturgy after the Second Vatican Council, the Word of God has a special place. The selection of readings at Mass was greatly expanded so the treasures of the Bible were opened up. The revised Lectionary has become a shared gift across the denominations. Scripture has not only been the source of words we proclaim but also those we sing and pray.

Over the last couple of years, the Summer School has reflected on the 50th anniversary of the Second Vatican Council and how it deepened our appreciation of liturgy, not only in the Constitution on the Liturgy, but in the other documents as well. The Consti-

tution on Divine Revelation, *Dei Verbum*, expressed the Church's understanding of the place of scriptures in the life and faith of the Church.

the life and faith of the Church. This year's Summer School entitled "The Word that is Life" will be held at High Leigh Conference Centre, Hoddesdon, Hertfordshire from 27-31 July. The meeting will continue to explore the riches of the Second Vatican Council, concentrating on *Dei Verbum*, the Dogmatic Constitution on Revelation, promulgated 50 years ago this year. For the last two years, the Society has funded a number of free Summer

funded a number of free Summer School places for younger people involved in liturgical ministry. The scheme has been very successful, not least in terms of the calibre of people it attracted. This year, a further 15 free places for young people aged between 18 and 35 are being funded by the Society.




