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FR PAT MURPHY RIP

Patrick Raymond Murphy was born on 21 June, 1929. He studied at the English College, Lisbon and was ordained there on 8 June, 1963. Throughout the sixties and the early seventies he was a curate in a number of parishes including Grimsby, Hackenthorpe, Ilkeston and Oakham. In 1976 he was appointed Parish Priest at St Hugh of Lincoln, Newbold in Chesterfield. He moved to become Parish Priest at St Paul's, Cantley in 1983, from where he retired in 2004. He died on 25 June, 2015 and his funeral Mass was celebrated on Monday, 13 July where Fr Bernard O'Brien, a longstanding friend of Fr Pat's from their days in the seminary, gave the homily.

Thank you all so much for being here. It is wonderful that we should fill this church for our celebration. Fr Pat asked for a joyful celebration, and we have already begun it.

Fr Pat died at 10.30 on June 25th. Judi was with him, at his side as she had been for the whole month of his stay in the Doncaster Royal Infirmary. When I arrived, there was no more to be done but say that beautiful prayer of commendation. "Go forth, Christian soul, from this world, in the name of God the Father, who created you; in the name of Jesus Christ who suffered for you; in the name of the Holy Spirit who was poured out upon you, go forth, faithful Christian. May you live in peace this day. May your home be with God." I always find that such a touching and comforting prayer. A faithful life on this earth over, and a new one beginning. Fr Pat looked as though he had fallen asleep. He was eighty six, and fifty two years a priest. I first met Pat travelling out to Lisbon, to begin a six year course of studies for the priesthood in the English College. We sailed out of Liverpool on the S.S. Hildebrand, bound ultimately for the West Indies, with a mixture of cargo and passengers, including in special cages on deck, a pig and a horse. They got off at Porto, in Northern Portugal. and we went on to Lisbon. Except that

we never reached there. Coming round the headland into the Tagus estuary, we hit a bank of fog, and steered straight onto the rocks. Shipwrecked, and saved by a small flotilla of fishing boats. We lost everything except the clothes we stood up in.

In college, I sat next to Pat in the dining room, the class room and the chapel, for six years. We learned a lot about each other. He was what we called then 'a late vocation', and had been in the army (and even boxed for the army), and seemed to have had a large number of nights out on the town. He found the studies difficult, mostly because all the text books were in Latin, which he never mastered. That's when I discovered one of his great characteristics – tenacity. He never, ever gave up trying, whether it was with studies or on the football pitch. We both got through, thank God, and in 1963 prostrated before the altar in the College chapel, and were ordained priest.

Little did we realise what lay ahead. If any of you read the Catholic weekly, The Tablet, you may have come across a review of a recent book, which said, "A priest is a contradictory thing. Set apart, but radically available; the servant of his parishioners, and the subordinate of his Bishop; he upholds the teaching of the Church, whilst caring for the people whose lives are often at variance with the proclaimed ideal. He is at once familiar, and alien; a pillar of the local community, a part of the global Church, yet the bearer of a subversive message. A public man, he carries within himself a world of private feeling and experience to which those outside the priesthood are rarely party." Those words express, I think, the tensions of priesthood that Pat, and many of that generation, faced. Trained pre-Vatican Council, we were to face the changes and turmoil of the new way of being Church, when the windows were opened, and the winds of the Spirit blew.

A priest is a contradictory thing. Set apart, yet radically available. Pat believed in his priesthood, believed he was called to be 'alter Christus', another Christ. Anointed, like Isaiah, to be and bring Good News. He knew too, that it could only be done through being deeply united with Christ, in love and service. As St Paul said, in our second reading, "Nothing can sep-arate us from the love of God, made visible in Christ Jesus our Lord." If that is there, "We shall triumph over our trials by the power of him who loved us". As a priest, Pat tried principally to follow the path of Christ in his love of the poor and marginalised. In his twenty one years as Parish Priest here, he left that example. He had a wonderful gift with people, remembering names and dates of birth; a joyfulness; he did his hospital visits, often bringing in the day's newspapers; he loved the 'kidiwinks', as he called them. He knew how to be playful with



them, and they loved him; he accepted all sorts of people with their complicated situations. He loved it when the Neighbourhood Centre opened, and was so proud of you all for doing it.

Lest you think I am canonising Fr Pat, I am not! He could bark, too. And I am fairly sure he must have meditated on that incident in the Gospel, when they said to Jesus, "Master, we know you are a man who speaks the truth, and that a man's rank means nothing to vou". Well. Pat never minded what rank anyone had, from the Vatican downwards. There was certainly one Bishop who was very glad when Pat became part of Hallam Diocese, and left his! At meetings he would chunter, 'who does the Dean think he is?' or even higher, 'the Bishop is the Bishop, but he is not right on every occasion!' He often used to pronounce 'I am Pope in my own parish.' He was truly a company man with attitude!

Going back to his dying, and those prayers for a departing soul, I often think that that's the moment Jesus comes back for us, as he promised he would. "When I have prepared you a place, I shall return to take you with me, so that where I am, you shall be too." I also believe that when a priest

dies, it's very like his final Mass. For years at the altar, Fr Pat joined him-self to Jesus, and said, "This is my body, this is my blood, given up for you". A priest tries to conform himself to Christ, and when he dies, he dies like Christ, having offered his life to the Father over the years. Now is the last, the final moment of his giving. "It is accomplished". It is the end. The task entrusted to him by God is completed. His death is the moment of his greatest triumph.

At College, it was the custom to stay on after your ordination to say Mass for all your fellow students and staff. And at the end of Mass everyone would sing the Te Deum for you, that great hvmn of the Church of praise and thanksgiving and triumph. For us it was an emotional moment of farewell, before returning to England. There's an English translation of that hymn which we are going to sing (and I want you to sing it with gusto) as we carry Fr Pat's body from our church, and see him on his way to his new land, his new risen life: to a great meeting with all his departed family and friends in the Communion of Saints; where one day we shall all be, in happiness with the Lord. Amen

Recently nine Religious Sisters and three Religious order Priests attended an afternoon tea information session at the Pastoral Centre. The Hallam Safeguarding Commission is delighted to be formally aligned with four Religious Orders, including the closed order at Kirk Edge, (Carmelite Sisters: Monastery of the Holy Spirit). Although members of that order were not able to be present, their prayers and commitment to safeguarding are keenly felt.

Bishop Ralph was unavoidably delayed in Birmingham, but Sr Clare Smith and Lisa Markham hosted a lively and informative session, in which joys were shared as well as serious matters considered.

The event was opened with a variation on the beautiful Franciscan prayer which exhorts us all to think about what we can do to change the world.

May God bless us with discomfort at easy answers, half truths and superficial relationships, so that we will live deep within our hearts. May God bless us with anger at injustice, oppression and exploitation of people so that we will work for justice, equality and peace.

May God bless us with tears to shed for those who suffer from pain, rejection, starvation and war so that we will reach out our hand to comfort them and change their pain to joy.

And may God bless us with the foolishness to think we can make a difference to our world, so that we will do the things that others tell us cannot be done.

Amen

"It is with great affection and gratitude that I sign off now as headteacher and hand over the reins to Mrs Faley and Mrs Kelly from St Thomas More for an interim period until governors

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LOURDES 2015

Each year a group of pilgrims from our Diocese visit Lourdes. A nurse, Cath Jones, and a member of this year's group, John Rigby, and one of the organisers, Alex Prior, share their experiences of Lourdes 2015.

Bishop Ralph was joined by around 450 other pilgrims when he led the Hallam Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes for the first time from Sunday, 28 June to Friday, 3 July. Throughout the week, pilgrims sheltered from the 35-40 degree heat by relaxing in the hotels and cafés, getting to know other pilgrims and youth helpers. The unexpectedly hot weather didn't deter pilgrims from all corners of the Diocese from following the spiritual programme each day.

gramme each day. The majority of adult pilgrims flew on the specially chartered plane from Doncaster Airport at 8am Sunday morning. After the opportunity to settle into our hotels, the pilgrimage started with our Opening Mass. This included a sign of the act of service, when doctors, nurses, helpers, musicians, youth leaders and youth - all of whom volunteered to give their time and skills to help others on the pilgrimage - came forward to have their hands blessed.

Over 200 young people from high schools around the Diocese joined the pilgrimage and accompanied those pilgrims using wheelchairs. When asked, many pilgrims noted the involvement and example of these youth helpers as one of the highlights of their pilgrimage. Indeed, Bishop Ralph was congratulated all week by pilgrims from other countries on the interaction, attitude and behaviour of the young people from our Diocese.

Another highlight for many pilgrims was the Mass at the Grotto on Monday morning. This was celebrated by Bishop Ralph, with the 10 priests travelling on the pilgrimage concelebrating, at the spot where Our Lady appeared to St Bernadette over 150 years ago. During this Mass one of our young pilgrims, 8-year-old Job McGuire, made his First Holy Communion. Later that day there was the opportunity for the Sacrament of Reconciliation at our Penitential Service. On Tuesday morning we had our Mass with Anointing of the Sick. For many pilgrims this prayer of healing is a profoundly emotional moment, when pilgrims receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick surrounded by the young helpers accompanying them during the pilgrimage.

We joined large numbers from many other countries on Wednesday morning for the International Mass in the enormous St Pius X Underground Basilica. Bishop Ralph was one of 8 Bishops, and over 100 priests concelebrating the Mass, reflecting on the theme "Lourdes – The Joy of Mission". With thousands present at this Mass, it was overwhelming to see the sea of yellow t-shirts representing our youth helpers, and seeing some of them bring up the gifts in the procession was particularly poignant.

ticularly poignant. Each day in Lourdes there was the opportunity to join the Blessed Sacrament Procession and Torchlight procession. As a Diocese, we joined together in the Torchlight Procession on Monday evening before again gathering on Wednesday afternoon in the Underground Basilica as Bishop Ralph presided at the Blessed Sacrament procession. In a very powerful moment, Bishop Ralph walked amongst us carrying the Blessed Sacrament, blessing pilgrims from Hallam and from all over the world. Our last full day in Lourdes was Thursday, and that morning many pilgrims followed the Stations of the Cross on the prairie opposite the Grotto, with others following the "High Stations" on the Way of the Cross on the hillside. After our Thanksgiving Mass that afternoon, many of the youth departed on their coaches back to the Diocese. The next afternoon, most pilgrims flew back to Doncaster Airport and, whilst there was a slight delay with departure of the flight, everyone was home by early evening with shared memories of many wonderful experiences.



A Worthy Tribute to Mary

I think that if Our Blessed Lady had chosen to reappear at Lourdes during the week ending July 3rd she would have had a beaming smile on her face for all those who were part of the Hallam Diocesan Pilgrimage.

Around 240 pilgrims travelled either overland or by air and more than half of this number wore bright yellow tee shirts identifying them as helpers. The younger members were students from our secondary schools and they were so cheerful and helpful throughout the six days, and so careful when pushing the wheelchairs. They were all a great credit to their parents and teachers.

Bishop Ralph was accompanied by about twelve priests and a team of adult helpers, teachers, and nurses. I cannot praise the organisers enough for their tremendous work in ensuring that everything ran smoothly. Pilgrims travelled in three separate groups so there were countless opportunities for logistical disasters, yet nothing had been overlooked. We were awakened with amazing sunshine nearly every day and the first Mass was near the Grotto with a Blessing for the helpers. A large group of talented musicians from around the Diocese made all the Masses truly memorable. Sitting quietly in the Domaine after Mass, one's thoughts turned to St Bernadette and what she would have made of our world today. She was no stranger to poverty, her father being out of work, and the Cachot in which she lived was a hovel. Having survived a cholera epidemic she was left permanently asthmatic. This illustrates the empathy she shares with those enduring austerity, unemploy-


LOURDES 2015A Journey of Discovery

Alison Sefton, Senior Science Technician, has been leading the project. She said, "Whilst we are helping to protect the bees, they also offer something in return, as it has been medically proven that local honey can alleviate the symptoms of hay fever."

The school intends to develop the project across the school, with packaging design and marketing being undertaken by pupils.


This led him to join 644 Volunteer Gliding Squadron at RAF Syerston where he has prizes.

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A GOLDEN JUBILEE WEEKEND TO REMEMBER

On Saturday, 22 June 2015, Monsignor William Kilgannon celebrated the 50th Anniversary of his ordination to the Priesthood. Mgr Kilgannon has been a priest at the Mother of God Church since 1977, the first year spent as Curate and the remainder of his time as Parish Priest.

For a priest to serve and minister to a parish and community for 38 years is fantastic and the parish felt that his Jubilee was their opportunity to give something back and to show Mgr Kilgannon their gratitude and love for all his help and guidance over the years.

The weekend started on the evening of Friday, 20 June with a Mass of Celebration at the Mother of God Church which was concelebrated by Bishop Ralph, Bishop John, Mgr Kilgannon and over forty priests. Members of Mgr Kilgannon's family had made the journey over from Ireland to be with him and the parish on this very special occasion.

Several presentations were made to Mgr Kilgannon, which included a Papal Blessing from His Holiness Pope Francis, a Spiritual Bouquet from the parish and a cheque. The final gift was a tin whistle which the parish had had hand made in Ireland, plated in gold and engraved. On receipt of the whistle Father gave us a tune and the applause nearly brought the church down.

Following the Mass there was a buffet and drinks in the Parish Centre. On Saturday, 21 June, the St Vincent

The highlight of the Mass was the playing and singing of 'The Trinity Song' to the tune of 'Come by the Hills', Father's favourite tune.

Following Mass there was a get together in the Parish Centre with yet more cake and a drink.

On Sunday morning following both Masses there was again cake and drinks in the Parish Centre.

On the afternoon of Sunday, 22 June there was a big party at All Saints Catholic High School. All parishioners and friends were given an open invite to attend. There was a bouncy castle for the children, a hog roast, Morris and Irish dancing, and lots more dancing to the Dale Country Show band.



The highlight of the afternoon was a surprise 'This is Your Life' programme in which Father's early life, photos and stories were shared with the audience, along with the more up to date life and stories. Many special guest appearances were made, including Fr Pat O'-Connor who has known Fr Kilgannon since their seminary days. Bishop Ralph spoke about the help and guidance Father had given him when he arrived in the Diocese. Bob Sawyer and Claire Scott from All Saints School spoke about Father's impact on the School and also on them as individuals. and Catherine Goodchild gave a lovely address on Father's contribution to St Wilfrid's School. There were stories from his family too.

Celebrations continued in Ireland the following weekend. The Parish thanks Mgr Kilgannon's family for taking the time to travel over to Sheffield and also for all their help in collating information for the 'This is Your Life' production. The following address was made by Father's niece, Marie, and we all think that it sums up our brilliant, loving, supportive and one in a million

Parish Priest.

"Mv memories of Fr Willie start from a very young age when this tall, tall man in black, would arrive speeding in his car, with jellies for us and the dreaded handshake where he told you that you had a wobbly arm as he shook your hand and you giggled so much that you couldn't talk or make any sense.

"I remember him

smoking a pipe years ago and always associate that smell with the fun of him being around! He has this amazing ability to bring constant laughter to the house. You never knew what was going to happen when he was around but you were certain that it would be fun, a bit mad and memorable. He seemed to only ever need 3-4 hours sleep and you were likely to find him saying Mass or starting an Irish music session in the sitting room, sometimes both. When I'd see my mother buying the grapefruit I knew Fr Willie must be coming home. Of course he loved to trick us into trying a piece and laughed as our faces squirmed with the sour taste. As a very young child I thought he was this mythological hero, dressed in black, didn't need sleep, had endless energy, made us laugh so much and was always so, so kind.

"As a 12 year old, along with my sister, I got to spend three weeks with Fr Willie in Sheffield. We had a ball. I will never forget the day that I went to about five different local corner shops looking for buttermilk so that my sister could make him brown bread. The mystified looks I got from the shopkeepers as I tried to explain what buttermilk was!

"Over the years Fr Willie has been such a positive, reassuring and kind part of our lives. His ability to relate to everyone, to know exactly what to say and to be so dignified and respectful whilst seeking the fun in life, is nothing short of magical. Now my own children are developing that same relationship with him and laugh when he shakes their hands or plays the tin whistle for them. I feel so lucky to have this gifted hero in my life and think that if every parish or extended family had a Fr Willie in their life they would know the true value of life, family, prayer and happiness."

A dream came true for Director of St Wilfrid's Centre, Kevin Bradley when the Residential Project commenced on Queens Road. The day centre for homeless and vulnerable people has been raising money to build the residential for the last few years and amazingly have raised £1.7m. 
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The Hallam Ascent Group re-cently took part in a retreat to string and asked to tie knots in the Apostleship of the Sea at Immingham Docks.

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
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
