



Keep Each Other Safe; Be Kind to One Another and Nuture Wellbeing

Across the Diocese of Hallam the culture of safeguarding, nurturing wellbeing, protecting the young and the vulnerable is growing and tangible. Ensuring that all parishes are able to provide a safe environment for everybody involved in parish activities and in parish buildings overlaps with the arrangements for safeguarding, but goes further into all aspects of health and safety.

Recognising the need to bring the management and organisation of health and safety up to date across the Diocese, Bishop John and the Diocesan Trustees adopted a new Diocesan safety policy, procedures and organisational structure in November, 2013.

Bishop John and the Trustees also recognised that all parish priests needed to have professional advice and training, but also help from parishioners to ensure that the aim of providing a safe environment for all can be achieved. Building from the experience of the Diocese of Arundel and Brighton, Bishop John and the Trustees have appointed Safety Toolbox Limited as the Diocese's profes-

sional advisor (formally known as the 'Competent Person') and decided to subscribe to the web-based Safety Toolbox health and safety manage-ment system. Bishop Ralph has given his backing to this initiative and shown his personal commitment by becoming Chairman of the Diocesan Health and Safety Committee.

Most parishes across the Diocese look after their buildings and land well and have good housekeeping routines. However, much of this can be adhoc and often there is little recorded evidence of what is done. Since late 2013 good progress has been made across the Diocese in raising awareness of the importance of actively managing issues of safety. This is demonstrated by the fact that over 80 parishioners have volunteered to use the Safety Toolbox system and almost 75% of these have attended at least one training session. Safety Toolbox is the tool that is provided for every parish to make use of to improve its management of safety. It is designed specifically for use by volunteers who are not specialists in health and safety; it is designed especially for use in parishes to help with

parish activities and buildings; and it is packed with guidance and information that is tailor-made to be appropriate, proportionate and relevant to all parishes. The great advantage in parishioners taking on this activity is that they have the relevant local knowledge and understanding and, of course, their commitment to their

parish. Those with some knowledge of the management of safety will be aware of the centrality of risk assessments. Safety Toolbox provides risk assessments for all aspects of parish activities and buildings from Fire Risk Assessments, Food Safety, running parish events, candle safety, looking after your bell tower, to how to manage the risks from ice and snow. Many parishes have gone some way to complete risk assessments with a particu-lar focus on preventing slips, trips and falls – the most common cause of accidents.

During the autumn and winter, there is a focus on fire safety and completing the Fire Risk Assessment for each parish. To assist the volunteer parish safety represen-

tatives, a series of training sessions are being organised with the first one scheduled for Saturday, 21 November, starting at 10am and finishing by 1pm, at Blessed Trinity, Wickersley. This session will be led by Mrs Nicki Worley of Safety Toolbox Limited and will equip you with what is required to carry out a fire risk assessment for your church and parish hall.

Once completed these will be checked by the Health and Safety Coordinator for the Diocese, with any more difficult issues referred for specialist professional advice from Safety Toolbox or a local fire risk consultant.



RELICS OF ST MAXIMILIAN KOLBE AT OUR LADY OF LOURDES

Saint Maximilian Kolbe, who was born on 8 January 1894, was a Franciscan friar.

Before his ordination he founded the Immaculata Movement devoted to Our Lady. Although frail after contracting tuberculosis, he nevertheless founded and supervised the monastery of Niepokalanow near Warsaw and he also built a monastery in Japan, in addition to furthering the Immaculta Movement in India. In1936, he returned to Poland because of ill health. After the Nazi invasion of Poland he was twice imprisoned. In 1941, he was sent to the concentration camp at Auschwitz.

It was in Auschwitz that he died; he volunteered to take the place of a fellow prisoner, a young husband and fa-

ther, who had been chosen to be killed. In1981, Maximilian Kolbe was canonised by Pope John Paul 11, who called him "The Patron Saint of Our Difficult Century". His feast day is celebrated on the 14 August.

This year on his feast day relics of the hair of his beard were received into Our Lady of Lourdes church in Hackenthorpe, Sheffield.


The relics have been donated by Fr Miroslaw Bartos, Order of Friars Conventual. Father Superior in Niepokalanow, Poland - the City of Mary Immaculate which St Maximilian founded.

The relics were brought from Niepokalanow by two representatives of the Crusade of Mary Immaculate from Our Lady of Lourdes parish.

The reception of the relics took place during a Special Healing Mass and they were venerated after Mass during the Healing Prayer time. The relics will be kept at Our Lady of Lourdes church.

On Saturday, 18 July, a Mass was offered according to the Ordinariate Rite, more correctly known as the Ordinariate Use, and was accompanied by the Mass setting for Five Voices by William Byrd, 1540-1623, expertly sung by the New Chamber Choir. William Byrd was an English composer of the Renaissance. He wrote various types of sacred music for use in Anglican services, although he became a Roman Catholic in later life and wrote Catholic sacred music as well. The Ordinariate Use fitted perfectly with the setting by William Byrd. It was as though one was made for the other to provide a Mass of exquisite beauty

The Ordinariate Use is unique since this is the first time that the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith has approved a liturgy that has taken prayers and shape from another denomination. But it is important to recognise that the Ordinariate Use is a thoroughly Catholic Rite. Simply put, the compilers of the Ordinariate Use took the shape of Thomas Cramner's 1549 Rite for the Church of England and catholicized it.

in 1784 as the first Anglican Bishop of the United States of America. In this way, it can be said that the Episcopal Church in the United States owes much of its origins to the Scottish Episcopal Church.

As a result of the liturgical reforms during the second half of the twentieth century, traditionalists produced the American edition of the Anglican Missal, that followed closely the English Missal with the exception that it included three Canon's, namely the American Canon, the Canon of 1549, and the Gregorian Canon said to be based on the Canon brought by Saint Augustine to England. Whatever its origin, the Gregorian Canon is central to the Ordinariate Use, and reflects the ancient tradition of the Catholic Church.



tory have also made their mark on the Ordinariate Use. At this point it is important to note that the Apostolic Constitution, Anglicanorum Coetibus, does not refer to the liturgical traditions of the Church of England but to the 'liturgical traditions of the Anglican Communion'. This includes the rites favoured by Anglo-Catholics in this land such as the English Missal and the Anglican Missal, but also rites used by the British Colonies throughout the world.

The influence of the Episcopal rites used in the USA have particular importance. After the independence of the Thirteen Colonies, the Scottish Episcopal Church took the step of consecrating Samuel Seabury at Aberdeen


Alastair adds, "You can also set up a tribute fund for others to contribute to, in memory of your loved ones, and include memories and pictures of them on a special website, free of charge."

Students from Mount St Mary's College were introduced to the world of global shipping from the grounds of their school by Catholic charity, Apostleship of the Sea.

Apostleship of the Sea national director, Martin Foley presented a talk during assembly at the school on 7 September. He spoke about the sea and the lives of seafarers which touch many aspects of the national curriculum and are a fundamental part of Great Britain's heritage. The children also learnt about how Apostleship of the Sea supports seafarers welfare and faith needs.

Foley said, "We rely on the sea for many things and up to 95% of the goods we use or consume in the UK arrive by sea. There are some 100,000 ships at sea crewed by more than 1.5 million seafarers. It is a world that is often so close to children from seaside trips and ferry crossings, but relatively unknown to them."

Apostleship of the Sea, through its network of port chaplains across Great Britain, helps seafarers, from providing them with WiFi connection and telephone cards so they can contact home, to supporting their spiritual needs such as attending Mass. Fr Simon Ellis, the school's director of chaplaincy who organised the talks, also serves as a chaplain on board cruise ships, and has supported seafarers working on cruise vessels.
