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St Hugh's Bereavement Support

recently celebrated its tenth anniversary. Over that time the group has developed a number of initiatives to support those who have been bereaved, including an annual bereavement service for the whole parish and 'drop in' coffee mornings. The latter starts with a social gath-ering including bacon butties; an invited speaker on occasions; and ends with a short remembering service at the end of the morning. Most recently the theme for the service was developed around the feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour, where each person placed a candle beside the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Succour in memory of their loved ones, (pictured right).

Over the past few years a rose garden of remembrance, (pictured below right), has been developed as a place of reflec-

Bereaved families select a rose bush which often reflects or captures something of personality or essence of the deceased person such as Wild Rover, Super Trouper, Special Mum, Golden Wedding, Heart of Gold and many more. A 'peace' rose was also planted to remember Fr Jacques Hamel, who was killed in France as he celebrated Mass, and for all who suffer a violent death.

A Thousand Miles, Fourteen Days, Six Men

In October, Jeremy will be one of six men taking on the endurance challenge, cycling approximately 1000 miles in just 14 days, in the hope of raising £20,000 towards a new Jumbulance which makes travel possible for adults and children who are disabled or have serious or complex health conditions.

"For the past 2 years I've been a volunteer on the yearly ski trip to Austria. I've seen the huge difference it makes to people's lives - witnessing the fun and excitement that this trip brings to people and hearing of its importance in their lives sets us all up for the year ahead.

I'd never been on a pair of skis before

and I've also never cycled more than about 20 miles, but the Jumbulance Trust needs a new vehicle to help continue this vital work so we thought we'd try and help out."

All the men, a plasterer, a BT engineer, a dental student, Jumbulance drivers and Jeremy, an Accident and Emergency nurse at the Northern General Hospital, will use two weeks of their annual leave in a bid to achieve their goal.

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MARRIAGE ~ Love is Not Rude

Jane and Charles Perryman continue their series about Marriage

When Pope Francis discusses the next aspect of love that St Paul highlights, "Love is not rude or arrogant" (1 Cor 13:5), he writes about the importance of gentleness, thoughtfulness and courtesy. Quoting the Mexican Nobel Prize winning poet, Octavio Paz he says that courtesy "is a school of sensitivity and disinterestedness" which requires a person "to develop his or her mind and feelings, learning how to listen, to speak and, at certain times, to keep quiet" (AL 99).

The key here is listening. Over the years that we have been working with married and engaged couples we have come to believe that listening is probably the most important virtue that married couples must practise constantly.

Married couples are called to intimacy. In the second chapter of Genesis God says, "it is not good for the man to be alone" (Gen 2:18). Man here should be understood as human beings. This is why God creates Eve, so that each will have a companion. They will be able to grow together. This is the meaning of the comment, "for this reason a man leaves his father and mother and is joined to his wife and they become one body" (Gen 2:24). We are created to be connected to others and it is in our marriages



that we are called to be most closely connected. This is one of the greatest gifts of marriage - to be securely emotionally bonded to our spouse. It is through listening to our spouse that we build that deep intimacy.

Listening, actively listening, goes far beyond the words we exchange. Indeed psychologists tell us that only 7% of the messages we communicate are conveyed by the words. The rest comes through facial expression, eye contact, body language and tone of voice. Active listening means looking out for all of the emotional reactions behind the words the anxiety, disappointment, frustration or excitement. It means being on the alert for those things not said but only hinted at, but which are causing concern. Above all it means

being prepared to be influenced by what we hear. It is no good understanding all that our spouse has to convey and then making no response.

Of course not all conversation takes place at this deeper level. Ordinary everyday chit-chat is just that, chit-chat, small talk. Small talk is necessary and helps to keep in touch with each other. When, however, there is a serious matter to talk about then we need to be aware of what can get in the way of trust and respect." (AL 99). real listening. All couples who have raised a family know that when there are small children around you cannot have any serious conversation between tea time and bed time. We all have good times for serious conversation and times to avoid. We also need to avoid disand manage them together. That degree of peaceable living tractions. It is impossible to listen to someone with the television on in the sound is switched off!

The biggest obstacle to real listening, however, is our own disposition. If we don't want to listen, if we are not open to listening, then we won't. Mostly what gets in the way of listening is fear; fear that we may hear something that we won't like; fear that if we really listened to our spouse we would be called to change. Putting aside our own fears in order to really understand our spouse is very challenging.

How do we know if we are good as a listener? The key here is that we cannot be certain for ourselves. The only person who can sav that that we are a good listener is the person that we are listening to. Only they can say if they have the experience of being listened to. For example, if Charles thinks that he listens well to Jane but Jane does not have the experience of being heard and understood, real listening is not happening. We need to be courageous enough to ask our spouse how well they think we do as a listener and to ask about the areas where we do not listen well.

Quoting St Thomas Aquinas, Pope Francis says that an essential requirement of love is that, "every human being is bound to live agreeably with those around him. Every day, entering into the life of another, even when that person already has a part to play in our life, demands the sensitivity and restraint which can renew

pects that couples will agree all the time about everything. Indeed, John Gottman, the founder of the Relationship Research Institute at the University of Washington, says that 85% of happily married couples have irreconcilable differences. What Francis does call for is that couples live agreeably with their differences

is only achieved by deep understanding of one another, through same room – even if the attentive listening to each other.

GOLDEN CELEBRATIONS Marriage Preparation Programme

Diocese of Hallam Caring Services

Diocese developed a programme for engaged couples. That programme has served us well but, since the original programme was written, lots of research has been published to help us understand how couple relationships work and how to sustain them over many, many years.

Last year the Bishops of England and Wales published guidelines for the preparation of couples for marriage. It was opportune, therefore, to review and refresh our programme. That process is nearing completion and the new outline will be launched in the Autumn by Hallam Caring Services Family Focus Project.

The programme is built around two major themes. One is focussed on communication which is the lifeblood of any relation-

wenty years ago the ship. This theme deals with such topics as understanding feelings, how well we listen, and what gets in the way of listening, and how we deal with conflict. We also help couples to identify issues where they don't see eye to eye, particularly in areas such as roles in the relationship; attitude to each other's family and friends; leisure activities; attitudes to their sexual relationship; attitudes to children and parenting; financial management; communication; conflict resolution and marital expectations.

The second theme is built around what it means to live out the promises that the couple make on their wedding day, where we explain the significance of the sacrament and vocation of marriage.

The course is run over five evenings of about $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 hours, with one, two

or three engaged couples.

Currently, nineteen trained married couples present the course but we have an urgent need for more presenters in all areas of the Diocese, especially in Sheffield North, Rotherham, Barnsand Chesterfield ley Deaneries where provision is sparse.

Re-installing Cathedral's Historic Organ

Work has begun on re-installing the re- Marie's.







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furbished Lewis Organ at St Marie's Cathedral. The organ dates back to 1875, was a gift to the Cathedral by 15th Duke of Norfolk and is the ONLY large Lewis organ in a public location, which remains tonally unaltered.

Repairing and replacing the organ will cost £200,000 in total, but, thanks to a Heritage Lottery Fund grant, the church only has to raise £38,000 towards the work. By June, £3,300 had been raised from parishioners and more fund raising initiatives are planned.

According to independent organ adviser, Paul Hale, the number of tonally unaltered original T C Lewis organs is tiny. It is believed that only three remain and only two of those date from 1875 one at Studley Royal, and the other in St St Marie's is the larger and more impressive example with 1,500 individual pipes ranging from 16ft feet to half an inch in height.

Refurbishment has been carried out jointly by organ builders Nicholson & Co and A J Carter, with Nicholson's being responsible for the specialist design and installation of the new mechanical action, the refurbishment of the soundboards and chests, and the repair and regulation of the pipework.

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Church Marks Centenary of Bell Ringer's First World War Sacrifice

The son of a former St Marie's bell ringer, who rang at the Cathedral for more than 20 years, had the centenary of his death during the First World War marked by a memorial peal, lasting more than three hours.

Arthur Ward was killed on 1 July, 1917, during an attack on German defences near the French city of Arras.

He was the fifth son of Theresa and Henry Ward, who had begun ringing in 1888 and rang for 22 years at St Marie's, where a Peal Board in the ringing chamber records he was among those to ring a muffled peal to mark the interment of Queen Victoria in the Royal Mausoleum on February 4 1901.

Arthur - a silver finisher - and his brothers all followed Henry as bell ringers. However, they all



rang at St John's Anglican had been repulsed with Church in the Ranmoor district of Sheffield and it is there that a memorial peal was rung on Satur-day, 1 July, followed by a quarter peal on the Sunday.

Arthur's death is com-memorated in St John's ringing chamber by a brass plaque, which records that he was killed at Gavrelle, a village six miles north east of Arras.

Both Arthur and his brother Maurice were Privates in the York and Lancaster Regiment, while their eldest brother, Alfred, served as a driver with the Sheffield-based 3rd West Riding Royal Field Artillery, which also saw action in France.

Arthur sailed to France in November 1916 to join the Yorks and Lancaster's 14th Battalion – also know as the 2nd Barnsley Pals.

On 26 June, Arthur's Battalion was at Sainte Catherine-lès-Arras, to the North West of the city of Arras, getting ready to move east to capture the German-held Cadorna trenches, north of the village of Gavrelle, and Oppy Wood.

The one acre wood, west of the village of the same name, had been fortified and contained many German observation posts, machine-guns and trench-mortars. An attack on the wood in May

many British casualties, but the new attack proved more successful.

Although Arthur's battalion suffered what were described as "unusually low casualties," he was one of those to die following the action. He now lies with 3,000 casualties of the First World War and 20 from the Second World War, who are buried at the 'Orchard Dump Cemetery' on the D 919, to the North West of Oppy.

Arthur Ward was posthumously awarded the British War and Victory Medals, which were given to his mother. Arthur's father, Henry, had died the year before, at the age of 59, but Arthur was survived by his mother, his two sisters, Elsie and Mary, and his four brothers.



Visitation of the Fatima Pilgrim Virgin Statue to St Marie's Cathedral, Sheffield, from 12 - 13 August



The highlight of the Centenary Year of Our Lady's apparitions from May to October 1917, has been the canonisation at Fatima on 13 May of Francisco and Jacinta. They are the first children in the history of the Church to become saints in the ordinary course of their family life.

The World Apostolate of Fatima has organised Visitations of the National Pil-grim Virgin Statue to the Cathedrals of England and Wales, together with relics of Saints Francisco and Jacinta for veneration. The visitations began on Saturday, 18 February, when Cardinal Nichols received, blessed and crowned the statue in Westminster Cathedral. Since then the Dioceses of Cardiff. Southwark. Shrewsbury, Menevia, Nottingham and Plymouth have received the Statue, and the Visitations will continue until October.

In his homily Cardinal Nichols said that devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, "is a way for us to say 'yes' (like she did) from the depths of our hearts ... which is why today we consecrate afresh ourselves, our lives, our country, to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, so that we can always be saying 'Yes' to the Lord.

with all our heart, with all our will, from the centre of our being. And only Mary can teach us how to do this."

He also emphasised the importance of the Rosary and of praying it in the family.

On 12 and 13 August the Statue and Relics will be visiting St Marie's Cathe-dral, Sheffield, and the highlight of the weekend will be Holy Mass celebrated by Bishop Ralph with a post-Communion Act of Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Mass will be preceded by the enthronement and crowning of the National Fatima Statue, and followed by veneration of the Relics of Saints Jacinta and Francisco, and enrolment and investiture of the Brown Scapular.
