2017 Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lour-des took place from 2 to 7 July led by at very short notice they improvised and created their own Stations of the Cross and that was how wonderful the young people from our Diocese are! The care

Bishop Ralph, with over four hundred and sixty pilgrims, including two hundred and fifteen with Hallam Youth travelling from all the High Schools in the Diocese. Two charter flights operated from Doncaster Sheffield Airport direct to Lourdes, together with five Youth coaches.

There were many highlights during the Pilgrimage – Mass at the Grotto with the Diocese of Derry, Anointing of the Sick and many inspiring homilies. We took part as a Diocese in the Torchlight Procession on Monday night and in the Blessed Sacrament Procession on Wednesday afternoon. Many pilgrims commented on the very powerful Holy Hour in St Joseph's Chapel when Fr Lee Marshall led us in Adoration. Our young people follow the main pilgrimage programme but with some additional items, so on Tuesday afternoon all of Hallam Youth spent time together. Due to the temporary closure of the High Stations,

with some of the youth leaders, before a liturgy in the chapel up at the Youth Village.

In previous years, one important feature of the pilgrimage, particularly for the Youth, has been the opportunity to spend time at the Grotto late at night, when it is particularly quiet and peaceful. Due to the increased security measures in Lourdes, access to the Grotto is currently not permitted after midnight, but the Sanctuary generously granted our pilgrimage exclusive access after midnight on Tuesday night. For around two hundred and eighty pilgrims, including all Hallam Youth, this was the very much the highlight of the week, and the Vice Rector of the Sanctuary commented on the quiet and prayerful way that our pilgrimage used this opportunity.

From the feedback forms received from pilgrims it is clear that 2017 was a very special pilgrimage and everything ran very smoothly. One particular comment flowed through all the feedback received,

and friendship they provided to the eighty plus "Assisted pilgrims" using wheelchairs in Lourdes was exceptional, and everyone on the pilgrimage commented on how wonderful this was to experience. All of the Hallam Youth are a credit to their parents, their schools and to themselves. Thank you to all our youth helpers, and the leaders, school staff and Chaplains who travelled with them.

During the pilgrimage we each served one another - not just the sixty plus volunteer Helpers, Doctors and Nurses and two hundred and fifteen Youth Helpers helping our Assisted Pilgrims, but all pilgrims served one another in different ways, eg spending time talking in a café, or reflecting on what we've heard at a liturgy, or a simple word of encouragement or support. Thank you to everyone involved. If you haven't experienced the Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes, please do consider travelling in 2018.

Diocesan Pilgrimage to Padley



The Annual Pilgrimage to Padley honours the martyrs of the late sixteenth century, who died for their Catholic faith.

This year Deacon Bill Burleigh gave a homily based on the Gospel read at the celebration of Mass at Padley. The full homily is available on the Hallam News website, www.hallamnews.com.

"Come to me, all you who labour and are overburdened, and I will give you rest ..." How that gospel message must have rung and resonated in the ears of Tudor Catholics. And especially here in this household, the Fitzherberts, the family and servants who must have thought they were living safely, deep in forest land, well away from the prying eyes of greedy informants ready to betray Catholic observance to the State enforcers.

Now, with Fr Ludlam and Fr Garlick taken and brutally executed, their world was finally broken apart, a way of life shaken to its roots.

We rightly honour today and ask the prayers of the Blessed Robert Ludlam and Blessed Nicholas Garlick. May their prayers guide and renew our dioceses. But there's more, much more. We pray, too, for the prayers of the other martyrs stemming from this place as well as our two Padley martyrs – the prayers of Blessed Richard Simpson, strengthened in prison by his fellow priests to accepting death. And we ask the prayers, too, of the unnamed woman, reconciled through sacrament in prison by the martyrs, who was hung alongside them after declaring her faith. A martyr, surely.

And the Padley family too; John Fitzherbert preserved from the death sentence for harbouring priests so that he could pay fines until he was broken. He died of disease in prison squalor three years later. He could have left prison on any day simply by renouncing his faith. He chose not to, and died there. Another martyr?

The ten servants of the Padley household, too, were imprisoned in Derby with the priests and with their employer, John, protector of their faith so quietly lived at Padley. By Christmas, six months later, there were thirty-seven Catholics still in prison at Derby. Among these was James Cleyton of Sheffield, dying there later of the squalor; death by gaol fever. Another martyr?

And there's more. The daughters of John and Catherine Fitzherbert present at Padley at the capture, now separated and singled out to be converted from Catholic faith. Jane effectively under house arrest and religious re-instruction with one Protestant minister and Mary with another. The re-education failed. Faith was unbroken. Maud, the oldest sister, fared worse, imprisoned in the squalor at Derby, and then at York, for her faith.

All these - Padley martyrs, Padley persecuted, Padley faithful.

"Come to me all you who are overburdened and I will give you rest". A gospel for these people, a gospel for Tudor Catholic England.

How the world had changed! Only 50 years earlier their faith had thrived.

We, in our changed and still changing situation, we are so different - so blessed, so able to rest in order to discern, to re-align, renew the living of true Catholic faith for others. Pope Francis is right. Maintenance is not enough. We are each called to be missionary disciples, going out to announce the gospel, to live our lives, our faith, our Catholic val-ues openly, confidently, firmly united with others in whatever communities regroup around us. Rest, yes, and careful discernment, in times when change is needed, so as to engage with a newly non-Christian society, peppered with people thirsting for roots, for truth, for what is spiritual. So much missionary territory, such a harvest, when we are ready, matured and renewed in knowing our faith more fully, with deepened love for our neighbours struggling or without faith and clearer witness in our lives, lived for them.

So in this Mass we reach upwards and ask for the prayers of the blessed martyrs of Padley, yes, and the prayers of all those from round here who share their heavenly reward, those whose faith was true 'til death. We ask their prayers for our dioceses, our faith communities and for faith in our families. Blessed Nicholas Garlick – pray for us Blessed Robert Ludlam – pray for us All you holy martyrs of England – pray for us





Sheffield Visually Impaired Walking Group Raise Over £3,000

Vincent's Foundation, Sheffield and a past Union of Catholic Mothers President, relates her experience of Sheffield Visually Impaired Walking Group's fundraising event.

On Saturday, 17 June the Sheffield Visually Impaired Walking Group and their guides faced a tough challenge in completing a 17 mile walk over Sheffield's hilly terrain, well over the distance of seven miles which they normally walk four times a month.

My thoughts when I took on the

Hilary Myers, a member of St challenge and asked my friends and parishioners to support me as a visually impaired walker was, I don't mind how long it takes me but I hope the weather is kind and not too hot.

> We set off from Endcliffe Park at 9am on a warm sunny morning, soon to become a very hot and sticky day. The nice thing about Sheffield is that there are plenty of parks and woods along the route which gave us some much appreciated shade from the hot sun. Everyone on the walk, about twenty of us, was in good spirits.

Being blind or visually impaired





does not stop you from walking; you just need the arm of a trained guide and we have some wonderful volunteer guides always willing to walk with us. We change guides usually every few miles to give them a break from 'guiding', so there's always a different person to talk to.

The route started at Hunters Bar, up the Porter Valley to Ringin-glow, down the Limb Valley into Ecclesall Woods and across Abbeydale Road at Dore and Totley Station; then on to Ladies Spring Wood and to Beauchief Abbey in time for a packed lunch. Nicely refreshed, we continued through Chancet Wood to Graves Park and the Gleadless Valley;

then onward through Meersbrook Park, across London Road, up the last hill to Brincliffe Edge and Chelsea Park to reach the finish at Hunters Bar at 6pm, where there was lots of chatting, laughing and good camaraderie. We were all in very high spirits and so delighted with each other that we had all finished the challenge. A day well spent!





Sheffield school welcomed a Commonwealth boxing champion and his trainer as special guests at its annual sports award evening.

Middleweight boxer, Sam Sheedy and trainer, Glyn Rhodes MBE joined pupils, parents and staff at the event at Notre Dame High School on Fulwood Road, Sheffield.

The sports awards evening has been running for three years and has quickly become established as a highlight in the school calendar.

Headteacher, Steve Davies said, "You can see how much it is valued by the children, their parents and the staff by the turnout and the effort everyone goes to in getting dressed up for the occasion.

"We were delighted to be joined by Sam and Glyn who spent the whole evening meeting students, presenting awards and answering questions.

"Theirs was a very positive message and it was a real inspiration to our students to meet successful sports people from their own city.

Mr Davies, who thanked the PE department and other staff members for their role in supporting students in sport, added, "Sport's benefits to physical health are obvious and well documented, but we know too what a positive impact involvement with sport can have on our mental health and wellbeing.

"Through sport, our students develop confidence, leadership skills and learn how to work as part of a

team. They experience success, but just as importantly, they learn how to deal with failure, how to face it with grace and how to learn from it."
