of proceeding in cases concerning the declaration of the nullity of a marriage. Chesterfield Conference Twinned with Indian Conference

The Padley Martyrs Conference of the SVP in Chesterfield sent a Christmas message to St Paul's Church at Etharla Palli in Andra Pradesh, India with whom the Chesterfield Conference is twinned.

In response they received a photograph accompanied by a message:



"Thank you dear members of your conference for your kind letter. We wish you a Happy Christmas and New Year.

We are a small conference of seven active members.

All of us are dependent on agriculture and earn mostly seven dollars a day on average.

Our conference has 'adopted' five families and we give them thirty dollars every month. Anything re-

maining we use to help children from our village to go to school. With the money you have pro-

vided we have also established a tailoring project which provides employment for two girls, one of whom is a conference member, and have also been able to set up a small shop.

We are receiving your Twinnage payments on time (£150 each year). We are very thankful for that".

The Society of St Vincent de Paul in Hallam

Would you like to make a difference to people's lives by putting your faith into action? This is exactly what the SVP does and in Hallam we are keen to recruit new volunteers to help with its mission to offer practical help and support to those in need, 'wherever the need'.

The Saint Vincent de Paul Society – SVP – was founded in Paris in 1833 by a young Catholic student, Frederick Ozanam, who was shocked at the poverty he saw around him. He was moved to do something about it. So, driven by the fundamental demand of his faith to 'love your neighbour' and to serve Christ by helping others, he set out with a group of friends to support those in need.

Taking St Vincent de Paul as their patron, Frederick's group soon developed and, by the time of his death in 1853, there were over 40,000 members across Europe and the Americas. The SVP came to England in 1844 and now have more than 10,000 members in over 1000 groups or conferences across England and Wales.

Unfortunately, in Hallam the SVP is very thin across the Diocese and so the SVP have appointed a membership Development Officer, Lance Philpott, to help with recruitment. Lance (pictured right) is planning

to contact parishes to arrange to come and make an appeal for new volunteers over the coming months to carry on the work of the society, encouraging people to 'love your neighbour' wherever the need arises in the community. The emphasis will be on the offer of time – no matter how little per week - to provide help in practical ways whilst working within a team structure and backed up by a national organisation.


My Camino

Mike Reynolds writes about his pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela.

Doing the Camino is a great experience. After thinking about it for about 15 years, I decided that, at 75, I had better do it – or else!

I started my Camino in León, and just over 2 weeks later arrived in Santiago de Compostela; that's 311 kilometres. I met some great and good people, including an opera singer from Brussels who sang a magnificent Ave Maria at breakfast time in the pilgrim's hostel.

I had three reasons for doing the Camino: it's a pilgrimage, I like walking and I love Spain. There's no better way to know a country than to walk it. You not only see it up close, but you feel it, too, under your feet! Walking, preferably alone, gives you time to reflect, and to know yourself. I managed to raise £810 in sponsorship for Hallam Caring Services and over £2000 for City of Sanctuary Sheffield. Over a thousand of that total amount was raised at St William of York, on Ecclesall Road. Sincerest thanks to my fellow parishioners for this support, and to everyone else who made a donation.

A Residential Solitude Experience at The Portiuncula, Clay Cross

An experience of prayer and retreat at The Portiuncula at St Clare's Convent, Clay Cross, Chesterfield. Hermitage, which would be my sacred and personal space during my solitude experience. The walls were painted a

During a difficult time recently, a good friend suggested I might benefit from a short retreat at The Portiuncula in Clay Cross. I hadn't heard of The Portiuncula, but what I read on the Internet intrigued me ... so I booked a two-night Residential Solitude Retreat, including spiritual accompaniment. The following week, I found myself driving along Stretton Road from Chesterfield, through Clay Cross and turning right at the sign for St Clare's Convent.

I was warmly greeted by Sr Patricia Jordan and guided through a beautiful orchard to The Portiuncula. Entering this simple yet thoughtfully constructed building, the sense of peace was palpable. Opposite the entrance is a wonderful, hand-painted depiction of Our Lady surrounded by four angels, and on the right, a small circular chapel. Words cannot adequately describe the beauty of this chapel: the 'cave-like' entrance, gold and red tabernacle, flaming sanctuary lamp, crucifix, statue of Our Lady, stained glass windows and paintings of The Four Angels, have all been prayerfully designed using symbolism from biblical and Franciscan themes.

Sr Patricia then showed me the Carceri

Hermitage, which would be my sacred and personal space during my solitude experience. The walls were painted a gentle yellow, which in iconography symbolizes truth, light, happiness and joy. The room was comfortable, clean and welcoming, with stunning views across the hills of the Amber Valley. Each of the five en-suite hermitages is named after scenes and themes from the life of St Francis of Assisi.

I spent some time before lunch in the peaceful Contemplation Space, prayerfully listening to water rippling gently from the fountain, water that has been blessed at Masses and from shrines all around the world, and gazing at a stunning replica of the San Damiano cross and a beautiful glass plaque symbolising the transcendence of the Holy Spirit.

A hot lunch was provided in Bethany Dining Room, where fellow pilgrims can eat in companionable silence. After this I walked up to the Peace Garden and spent some time sitting in the sunshine, in quiet preparation, before entering and walking the labyrinth and the Way of the Cross.

In the afternoon, tea and a light snack was provided in Bethany Dining Room, and at 3pm the Blessed Sacrament was exposed in the chapel for a Holy Hour of adoration and prayer. Before dinner, I



enjoyed some time resting, reading and reflecting in my hermitage, and enjoying the lovely view. I had begun to adjust to the blessed silence by now and already felt much calmer than when I arrived. As the sun set over the Amber Valley, I gave thanks for this time of peace and healing.



FRIENDS OF THE HOLY LAND Helping Our Fellow Christians in the Holy Land

Friends of the Holy Land, a registered charity launched in 2009, are supported by Bishops in Catholic and Anglican Dio-ceses in England, Scotland and Wales. Bishop Ralph has recently appointed Fr John Cooke as the Friends of the Holy Land Diocesan Coordinator.

Friends of the Holy Land currently give hope and provide practical support to 2000 Christians in the West Bank, Gaza, İsrael and Jordan.

Imagine no Christians in the land of Our Lord In 70 years, the number of Christians has reduced from 28% to 1.5%. The position is becoming acute and your help to preserve a Christian presence in the land where are Our Lord was

born, ministered, died and rose again, is needed now. Imagine being told you have a treatable illness such as diabetes, asthma, high blood pressure or heart disease but you are not able to pay for the treatment you require.

There is no state health service. This is the case in the Holy Land. Friends of the Holy Land help fund drugs, operations, treatments and medical centres that enable fathers and mothers to support their families.



Imagine studying hard at school and university to gain qualifications and finding there are no jobs available for you in your country of birth and the only opportunities are to go abroad. This is the situation in the Holy Land. Friends of the Holy Land funds employment projects in Gaza and are seeking funds for a new project in Nazareth.







Jordan family support ~ Iraqi Christian Refugees

Imagine being a child with Special Needs and being abandoned by your family, through shame and embarrassment, with nowhere to go.

Friends of the Holy Land funds the School of Joy, for those with Special Needs, doubling its capacity in 4 years.

Imagine going to work to do the job you love and doing it well only to find you are not paid at the end of the month. Christian teachers in the Holy Land do.

Friends of the Holy Land help fund salaries for Christian Teachers in the Holy Land.

Imagine not having running water for up to 3 weeks at a time. Families in the West Bank have to put up with this.

Friends of the Holy Land funds water tanks and solar panels to put on the roof of homes plus community water projects. Imagine growing old and having no-one to care for you as there is no state pension and often there is no family around you as they have emigrated due to lack of work opportunities, lack of housing, poor health and education and fear that peace will never come. This happens to the elderly in the Holy Land. Friends of the Holy Land provides emergency and sustainable help to try and help people to remain in their birth place. Friends of the Holy Land provides 90% of the running costs

for St Martha's House which provides a permanent Day Care facility in Bethlehem for elderly ladies.

These examples are some of many of the projects funded by Friends of the Holy Land, supporting Christians with education, employment, health and housing challenges, including over 90 families on their Family Support programme. The majority of Friends of the Holy Land's grants contribute to the emergency requirements of our Christian brothers and sisters.



Appeal for Bell Ringers Prompts Overwhelming Response

The response to an appeal for members of the congregation at the Cathedral Church of St Marie's to train to become bell ringers has left organisers stunned and delighted.

More than 30 signed up for taster sessions following the appeal at weekend Masses for parishioners to, in the words of the Psalm, "Ring out your joy to the Lord."

There are around 7,000 churches, mainly in the British Isles, but also in India and Pakistan, Africa, Australasia, North America, Belgium, Holland and Spain, that have sets of bells designed for Change Ringing.

However, only 50 of those 7,000 churches are Roman Catholic - and St Marie's is one of them. St Marie's has had a ring of eight bells for more than 150 years and for 80 of those years, it had its own active band of ringers.

Sadly, the band declined in the 1960s and since then the Cathedral has relied on members of Sheffield Universities' Guild of Change Ringers and visiting ringers to give voice to its bells. The number of student ringers has fallen in recent years, but, three St Marie's parishioners started learning to ring after visits to the bell tower were organised by the Cathedral's former heritage officer, two years ago.


Their appeal for more to join them - prompted by Cathedral Dean, Fr Christopher Posluszny, and backed by Bishop Ralph - resulted in a response way above their expectations.

The success has left them with the problem of finding a way to train a new St Marie's band, likely to be well into double figures.

Fortunately, experienced ringers from St John's, Ranmoor and other churches are rallying round and








weekly St Marie's practice sessions are expected to start shortly.


The new band is also open to recruits from other parishes in the Diocese of Hallam.

The St Marie's ringers stress that bell ringing is about technique, rather than strength and people who are slight and short can ring just as easily as those who are taller and stronger. You don't need any musical training and age isn't a limit either. People can start learning at 14 and younger and could be 60 and older.






This month our page looks at the celebration of Palm Sunday, when we remember the day Jesus arrived in Jerusalem on a donkey.





- HALLAM NEWS -**Cathedral Church** of St Marie **Thomas Lewis Organ Project is Complete**

After substantial financial help from the Heritage Lottery Fund the restoration of the 1875 instrument took place over the last couple of years, and the work to reinstate it into the Cathedral Church of St Marie was completed just after Christmas. It will take a few months to settle in – it was removed from the Cathedral before the major re-ordering within the church 5 or 6 years ago. According to the organ builder, Andrew Carter, and the project manager, organ consultant Paul Hale, "it now needs playing".

An 'Organ Launch' is to take place at St Marie's on Thursday, 12 April at which Bishop Ralph will bless the Thomas Lewis organ and, after that, there will be a concert of organ and together choral music, with audience/congregational participation. Full details of the 'Organ Launch' will appear in next month's Hallam News and will include the names of those who will be taking part (both local and international). It promises to be a wonderful occasion.
