Music for Mary's Meals

"We first heard about Mary's Meals at the Mediugorie Youth Festival," said Mary Phillips, one of the organisers. "Whilst there, we met Joe, the nephew of the charity's founder, Magnus Mac-Farlane-Barrow, and listened to a talk by Jimmy – a young guy from Haiti who went to a school that received Mary's Meals. Jimmy is now head teacher at a school in his home country. We wanted to do something to help the charity, but weren't sure exactly how."

"We had many different ideas," added Miguel, another group member, "and eventually settled on a concert after a friend put us in touch with the Valette Piano Trio - three students from the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester. They agreed to do the concert in support of this amazing charity."

Musicians Yuuki Bouterey-Ishido, cello, Lu Liu, violin and Tianyang Han, piano, played a stunning programme specially chosen to reflect the aspirations and values of Mary's Meals; a deeply moving Tchaikovsky Piano Trio intimating the suffering around the world and evoking the season of Lent, followed by a contrastingly cheerful Gypsy Rondo by Haydn, symbolising Easter and the hope brought by Mary's Meals and the con-

The students overcame various obstacles to make the event happen. They explained, "Our biggest challenge was getting the right screens to do justice to the brilliant promotional video shown before the concert. We sorted out this problem thanks to the generosity of diocesan parishes, the Hallam Pastoral Centre and Purple Wave.

"We were amazed at the support and generosity before the event, and the en-





thusiasm and positive feedback on the day from people who attended and want to get involved in supporting Mary's Meals. One gentleman bought eleven tickets – just for him and his wife! All the students involved gave generously of their time, and we're really grateful to all the sponsors: St Marie's Cathedral, the Knights of St Columba, Purple Wave Audio Visual, and STATISI. We'd also like to thank Maria Valpone from Fabrico Coffee House in Chesterfield, and The Grapes."

Future events include a sponsored cycle ride around the diocese – including talks at the end of Mass if that's possible. This summer there's a 10 mile sponsored walk in the Peak District, as well as a coffee morning and wine tasting event in Chesterfield. A full cooked breakfast after Mass at the Catholic Chaplaincy at Padley House each week, with profits going to Mary's Meals, is in the planning stages at the moment!



In his Pastoral Letter for the Annual Appeal for the Hallam Caring Services Bishop Ralph explained that a significant development in our Diocese this year was the establishment of Caritas Diocese of Hallam, which encompasses all the social action projects in the Diocese.

The recent meeting due to be held in Spinkhill had to postponed because of the bad weather. It has now been rescheduled for Saturday, 12 May



at Blessed Trinity Church Hall, Wickersley.

The purpose of this meeting is to provide the opportunity for Bishop Ralph to celebrate the considerable amount of voluntary social action taking place in this Diocese.

Our questionnaire revealed seventy-eight parish based projects, which was a surprising number and a very encouraging finding.

The creation of Caritas Diocese of Hallam is a move to establish a comprehensive picture of this social action, identify unmet needs and stimulate grass roots development.

It will provide a strong coherent voice on important social issues and policies for the Diocese underpinned by Catholic social teaching.



Easter Celebrations and New Beginnings

The recently formed North East Derbyshire parish of Our Lady Queen of Peace celebrated its first Holy Week and Easter since the dedication of the newly reordered Church of the Annunciation in Chesterfield by Bishop Ralph Heskett, on

2 December, 2017. Parish Priest, Fr Adrian Tomlinson said, "This first Easter in our newly reordered church, we are also celebrating the Parish community. We are the Church, the workers in the vineyard, the living stones building a spiritual house. Together we are working to spread the message of Christ and proclaim the kingdom of God in this town and its outlying communities.

In 1580 when the Jesuits began their Mission in England, Catholicism was outlawed and the task was daunting. Although there were dark times ahead, 1829 saw Catholic emancipation and 1850 the restoration of the Hierarchy. The Mission of North East Derbyshire and Yorkshire was placed under the patronage of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. By 1842 the college and Parish Church of the Immaculate Conception were built.

In 1851 Fr Thomas Hill was appointed Jesuit Missioner to Chesterfield and commenced an ambitious campaign, raising funds from donors and benefactors of all denominations, as well as organising and preaching sermons further afield, including Sheffield, Wakefield and Spinkhill, to beg for financial sup-port. A report in the *Derbyshire Times* described the Reverend Hill as having '... energy combined with a good-humoured, hopeful manner that won him the good will and affection of all.' The report goes on to state that '...By great self-sacrifice and labour he succeeded in purchasing a piece of

rough ground at the top of Spencer Street, and built upon it a plain, solid, Gothic structure...' In 1854 the church building was finished and certified for Roman Catholic worship under the dedication of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

We have begun a new and exciting chapter in the story of the Church and Her mission in North East Derbyshire," added Fr Adrian. "Once more we turn to the Mother of God and consecrate our church, our parish and ourselves to her maternal care. Today amid a world ravaged by wars and violence we commit our new parish to the intercession and patronage of Our Lady Queen of Peace. Under her







From the Desk of the Judicial Vicar

In 2016, I wrote about Pope Francis' Motu proprio, Mitis Iudex Dominus *lesus*, and the implications it had for tribunals across the world. Now seems a good time to offer an update on how it is affecting the work of the tribunal here in Hallam.

One of the major innovations of Pope Francis' document is the processus brevior, the 'shorter process,' which eliminates the need for a standard tribunal hearing. Talking to other judicial vicars from across the country, it seems that some have found this process of immense help, while others are still a little wary. The difficulty is that the rules of the shorter process are really quite strict: both (ex)spouses must be in full agreement that the process can be used, and that it is immediately obvious to the tribunal that the marriage in question was null. It is often difficult to satisfy these two conditions, so it is sometimes easier to follow the 'full' process. Here in Hallam, the shorter process has been used only twice.

Nevertheless, the document brought the work of tribunals to the fore, and it seems now that people are much more willing to approach the tribunal with regard to previous marriages, even though some cases are often much more complicated than people realise at first. But one of the undeniable fruits of Pope

Francis' document is that people are more aware that seeking a declaration of marriage nullity (colloquially and incorrectly known as an 'annulment') is not a preserve of the rich and famous. Not that it ever was.

Another aspect of Mitis Iudex is that appeals of tribunal decisions are no longer automatic: a person must take part in the process and must ask directly for an appeal to be made, in the case of Diocese of Hallam to the Metropolitan Tribunal of Liverpool. This also has perhaps encouraged people to approach the Tribunal, if they were afraid that an ex-spouse would not co-operate and deliberately try to derail the nullity process. If no appeal is made then the original decision is the final and definitive one.

In short, though Mitis Iudex is not without its demands, it has done what perhaps Pope Francis intended, and made the very thought of a marriage nullity less threatening. If you carry the weight of broken marriage in your life, I would encourage you to not be afraid of approaching the Tribunal here in Hallam to at least try to resolve issues that might be causing you unnecessary distress.




