

WALSINGHAM – ENGLAND'S NAZARETH

Pilgrims have travelled to Walsingham, in Norfolk, since 1061, when (according to the ancient 'Pynson Ballad') Our Lady asked Richeldis de Faverches, Lady of the Manor of Walsingham Parva, to build a replica of the house in Nazareth, as a memorial of the Annunciation. The wooden house contained a statue of Our Lady, seated on a wooden throne, holding the child Jesus. By the end of the 12th century, a great Augustinian priory had been established there.

Along with Jerusalem, Rome and Santiago de Compostela, "England's Nazareth" was one of the main places of pilgrimage in medieval times, until the dissolution of the monasteries. Its priory was taken by the crown and the house and statue were burnt at Tyburn. Pilgrimages ceased, but were resumed in the 1930s and the village is again a centre of Christian devotion, attracting thousands of people yearly. There is a one day pilgrimage led by Bishop Ralph from Hallam Diocese every year.

There are three shrines. A mile from the original site, pilgrims used to leave shoes in the ancient Slipper Chapel and continue barefooted. This is now the Roman Catholic National Shrine of Our Lady, hosting many annual pilgrimages. In 2015 Pope Francis raised it to the status of minor basilica (one of only four in England). St Seraphim's Orthodox Church has many icons, although the actual Orthodox shrine is within the Anglican shrine. The latter's peaceful garden is inspired by Pope John Paul II's Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary. This and the Roman Catholic shrine's icon both show the ecumenical spirit of the place.

Walsingham Abbey contains the priory ruins, site of the original shrine. The great east window and some other buildings are all that remain. It has twin wells and a pack horse bridge, originally on the Norwich Road. A plaque marks the site of the original 'Holy House'.

HOW CAN WE BE A PARISH COMMUNITY WITHOUT A RESIDENT PRIEST?

Bishop Ralph acknowledged that the western Church is ageing, with diminishing numbers of priest and laity. There is great social change in the western world and the Church, which once had many confraternities and devotions. In considering what elements of church community are non-negotiable, he referred to Pope Francis's new encyclical on Apostolic Exultation. Church community is a response to the call to holiness that is addressed to all and to each personally, to let baptismal grace bear fruit in holiness, to be open to God and turn to him in every situation. We must allow God to love and liberate us and be guided by the Holy Spirit. This involves perseverance, patience and meekness, joy and humour, compassion, boldness and passion to evangelise, to leave a mark on the world and to belong to the universal Church, diocese, parish.

Deacon Andrew Crowley of St Patrick's, Sheffield then went on to speak about the experience of belonging to a parish without a resident priest. St Patrick's found out what happens, when a parish priest suddenly dies. Priests do many things that others in the parish could do. Parishes can function with good administration (including IT) and a pastoral leader. Those open to the Spirit will be guided. The nearby Sacred Heart parish had an "In case of emergency" plan that could be set into action if anything happened to the parish priest.

Deacon Andrew also referred to the call to holiness, our baptismal vocation to follow Jesus and do what he does. Cultural changes mean the Church no longer grows by generations of Catholic families carrying on the faith. More are baptised into the Church than die in it. We should not keep things as they have been for years, for the sake of it. We must become Church in a different way. What drove the apostles was not keeping tradition, but proclaiming the joy of the resurrection. Pope Francis' encyclical "Evangelicum Gaudium" says parishes should be evangelical sanctuaries, outward looking with missionary outreach, going out to the whole world proclaiming the good news. We may be downhearted, but Christ is with us. Andrew suggested that we can develop a holistic parish action plan, train welcomers, keep contact with new people, develop a parish leaflet.

He further suggested that we need to look at how our faith can become alive and our liturgy be a lived experience. He highlighted the need to care for the neighbourhood in the parish, to relate to the area by, for example, making the parish known to schools and care homes, to care for each other and build a common life together. A sense of humour is important. Jesus is with us. Jesus attracted people. His community grew.

Frank Mc Dermott is Parish Coordinator of Stainforth's Our Lady of the Assumption. He explained that Our Lady of the Assumption parish was built with subscriptions from local miners. Closing such parishes is the death knell for the Catholic community in those areas. Since 1995 this parish has experienced prolonged periods without a resident priest. This has made them a vibrant, welcoming, outward-looking Eucharistic community, a model for a strong, outgoing missionary Church, rooted in prayer, learning that no one is more important than anyone else. Years ago they washed each other's feet, as the Gospel tells us to do. Frank, however, reiterated the Bishop's words about being strongly linked to deanery, diocese and universal Church. It is dangerous if we all do our own thing, with fewer priests and people. Recent statements by parishioners show that they appreciate being open and transparent; liberating; emphasising welcoming; being a beacon and oasis; an important Christian presence; being open to think and be part of the mission of the parish; allowing all to flourish. They meet, not as a parish council, but as a parish in council, modelled on the Acts of the Apostles, with no separate, secretive finance committee, or

elected pastoral committee. For the past fifteen years the parish has had a weekly Saturday evening Mass, but none on Sundays. However, the people feel that their lives have been touched



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tude for the past, enthusiasm for the present, hope for the future." Frank, as co-ordinator, values the regular support and guidance he has had from bishops and deans and feels very blessed to be part of Doncaster Deanery's Parishes of Hope.

Frank has produced several publications, "Communities of Hope", a practical workbook, with Christine Dodd; "Walking with my God", a prayer journal, with Donal O'Leary; "The Easter People", foundational tools for a forum of priests and people and "In Sure and Certain Hope" for use of lay leaders of Christian funerals.

Group discussions followed, with

decisions about what parishes could do over the next year. The workshop gave useful, encouraging insights into what can be achieved by prayerful communities, focused on Christ's call to, "Be holy because I am holy", empowered by the Holy Spirit and linked closely to deanery, diocese and universal Church. We need gratitude, enthusiasm and hope. Parish life is in crisis, but we are parishes of hope. We are baptised. We are the Church.

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
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Rosary on the Coast at St Marie's Cathedral

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
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Goodbye to Our Friend Anne White 1934-2018

Lorraine Healy, Manager of St Vincent's Furniture Store, Sheffield, remembers a special lady.

On Saturday, 17 March, we learnt that our friend Anne had gone to her heavenly home. Anne died in St Luke's Hospice following a two year battle with can-

Anne was a much loved lady who, as a member of the St Vincent de Paul Society, did such a lot for so many people. Most of her good works remain unknown and were kept between Anne and the people she helped. However, a big part of Anne's life was her involvement with the Furniture Store.

Anne often told the story of when, as a teacher, she took early retirement and she went to her Parish Priest at Holy Family Church and asked him if there was any work she could do in the parish. His reply to her was, "I have just the job for you, Anne, join the SVP." Anne took his advice and was a member of this fantastic organisation for nearly 35 years.

She became involved with St Vincent's Furniture Store in Sheffield at the beginning and remained a volunteer and a member of the Management Committee up until health issues meant she had to retire in November 2016. Anne was also a member of the Management Committee at St Vincent's Shop on Abbeydale Road in Sheffield.

Anne dedicated her life to helping others and she often told us many a funny story of those early days at the Store. Her 'can do' attitude was something to behold and she would try her hand at anything. When we introduced computers to our donation process, Anne told me she had never used a computer in all her years; however, she would, "give it a go" and she did. She would be the first to admit that she never fully mastered that keyboard; however she kept on going and never gave in. Her telephone manner, good humour and her overall nature to help everyone will never be forgotten.

The photograph below is of Anne, on her retirement, at our Annual Meeting in November, 2016, receiving one of her many gifts, a statue of St Vincent de Paul, something that I know she treasured dearly.

Anne, I can say without hesitation that I have not met many like you and I am sure you are reaping all the rewards you deserve in your heavenly home. RIP Anne, a true lady definitely walked this way.



Marriage Preparation Programme Preparing for a Lifetime Together Revised Programme


In the letter to the Ephesians St Paul says that the love of husband and wife is a model of the love that Christ has for His Church. The revised Marriage Preparation Programme, "Preparing for a Lifetime Together" shows engaged couples how they can live their marriages so that they become visible images of Christ's love. This is their marital vocation.

Recent research has presented a clear picture of what enables marriages to thrive for the long term. The Diocesan programme uses that information to show couples how they can be that visible sign by providing them with the essential building blocks to live out the vision of marriage as a sacrament and covenant. Pope Francis has said, "A marriage is not successful because it endures. It's the quality that counts. The programme sets out in plain language the Church's teaching about marriage and encourages the couples to reflect on the meaning of the promises they will make to each other during their wedding. One key feature of the programme, which is highly valued by the engaged couples, is the profile of their relationship which is derived from an on-line questionnaire. This shows the couple where the strengths of their relationship lie and the areas that they

should work on.

This revised version of the programme builds on the earlier edition. Analysis of the feedback from the hundreds of couples in Hallam who have taken part shows how highly they rate it and their great appreciation of the effort put in by the married couples who lead them through the course. Is this a ministry that you think that you might like to offer? What you do need is to be able to share a little of your experience in your marriage. Please give it some prayerful

The Founder of the **St Vincent de Paul Society**

Frederic Ozanam was born on 23 April, 1813, of com- the one to enmitted French Catholic parents.

His father was a doctor but, in an age where medical provision had to be paid for, he gave his services to the poor who constituted at least a third of his patients, for free.

His mother formed a group of women to tend at the bedside of the sick and poor. In this way, Frederic was schooled by their marvellous example in the importance of helping those less fortunate than himself.

At 18 he went to the Sorbonne University to read law. Forty years previously, the epoch changing French Revolution had taken place. The Church had always been viewed as part of the royal establishment so Catholics were viewed with much suspicion.

Frederic decided to form a discussion group with a few friends of like mind. They called themselves "Conference of History". Their method was to write a response to all the anti-Catholic lectures.


The "Conference", however, was mainly a talking shop. Frederic and his friends were spurred to action when a student attending a discussion challenged Frederic himself, by asking "What are you doing for

poor people today?"

Charity, Sister Rosalie Rendu, who was experienced in working with the poor of Paris.

Sister Rosalie Rendu became their mentor and she gave them two pieces of advice. "Be Kind and love,' she said, "for love is your first gift to the poor. They will appreciate your kindness and your love more than all else you can bring them."

The second tip she gave them was, "When you meet the poor, you meet Christ."

Adopting St Vincent as its patron saint, Frederic established the Society of St Vincent de Paul (SVP). It continued to grow and by 1841 it had 2000 members across Europe and the Americas. The SVP came to For Frederic England and Wales in 1844.



Welcome to the Children's Liturgy Section



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Pastoral Care for Separated, Divorced and Remarried

The Marriage and Family Life Office of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales is committed to listening to the experience of separated, divorced and remarried Catholics. It is intending to make a short testimonial film which will be shown at a closed forum of diocesan Marriage and Family Life workers. If, subsequently, the Bishops' Conference decides there is merit in sharing it more widely, permission of participants will be sought.

Questions will be provided in advance to give participants time to reflect and prepare for a sensitively conducted interview.

First names only will be used in the film and these can be changed if participants prefer. Physical identities can be obscured in the film if participants prefer.

The filming will take place in London and the Marriage and Family Life Office will cover travel or incidental expenses incurred by the participants.

It may be possible for those that would like to participate, but are unable to travel to London, to send in a short written or recorded testimony instead. This would be played or read by a member of Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales staff in the film.

The Catholic Medical Association (CMA) was founded in 1911 as the Guild of St Luke, Cosmas and Damian, later being renamed the Guild of Catholic Doctors. Only doctors and dentists were admitted as members until 2006 when it was again renamed the Catholic Medical Association and became open to all Catholic healthcare professionals, hospital chaplains and managers.

agers. The CMA helps integrate faith into clinical practice by: - Representing Catholics in the medical community

- Creating and organising educational resources and events

- Acting as advocates for members of the Church and medical profession in public forums

Providing guidance for bishops, politicians

and others on healthcare ethics and policySupporting the next generation of doctors

and healthcare workers The Sheffield Branch covers the whole of the Hallam

diocese. Regrettably in recent years the number of members has dwindled and now stands at approximately twelve, all of them being doctors and no other health care professionals. We hold an Annual General Meeting at the University of Sheffield Catholic Chaplaincy, where we discuss events of topical importance. We are involved in teaching medical ethics in the medical course at the University of Sheffield. Topics covered recently include palliative care with stress on end of life care; organ donation and transplantation and termination of pregnancy. We have also held talks on embryo research, stem cell research and the role of Roman Catholic chaplains in war situations. We seek to encourage students to attend these talks.

We are keen to establish a more active branch which includes not

only doctors and dentists, but other healthcare professionals such as nurses, physiotherapists, pharmacists and others. At the present time the medical profession is faced with many new developments and trends in

modern health and social policy. These include such controversial issues as embryonic stem cell research, assisted conception, transplantation ethics, living wills, care pathways and euthanasia. We are also faced with financial restraints and limitations in healthcare. We need the help and advice of the Catholic Medical Association in responding to these within the teachings of the Church.

Our aims are to provide professional support, informed opinion and an effective voice making itself heard at the highest government level. We can only do this by increasing our numbers and becoming more active. At national level our local President, Dr Steve Brennan, is the National Secretary of the Catholic Medical Association and attends national meetings.

The Catholic Medical Association also publishes the Catholic Medical Quarterly which has an international reputation as a leading Catholic healthcare journal, providing articles on key issues in medicine, helping to support healthcare professionals in their practice and


exploring such topics as conscience in contemporary healthcare. Conscience is particularly important and the Catholic Medical Association can assist in ensuring that the rights of healthcare professionals to object to participating in procedures against human life are legally protected.

At a time when Catholics in healthcare are facing difficult decisions, it essential to have a focal point for advice. We ask healthcare professionals in the Diocese to seriously consider joining the Sheffield Branch. Standard membership for doctors and dentists is \pounds 50pa, with a concessionary rate of \pounds 30pa for those who are not higher rate tax payers. Student rate is \pounds 10pa.
