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
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# **Ordinations** to the permanent Diaconate of the **Diocese**

# Response following Supreme Court ruling to back agreed end of life decisions

The UK's highest court has ruled that legal permission will no longer be required to end care for patients in a permanent vegetative state.

Bishop John Wilson responds to the Supreme Court ruling to back agreed end of life decisions:

"On 30 July 2018 the United Kingdom Supreme Court ruled it is no longer necessary to seek legal permission from the Court of Protection to remove artificial feeding and hydration from patients in a persistent vegetative state. This means that clinicians and families can decide among themselves to bring about a patient's death by discontinuing the provision of food and water by artificial means.

A person in a persistent vegetative state exists in an altered state of consciousness following some kind of trauma. The person breathes without assistance and follows patterns of sleeping and waking, although without any detectable external response. They are not dying as such, but remain dependent on medical and nursing care.

The Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales addressed the question of artificial feeding and hydration in cases of patients in a persistent vegetative state in their 2004 teaching document Cherishing Life. In considering the ethics of suicide and euthanasia, the Bishops stated: 'There is a basic level of nursing care that is demanded by human solidarity. We all recognise that leaving a patient cold, unclean, in pain or without human contact for significant periods of time would fall below a decent standard of care. Within the health service,

great efforts are made to maintain high standards in this area, despite the pressure of resources and limited staff. In general, providing food and fluids should also be considered basic care.' (185)

The Bishops continued: 'when patients are in the final phase of dying they should not be troubled by intrusive treatment and efforts to place or replace a feeding tube may well be excessive or burdensome.' However, they clarified: 'What is not morally acceptable is to withdraw tube-feeding, or other life sustaining treatment, precisely in order to end a patient's life. This would cross the line from reasonable withdrawal of inappropriate treatment into the realm of passive euthanasia.' (185)

No one should underestimate the challenges placed on families and carers when a loved one enters a persistent vegetative state. Sustained pastoral support for them is essential. Artificial nutrition and hydration, however, are not treatment. They do not cure anything. In whatever way they are delivered, food and water for a person in a persistent vegetative state fulfil the same purpose as for any other person. They keep them alive as part of their basic care. They prevent death by malnutrition and dehydration

Patients in persistent vegetative states are some of the most vulnerable in our society. It is not an act of compassion to remove their food and drink in order to cause their death. Equally, it cannot be in patients' best interests, whatever their level of consciousness, to have their life intentionally ended. Our care for those in such situations is the test of our common humanity and our solidarity with some of the most fragile of our brothers and sisters."

# Sharing the Journey in Long Eaton

Helen McElhone, school chaplain writes......

On Thursday 21st June you may have seen a school on the move! All the pupils and staff of English Martyrs' Catholic Voluntary Academy walked in unity to raise awareness of the global refugee crisis.

Last September Pope Francis launched the Share the Journey campaign. He has declared this time a 'unique opportunity for us to press our



governments to make global commitments which place the human dignity of people on the move at their heart. CAFODs response was to invite Catholics in England and Wales to walk the 24,901 miles which is the distance around the world, not because they want us to keep fit but because it is important that all people are aware of the plight of refugees and migrants around the world.



We walked a circular route from our school passing our neighbouring schools on the way, it was a distance of 1.14 miles, when we multiplied that by the number of people who were walking (290) we have walked a total of 330 miles. We have added our total number of miles to the CAFOD totaliser and hope that we have done our bit to influence the decisions of World Leaders when they meet at The United Nations this September to develop new global agreements on refugees and migration.



# Sharing the Journey on NottsTV

Monday morning and a message on the answerphone. Charlotte from NottsTV has seen that we are having a Share the Journey walk this morning and would like to come along and interview us! It wasn't how I was expecting the day to start!

Charlotte arrived and set up her camera and it was great to have our Solidarity display in the background – displaying lots of photos from around the Diocese of the many walks that have taken place.

After the interview we went outside to prepare for our short, 1 mile walk, around the block, making it back in time for Mass in the Convent at 12.30pm





Charlotte walked with us and filming as she went. She also interview Roger Neale, husband of Ann, one of our school volunteers. Roger is recovering from a knee operation and has been adding his recuperating miles to the campaign.

As I write (Thursday 26th July) the totaliser now stands at 83 968 miles, well into our fourth loop of the globe!

# **Sharing the Journey** in Glossop

Well done to our Catholic Community in Glossop! As well as walking for the Share the Journey campaign, staff and students at St Mary's Catholic primary school also managed to raise funds! Headteacher Simon Groake told me; "The whole school rallied round to walk through the town to show our support for the plight of refugees and to raise funds for CAFOD's latest campaign, "Share the Journey". Parents, family members and parishioners joined the children on



their walk. In Norfolk Square we sat and reflected upon the feelings refugees must have. We honoured them with a minute's silence and sang 'When I needed a neighbour' On returning to school, parishioners handed out refreshments for the children after their walk. We hope to have raised £1000 for CAFOD with our sponsored walk. The Liturgy Council organised the whole event to promote the Catholic Life of the School"

What great witness from the parish and school who added 226 miles to the totaliser that day. They also managed to get their 'journey' published in the local paper, the Glossop Chronicle! Fr Greg Tobin, parish priest said, "I was delighted to see such a positive article in the 'Chron' about St Mary's school joining in the CAFOD 'share the journey' campaign. There were some lovely photographs and a form of evangelisation as the school went down into the town highlighting the plight of refugees, and the work of the Church in relieving their suffering through the work of CAFOD"



Other walks have also been organised in the parish so thanks to all involved especially CAFOD parish contact Moira Hind.

CAFOD's target was to walk the 24 900 miles that circumnavigate the globe. As I write today (19/7/18) we have reached 79 220 so we are now on our fourth loop of the globe!

# **Ensuring support for seafarers in Nottingham**



Seafarers often spend months at sea, confined within the space of their ships, with limited human contact other than with their crew mates.

Many also miss out on things like family events, and crew members who are Catholic often have to forego Mass and other sacraments until they reach their next port of call.

In June, Apostleship of the Sea (AoS) Immingham Port Chaplain Steve Willows met the captain and two crew members of a vehicles' carrier when it docked at the port.

It was the captain's first time off the ship since joining. He had been at sea for about five months.

His first words when stepping off the linkspan was "Thank God, I have arrived!". He was so excited to come off the ship and to be able to get away for a few hours.

Steve took them to the Seafarers Centre in Immingham to get some supplies and some lunch. He spent time talking with and listening to them, and they spoke about places in the Philippines where the men were from.

The seafarers then asked if they could go to a local church, so Steve took them to St Mary on the Sea Church, Grimsby.

"When we arrived, Benediction was just starting so it was good that they could be there for that," Steve said.



"After that I took them back to the ship as they had to set sail later that day. The few hours they had away were much appreciated," he added.

The next day Steve received a message from the captain saying, "Many thanks for the opportunity for us to see your beautiful place. Its worth remembering and wonderful. Wish you all the best."

In the Nottingham Diocese, AoS has three port chaplains providing spiritual and pas-


toral support to all seafarers arriving at ports in Immingham, Grimsby and Boston, with great support from parishes, groups and schools.

### FRANKLY SPEAKING

If you live in or have any connection with the Diocese of Nottingham I can most certainly recommend the book published this year whose author is Canon Anthoy Dolan. "Good News For The East Midlands" is a comprehensive story of Catholic Christianity in a large area of England. We are often told by academics that we can learn from history. In his introduction Canon Dolan speaks of "the rush but often unknown spiritual tradition we have inherited" As we approach the Autumn of 2018 we should reflect on the principle aim of the book which is to be a powerful aid in "spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ in the twenty first century."

The month of September is of particular importance this year. The National Eucharistic Conference in Liverpool is a shared pilgrimage and we must pray and hope that any weak batteries will be fully re-charged for all of those attending and equally important to our brothers and sisters far away from Liverpool, geography will not matter between September 7th -9th.

The next few weeks will also witness the start of a new academic year. Earlier this year the Education

Secretary appeared to perform a "uturn" on the issue of Catholic schools and their future. Despite a "firm policy" on faith based admission the 50 percent cap will remain. Not by any means the first time that politics has been a principal factor in education. Throughout Canon Dolans' book we read of the creation of Catholic schools in Victorian times and beyond. In the history of Our Lady and St Edward in Nottingham we read of "the schoolrooms being a stable and hayloft in 1884." In 2018 the latest figure shows 827,000 children being educated in Catholic schools.

The Catholic community is rightly proud of its schools, those who give their time as governors need to develop an even stronger relationship with the clergy and parents. The twenty-first century will continue to present new challenges for our children and teachers, the opponents of Catholic schools are well organised and we need to be the same. We surely owe this to that Nottingham based stable in 1884 and to so many who have been the basis for Canon Dolans book.

# Fr David Cain Leads the Renewal Days for Derbyshire's Extraordinary Ministers

Fr David Cain from St Alban's Church in Chaddesden, Derby, led informative and engaging talks entitled – 'Exploring Our Fruitful Membership of the Body of Christ at Home and Abroad,' for EMs at Our Lady of Lourdes in Mickleover and St Anne's in Buxton. This was done through the medium of Catholic Social Teaching, a topic that could be quite dry but Fr David brought life and heart to the subject and thoroughly engaged us.

The talk was broken down into different sections, with an initial introduction to Catholic Social Teaching (CST), looking at the sources and documents – including rare archival film of Pope Leo XIII from the 1890s, evidence that here was a man ready to embrace new ideas. CST makes clear that we are called to flourish as individuals and as a community and we do that through connecting with others, by having a vision of how our world could be different if we make particular choices for Christ. Fr David asked us to think about how our choice to become Extraordinary Ministers was an act of service to others and a vocation.

Human dignity must always be respected and Fr David spoke about how we are called to see the face of Christ in everyone. We can sometimes struggle to do this if we have decided we do not like a person or what they represent. But it is precisely at those times that the call is greatest – it is easy to see Christ in one's friends, the tough part is see-

ing Him in our enemies. Fr David recounted the story of buying a pair of shoes through a Fair Trade organisation, and being sent regular updates by the workers on these shoes as they were made. It connected him to the dignity of the workers, they became real people, not just faceless cogs in an impersonal manufacturing process. Though it might not be possible to have that level of contact with the producers of everything we consume, it certainly brings home the point that our needs and wants affect other people. We are called to live in solidarity with others, and look at them through God's eyes. In becoming human, Jesus showed the ultimate act of solidarity with us. When we strive for freedom, we also need to be aware that our actions can limit others' freedom to choose.

Fr David spoke about the importance of true peace, and how this is much more than a mere absence of war. We should all be engaged in an enterprise of justice, a conversion to letting go of what drew us to war and anger in the first place. Ultimately each of us is called to be a reflection of God to others – though it can sometimes feel like an impossible task, Fr David left us feeling a little more well-equipped to do it. The renewal days included a time of Adoration with the Blessed Sacrament and concluded with Mass, where Fr Michael Eastwood gave an uplifting final message.

Fr Peter has for the last six years been taken into the heart of the local Roma Community in Normanton , Derby. As part of the Parish Outreach/Evangelisation programme they are one of a number of groups that receive both practical and spiritual support from the Parish, the Church is in old Normaton, Derby and the local community has changed considerably since the new Millennium.

Fr Peter added "It was a wonderful celebration following the weeks that Karan has spent preparing them, they are lovely people who once a level of trust is found totally embrace you, they remain committed to the Catholic Church and have a strong faith, we are richer in Spirit to have such a diverse and cultural mix amongst our worshipers."

#### Who are the Roma Travelling Community? Origins & History

The Roma originate from Punjab and Rajasthan areas of India. Their ancestors emigrated from India approximately 1000 years ago and travelled through Asia to Europe and later to the Americas. For centuries they maintained a nomadic lifestyle but were forced to settle under the communist regimes of Eastern Europe.

The Roma have faced centuries of discrimination, persecution and forced assimilation. In many countries the Roma remain marginalised, experiencing barriers to employment, education and health. The Roma first came to the UK as asylum seekers. For several years they were subjected to strict immigration and work restrictions, which have greatly impacted their mental health and contributed to distrust towards questionnaires and detailed questions about themselves. Since the EU accessions of 2004 and 2007, the Roma have been coming to the UK as economic migrants.

#### **Religion and Faith**

The Roma Community are predominantly Catholic, Pentecostal & Muslim, they do follow their faith; and often religion is the first point of contact outside their close communities in the country where they are living.

- 3. For the Lord our God shall come, and shall take the harvest home: from the field shall in that day all offenses purge away, giving angels charge at last in the fire that tares to cast; but the fruitful ears to store in the garner evermore.

4. Even so, Lord, quickly come, bring thy final horvest home: gather thou thy people in, free from sorrow, free from sin, there, forever purified, in they presence to abide: come, with all thine angels, come.

AS A YOUNG child my reading, writing and verbal language skills were good. However, I had an unfortunate habit of mispronouncing some words and quite often these were names. My family hooted with laughter when I tried to say the name 'MacLeod 'pronouncing it phonetically (Mac-lee-od), instead of saying Mac-Cloud, and of course the same occurred with the name 'Cholmondeley', (how on earth could this be Chumley, I wondered?) And it wasn't always just a case of a simple verbal blunder either. It was not unknown for me to also misinterpret the sense of a sentence...

#### HARVEST HOME

As summer ends and autumn appears on the horizon, I am reminded of the beautiful Christian harvest hymn 'Come ye thankful people come', which I used to sing at primary school each harvest-time. But you probably won't be surprised to hear that although I loved this hymn, I was always puzzled by the second line of the first verse: 'Raise the song of harvest home'. What, I used to wonder, is a harvest-home? What sorts of people live in one and what does it look like?! And of course, this phrase is also repeated throughout the hymn. It was quite a few years later before I realised that the line, of course, refers to the safe gathering in of the harvest from the land.

When the rest of these lovely verses are read, it quickly becomes apparent that there is so much more to be garnered than the harvested crops, important though this is. We too are gathered in to the Lord as we are nurtured and as we grow both in our life and our faith journeys. And incredibly this is only the beginning, as ultimately our time of harvested maturity will come at the end of our earthly lives, and we will be gathered in by the Lord to be in his own wonderful presence.

#### **PLENTIFUL**

Jesus was, of course, fond of using analogies which referred to the land, food and wine in his parables, to enable his disciples and followers to more clearly understand his teaching and preaching, and in so doing he frequently referenced the harvest. In St. Luke's Gospel, Jesus sends out his disciples in pairs and 'he told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field.' We too are invited to share in the rich and plentiful harvest of God and also to labour to ensure that others are aware of the Lord's call.

And so this autumn, may we raise the song of harvest home with no fear of misinterpretation or mispronunciation as we acclaim 'Jesus is Lord!'

## **Thoughts from Elston Hermitage...**


As I write in the early part of August in our Sunday Gospels for the next few weeks we shall be hearing from St. John's Gospel chapter six and by the time you read this Catholic News edition we shall have journeyed through some of Jesus' clearest and most explicit teaching on the Eucharist. This is most fitting especially this year as during this month of September the Eucharistic Congress will take place in Liverpool and hopefully some of us will be participating physically at this event or otherwise will be marking it in our parishes in some way or another.

For some weeks now in the Gospel we have been following closely the public ministry of Jesus, we have heard of the many miracles he has performed some of these public but mostly in private, he had healed the sick, restored sight to the blind, has cast out demons, we have heard how he had fed a large multitude with just five loaves and two fish - this was a universal miracle performed not just for the benefit of a individual but for many people and for all to see. The miracle of the loaves and fishes is one well known to all and is the greatest sign and wonder which Jesus intended to be a sign to prepare us for something much greater - the miracle of the Eucharist.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church

tells us that the Eucharist 'is the source and summit of our Christian life', it is the summary of all God's work in history - to sanctify the world, to bring us communion with his divine life and to unite us as one family of God in his Catholic Church. It is because the Eucharist is so important that we have been having our attentions drawn towards this great mystery of faith. The Eucharist is a sign that God wants to be with us, that he wants to be part of our lives, it is Jesus -the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist, as we know it, His Body, His Blood, his soul, his divinity. He comes to be with us in every celebration of the Mass and reception of the Eucharist.

In the Gospels Jesus teaches us the supernatural and spiritual truth of the Eucharist - we hear how Jesus took bread, gave thanks and gave the bread to his disciples, we know that the word to 'give thanks' means Eucharist. The Eucharist is the meaning of history, since he created the world God has been guiding all of history toward the coming of Jesus Christ and the revelation of the Eucharist. Every time we receive the Eucharist God is feeding us with his own hands, through the hands of his ordained priests with His own Body and Blood.



The Eucharist then is a remarkable reality that Jesus wants to be with us. During and after the Eucharistic Congress let us reflect on 'Jesus the Bread of Life', let us ask for the grace to be aware of how much God really loves us, let us have a greater faith in the Eucharist, a greater faith in God's love, we need to ask Jesus to 'give us this bread always', the bread from

May our Blessed Mother help us to answer the invitation of Jesus to open the door of our hearts to His beautiful love in the Eucharist.

# Healing for our common home

The little patch of Nottinghamshire outside my window was a sorry sight this summer. But a threadbare lawn isn't the half of it. Across half the globe records were broken for heat, drought and wildfire. The scientists say it is the shape of things to come, and we must cut net carbon emissions to nothing in the next 30-odd

Against this backdrop the Vatican recently convened a conference with no less an aim than 'saving the future of life on Earth'. They heard that much can be done, in politics, finance and technology, but, said Pope Francis, 'all of these actions presuppose a transformation on a deeper level, namely a change of hearts and minds'.

For this 'ecological conversion' people of faith have a life-saving gift - one to receive and pass on. Prayer gives a voice to the world's deepest longings, so it's a good place to start the journey. Pope Francis has called a Day of Prayer for Creation on 1 September each year. It is followed by a worldwide Season of Creation which

will close with the Feast of St Francis on 4 October.

For Sunday Masses during the season, the Nottingham Diocesan Justice and Peace Commission is suggesting some bidding prayers. You can download them from the diocesan website (just type is.gd/NdJSOO into your browser to get straight there).

To go further, take a look at Global Healing, a filmbased event for parishes, groups and individuals. It is receiving its diocesan premier at Blessed Sacrament, Leicester on 29 September! You can download it free from www.ourcommonhome.co.uk. Why not use that as a springboard for seeking a parish award in CAFOD's LiveSimply programme? And at home, look into renewable electricity: almost every parish in the diocese now runs on it – and not a lot of people know that!

# **Parish Well Dressing 2018**

For the thirteenth time a traditional Derbyshire custom was undertaken at one of most northerly parishes in the diocese right next to the River Etherow.
