The label of "Trappist" is among the most exclusive designations of beer worldwide, with only 11 breweries around the globe qualifying for the title.

But that number is about to become 12, with the Cistercian monks at Mount Saint Bernard Abbey in Leicestershire gaining recognition as the first Trappist brewery in U.K. history.


The Leicestershire monks, who previously tried their luck at dairy farming, began exploring the idea of brewing beer in 2013 after they closed their dairy for monetary reasons. Inspired by the brew monks of Norcia in Italy, the U.K. monks visited the Norcia brewery a number of times and decided to move forward with a beer of their own.

After visiting other brew abbeys and conducting five years of extensive research, the monks opted to brew Belgian beer and began experimenting on the feast of St. Lutgard – a saint who was known for surviving on bread and beer during fasts.

"Beer is a good, honest, nurturing drink – our Belgian friends said more than once it should be liquid bread and not coloured water, and that's what we're aiming to live up to," said Dom Erik Varden, abbot of Mount Saint Bernard, according to the BBC.

The monks' first beer is called Tynt Meadow after the location where the monks originally settled in 1835. With a 7.4 ABV, the beer went on sale July 9 at the abbey and be distributed throughout the U.K. by James Clay.

The U.K. monks are a Cistercian monastic community of the Strict Observance in rural Leicestershire. According to their website, their mission is to "affirm a life of work and prayer; of radical discipleship and fidelity to the Gospel, the Rule of Saint Benedict and the Constitutions and Statues of the Cistercian order."

try during 2018. This is a significant decline compared to 2017 when 133 priests were ordained.

Of these 114 priests, 82 are diocesan, including a dozen from new communities or societies of apostolic life. Six are members of the Emmanuel Community while four are from the Neocatechumenal Way.



Pope Francis made an unexpected change in the structure of the College of Cardinals, adding some curial officials to the rank of "cardinal bishops," the highest rank within the college.

The College of Cardinals is structured in three orders, or ranks: the order of "cardinal deacons," the order of "cardinal priests," and the order. There are customarily six cardinal bishops from the Latin Church, who are given a particular ceremonial title as the "titular bishops" of Rome's ancient suburbicarian sees. The dean of the College of Cardinals is also assigned as titular bishop of the Roman see of Ostia.

Eastern Catholic patriarchs who are cardinals are also cardinal bishops.

All three ranks within the College of Cardinals have ancient historical roots. Cardinal deacons were anciently entrusted with the administration of the six offices of the Lateran Palace (the See of the Bishop of Rome, the Pope) and of the the seven departments of Rome, including care for poor.

The cardinal priests were those entrusted with the care of the most ancient Churches in Rome, called "titles," and are by tradition connected with a Roman parish. After ten full years as a cardinal deacon,"a cardinal can "opt" to become a cardinal priest.



A golden episcopal day





The sun came out on 8th June for the celebration of Bishop Peter's Golden Jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood, marking also the Diamond Jubilees of Canon Michael Hazell and Fr Neville McClement, the Golden Jubilee of Canon Bosco Clarke and the Silver Jubilee of Fr David Barrett. (It was also the 40th anniversary of ordination for Frs Kevin O/Connell and Tony Whitfield, and a 25th for Frs Brendan Killeen and Dariusz Bialowas, but there were unable to attend.)

With Archbishop Kevin McDonald and Bishop Ralph Heskett of Hallam joining the Lord Lieutenant of Northamptonshire and the Mayor of Northampton among the guests, there was also a large turnout of priests, deacons, religious, seminarians and layfolk. Bishop Peter's sister Alison and her husband represented his family.

In his homily Bishop Peter reminisced about his childhood. "Every Sunday, when I went to church with my father and mother, John and Alice, and with my brothers and sister, Chris and Alison and John junior, I used to look up at the altar and wish that I could be as holy as the priest; and I wished that I could understand the mystery of our faith like him. Now, from the altar, I look at you and I wish that I could be as holy as you are!"

The day also marked the Feast of the Sacred Heart. The Bishop said "There is an intimate link between the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the ministerial priesthood. But, in this Diocesan Year of Prayer and Vocation, it is good to remember that men called to the particular vocation of the priesthood are called from God's holy people, all of whom are called to a life of holiness and service in a multitude of vocations, responding to the love of God"

The staff at Bishop's House left their ordinary duties and became waiters and waitresses for the day, assisting the caterers who provided an abundant buffet.

On behalf of the Diocese Fr Tony Brennan, Chair of the Council of Priests, presented Bishop Peter with, as the Bishop himself put it, "a considerable cheque, and a new episcopal ring which I can carry with me into retirement."





The relic of St. Edmund Campion This has now become an annual pilwas originally the property of Monsignor Hume of Bedford, RIP and he left it in his will to the Knights of St. Columba (KSC). The relic is normally kept at St Augustine's, High Wycombe.

Some 40 to 50 years ago Monsignor Hume, Father Tiger SJ, and Father Woodard of Our lady of Peace, Burnham, Slough decided to organise a pilgrimage with the Relic for the Canonisation of the 40 English Martyrs.

The Pilgrimage started with Mass in the Tithe Barn at Lyford Grange; where Campion was captured and taken to London for trial. The Relic was to rest at Churches overnight following as near as possible the route Campion took on his way to Tyburn where he was hung, drawn and quartered in 1581. The final Mass was to be said at Tyburn Convent.

grimage in Honour of St Edmund Campion and the Martyrs of England and Wales. This year it started at St. John Bosco in Woodley on 2nd June and is due to end with Mass at Tyburn Convent at 4.00pm on Sunday 22nd July. During this period the Knights of St Columba will be escorting the relic to around 50 different churches where Mass will be celebrated and the relic will be venerated.

The relic was received into the Church of St Teresa of the Child Jesus, Princes Risborough on the morning of Wednesday 13th June where more than 100 people, including pupils and teachers from St Teresa's School attended the 10.00am Mass which was celebrated by Fr Leszek Wisniewski.

After a period of adoration, the relic was due to be transported to the church of St Theresa's at Beaconsfield.

The most significant places on the Pilgrimage are Stonor Park where St Edmund had his printing press, The Grange Lyford where he was captured and Tyburn where he was executed.




