Mexico City



By foot and by bicycle, some 60,000 people arrived at the Guadalupe Basilica in Mexico City on July 22, for a pilgrimage that covered more than 185 miles from Querétaro state.

The pilgrims came in three groups, arriving at the basilica after 17 days of travel. The first to arrive, at around 6:00 a.m. on Sunday, were 300 cyclists, followed by 23,000 women at noon, and then 34,600 men, known as "soldiers of Our Lady of Guadalupe."

Bishop Faustino Armendáriz Jiménez of Querétaro accompanied the faithful for more than 185 miles of the pilgrimage.

support available to women in crisis pregnancies from a booth at the country show- a fair- on July 21. When volunteers and staff arrived the next morning, they say they found their stall dismantled and their property removed from the site.

The annual event was held in Brockwell Park, south London, and was attended by approximately 150,000 people over the course of the weekend. The Life stall did not reflect the values of Lambeth Council and was not in line with the causes the council has been funding and supporting.




There are 900 priests and almost 100 seminarians in the Archdiocese of Czestochowa. But the people of this Polish diocese are praying that more young men will answer a call to the priesthood. This summer, their priests have taken those prayers to the streets.

"The prayer of priestly hearts and feet for vocations" is a prayer pilgrimage chain- a kind of pilgrimage relay- through the parishes of the archdiocese, begun on July 16, and concluding August 20. Each day of the pilgrimage chain, priests from one deanery, or region, of the archdiocese will walk from parish to parish, while praying the rosary and fasting for vocations to the priests.

Each day's journey is a walk of between 12 and 25 miles, according to the archdiocese, during which a priest carries a wooden cross inscribed "Jesus, I am looking for you," along with relics of Pope St. John Paul II or St. Therese of the Child Jesus.

Lay Catholics have joined those priests who have already completed a day's journey, walking along between towns and joining in the recitation of the rosary.



A bill has been introduced in the Italian parliament which would require the visible display of crucifixes in public buildings, Italian news magazine L'Espresso reported Monday.

The bill, "Dispositions concerning the display of the crucifix in schools and in offices of public administration," proposes crucifixes be visibly hung in places such as schools, universities, prisons, public offices, consulates, embassies, and ports.

The proposal would also order a fine of up to 1,000 euros (\$1,169) for non-compliance. The bill now waits to be scheduled for discussion in the Chamber and S

It was introduced by the country's Lega Nord party, headed by Matteo Salvini, the newlymade interior minister and deputy prime minister alongside the leader of the Five Star Movement, Luigi di Maio.

Italy's general election, held in May, resulted in a coalition government led by Lega Nord and the Five Star Movement, both of which are center-right populist parties.

A similar regulation was recently made in Bavaria.

Bonding squares are made in pairs so that one can be placed with the baby and the other against the parent's skin. They are swapped at every visit.







Athletics season to remember

At the Milton Keynes School Sports Partnership (SSP) June meeting Bishop Parker School fielded a very strong team to compete with all the schools in Milton Keynes in the heats. The top 16 winners of each event were invited back to take part in the Milton Keynes Athletics Finals at Stantonbury Athletics Field famous for training gold medal winner Greg Rutherford.. Bishop Parker School is a small primary school and achieved a total of 14 finalists which is a very high number.

Bishop Parker had three relay teams that reached the final eight across the primary age range. The Year 5/6 relay team won their race by a full 5 seconds and broke their own personal best time by a long way. This relay team were one of the teams who qualified for the finals. The pupils were very excited and so successful that they have received a further invitation by Milton Keynes Athletics Club to carry on their athletics training there. This is a major achievement and the boys are very proud of themselves. The SSP organisers of the athletics meetings said 'The Bishop Parker relay team are the best primary aged relay team seen in a very long time at these competitions. Thrapston gets its pipes

Nearly 40 years ago, with the then parish priest Fr Pat McAleenan (RIP),

I drove to a Buckinghamshire parish, deep in the south of the Diocese to collect a small electronic 'Miller' organ with its tall speaker, a good instrument of it's kind, which has served the parish quite well until now.

Last autumn, I heard of a two manual/pedalboard organ being thrown out by a school in Staffordshire. In fact when I first saw the instrument it had been rescued by the former head teacher who had reassembled it in his living room! Clearly in need of repair, I transported the instrument to Kenneth Tickell Organ Builders in Northampton where, until their recent closure, I had been working part time. Whilst the Organ Case and Pipework were in good order, the electric action needed replacement. A new control panel made by Solid State Organ Systems (Suffolk) was installed by independent expert Michael Latham and, once in Thrapston, was revoiced and tuned by Simon Brown (Arc Voicing Ltd).

Whilst a very small organ, actually with only two contrasting ranks of pipes, being an 'extension' instrument it has a remarkable range of sound created by the 'mutations' on the two manuals thus enabling real organ music to be played in St Paul's for the first time, a worthy accompaniment to our liturgy!

An Inaugural Recital, Saturday 29th September, 7.30pm will be given by Christopher Weaver, (organist - Northampton Cathedral) together with invited Chamber Choir. Organ Recital tickets - £8 Adults (children free) includes refreshments. Contact: vincedavy@hotmail.com, 01832 733586





Recalling town scouts

A Northampton Scout group which has provided training opportunities, fun and adventure to many thousands of boys is searching for former members to help them mark their 100th anniversary.

The search is on for people who once belonged to the 5th Northampton St Mary's RC Scout Group to join in a reunion celebration on 20 October this year (2018), at which VIP guests will meet and mix with Scouts and leaders past and present.

An afternoon of displays, competitions and exhibitions will be the background to reminiscing on a grand scale.

Group Scout Leader Mrs Dolores Behan said they are hopeful of tracking down large numbers of former members from across the generations, including descendants of Tom Pepper, the man who started the group in 1918 at the end of the First World War.

"It will not be easy because these days society is so mobile and people move away all over this country and beyond to work and establish their families. But we're hoping there will be some kind of natural network of former members who know the whereabouts of other people and can help us get in touch with them. We'll also be relying on parents and relatives who are still around," Mrs Behan added.

The 5th St Mary's RC was attached to Northampton Cathedral, but being the only Catholic Scout group for most of the time, attracted members from all over the town. From small beginnings it flourished and over the last 100 years had played a significant part in the development of Scouting in Northampton as a whole.

Wearing their black and gold neckerchiefs with a specially designed papal badge and distinctive navy shorts and khaki shirts, they were always visible at district events and were known for their high standard of behaviour and training, achieving an impressive record in local competitions and events.

At group level they were also adventurous and progressive and very many young men had membership of the Scout movement to thank for their start in adult life and their success in their chosen career.

This year's Pontifical Academy for Life General Assembly took place in the Vatican on 25th/26th June, the workshop is an annual meeting for members of the Academy and for those with a specific interest in issues related to Bioethics. As a student of bioethics at Cardiff University, Fr Allan R. Jones, CRIC, assistant parish priest in Daventry, was present for the meeting. This two-day event consists of four sessions of lectures, with panel discussions and formal and more informal opportunities to ask questions from the panellists. The panellists are leading experts in a variety of disciplines coming under the umbrella of bioethics from across the globe, from Argentina to Japan, from economics to medical science.

On the Monday morning before the Workshop began, Pope Francis addressed the participants and set the scene for the event. The Pope said: "When we give children over to poverty, the poor to hunger, the persecuted to war, and the elderly to abandonment, do we not ourselves do the "dirty work" of death? Where vobotics and the questions that robotic techdoes this dirty work of death come from? It comes from sin". An underlying theme

throughout the workshop was the Holy father's encyclical Laudato Sí, and his teaching regarding ecology, in its widest sense. The encyclical teaches that ecology concerns planet earth as 'our common home,' and that human beings, the way we live our lives, our ethical choices, both great and small, have an impact upon our world. Whilst there have been criticisms with the widening of the remit of the Academy from issues concerning the beginnings and the end of life alone, these issues exist in a wider context, our respect for the human person from the very beginning of life until its natural end, has consequences for how we live and how we treat others.

The time at the workshop passed by far too quickly, we had not expected to have the opportunity to meet the Holy father individually, which was a great blessing for us all. The workshop provided much stimulus in our thoughts and for our everyday research and work, and many of us will be counting down the days until next year's meeting, which will focus on nology raises in the filed of bioethics.
