EXCITING NEWS FROM ROME

Pope Francis has instituted a new Sunday dedicated to celebrating the Word of God. In a Motu Proprio – titled 'Aperuit illis', Pope Francis has declared the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time the 'Sunday of the Word of God'. This will typically take place in late January.

Making the announcement in his Motu Proprio, Pope Francis wrote:

"I hereby declare that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is to be devoted to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God... It is important, however, that in the Eucharistic celebration the sacred text be enthroned, in order to focus the attention of the assembly on the normative value of God's word. On this Sunday, it would be particularly appropriate to highlight the proclamation of the word of the Lord



After Mass there was standing room only in the social centre where a collection of photographs had been collated into a slide show outlining the history of the parish. While



Mini Vinnies on the Memorial Feast Day of St Vincent de Paul



On 27th September the feast day of St Vincent de Paul, the Mini Vinnies patron, a selection of pupils represented our school attending Mass in Northampton.

After Mass, the children had refresh-

ments and an opportunity to meet with parishioners in the Church Hall, including the President and Secretary of the Sacred Heart Conference of the SVP.

Fr Jerry, parish priest at Sacred Heart, came to speak to the children after Mass and asked them, "How can you help the poor?" Sophie recognised that people can be poor in spirit, as well as having a financial need.

Fr Jerry reminded the children to always pray for others who have less than you, for example, "When you are getting into your parents' car, pray for those who have to walk in the cold and wet to reach the places they need to go." Benjamin suggested that we should pray for those who cannot attend school and Sophie added, "When you pray, God will help them."

All of the children agreed that, as Mini Vinnies, prayer was something they could commit to, to help others who are less fortunate than them.

The Mini Vinnies are looking forward to a new set of projects this year to raise money for those less fortunate than us and to spending time with those that it will make a difference to, in our local community.

FIRST LIVE SIMPLY AWARD FOR A DIOCESAN SCHOOL

St Bernadette's has been spending the last year working towards carrying out all the actions in their action plan to achieve the LiveSimply Award.

The three significant actions in the plan were:

- To Live Simply To develop an outdoor space for prayer and contemplation. The school built a beautiful prayer garden, designed by the Chaplaincy Team, featuring Our Lady of Lourdes and St Bernadette. This is used every day for prayer, quiet times and reflection.
- To Live Sustainably with Creation
 The school's eco-Mini Vinnies and the Junior Park Rangers have been so busy caring for God's creation. They have promoted 'Switch off Fortnight', community litterpicks and recycling across the school. The school is now a paperless school when communicating with parents. The school is also saving energy and reducing the school electricity bill. The school regularly runs 'switch off fortnights' when all make a concerted effort to switch off all unnecessary electrical devices.

Eco-monitors make sure all electrical resources are switched off when pupils are not in the classroom and pupils are encouraged to tell others to do the same at home. Parents have reported that their children spread this important message to others outside of the school community.

3) To live in solidarity with the poor and vulnerable. St Bernadette's school community places service at the centre of their mission. They are always looking for opportunities to support the vulnerable both within the local community and beyond. The SVP Make a House a Home project for young homeless families, the Winter night Shelter, MK Foodbank, a local care home and local dementia club are just some of the local charities that they support. They have also recently sponsored a guide dog puppy; supported the development of a school in Ghana; raised funds for a care home for sick children in South Africa and worked on various CAFOD projects.

CAFOD volunteers, Peter Haddon and Graham Ryan visited the school on 1st October to collect evidence to make sure all three key aspects of the action plan had been carried out.

After a full morning of rigorous evidence gathering, the assessors were able to confidently conclude that St Bernadette's Catholic Primary School had achieved the LiveSimply Award. A beautiful wooden plaque was presented to the school to display in pride of place in front of the school chapel.

RIP SR GENEVIEVE DEVERAUX

Sister Genevieve Devereux, who died at the age of 95 at the Convent of Jesus and Mary, Felixstowe, on 12th September, worked for long years in our diocese.

She was, first of all, an enthusiastic and energetic teacher in Ipswich, imparting a love of science to her pupils, sharing her breadth of learning with all and leading courageously by her example of humanity and faith.

She brought with her these same qualities in 1971 when appointed as head teacher at Thornton College.

It was due to her gift of working with others, both accepting advice and sharing her vision with them, that she was able to ensure the continuance and dynamic growth of the school.

Deeply imbued with the spirit of her foundress, Sr Genevieve was a mother to those in her care. She was greatly loved by staff and pupils alike, only relinquishing her headship when appointed as Provincial Superior.

Alongside her work within the school, she had a very keen interest in the diocese and in the parishes of Milton Keynes, always encouraging collaboration with them and especially in working for the faith development of the young through Celebration.

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THE SECRET IS OUT...









All over the country, the secret is being acted out, and Bedford is no exception. For the last four years priests have been celebrating Sunday Mass in the Extraordinary Form every week at Christ the King, which has grown from 16 people at the first Latin Mass in August 2015 to around 100 every Sunday by September 2019. These are men and women in their 70s and 80s, young adults, teenagers, children,

babies a few weeks old. They come from far and wide, even as far as Norwich, 100 miles away.

What is the attraction? In this age which is marked by noise, change and uncertainty, there is a deep desire in many hearts for silence, stability and clear teaching. All these are to be found in the traditional Latin Mass, which has remained virtually unchanged for many hundreds of years, and which has nourished the faith of the saints and countless others down the ages.

Most people attending a traditional Mass for the first time are struck by the silence as they enter the church. The Mass gives inspiration and space for private thought and prayer. The beautiful vestments, the incense and the precise actions of the celebrant leave one in no doubt that something other-worldly and very special is happening. The transubstantiated Host, the Body of Christ, is handled by the priest alone and received directly onto the tongue of the communicants while kneeling if able. After Mass the congregation remains silent in thanksgiving before leaving the church or staying on for the Rosary.

THE SOCIETY FOR THE PROTECTION OF UNBORN CHILDREN



The Society for the Protection of Unborn Children (SPUC), is the oldest pro-life campaigning and educational organisation in the world.

The Society was founded in January 1967 to oppose the abortion bill being debated in

Parliament at the time. That bill would go on to become the 1967 Abortion Act, while SPUC became the UK's first and largest pro-life group.

SPUC is a grassroots organisation. With over 100 branches and 45,000 supporters across England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland it is the largest pro-life group in the UK.

Abortion is the biggest killer of children in the world today, and has tragically claimed the lives of over 9 million children in the UK since the passing of the 1967 Abortion Act.

SPUC works to protect human lives at the national and local level, and to build a society free from abortion. As well as fighting abortion, the society also campaigns against other direct threats to the lives of vulnerable

individuals, such as euthanasia and embryo abuse. It recognises the need to have a consistent life ethic - to value the lives of all human beings equally - and the foundation of this must always be recognising the humanity of the child in the womb.

There is now a branch of SPUC in Northampton that meets regularly at St Gregory's Catholic Church, Park Avenue North, Northampton. The group is keen to have more members in order to promote its pro-life message. Please consider joining the group or attending a meeting in order to see what we do. We promise that you will not be asked to do anything you do not want to, as just having you there with us will be encouragement for us. 





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CONSECRATION MASS IN DAVENTRY



Forty-seven years since it was blessed, Bishop Peter dedicated the refurbished church of Our Lady of Charity and St Augustine's, Daventry.

Mass begun with the sprinkling of holy water, a reminder of our baptism and a symbol of our repentance. The sanctuary was full of clergy; former parish priest Mgr Sean Healy was joined by Deacon David Smith, who himself recently left the parish to move north. Alongside current parish priests Frs James Cassidy and Alan Jones was the Superior General of the Canons Regular of the Immaculate Conception, the religious community that Frs James and Alan belong.

The rite begins with a litany of Saints before relics are placed beneath the alter. In Daventry the relics of four saints were placed; St. Damien of Molokai, St. Francis de Sales, St. Henry Garnett and St. Maria Gorretti. The annointing of the alter and walls of the church follows the prayer of dedication. As a symbol of our prayers rising to heaven, a brazier of burning charcoal is placed on the alter. Finally, as a reminder of the Church's mission to bring Christ into the world, the candles around the church a lit. A special liturgy full of symbolism.

Bishop Peter reminded all present that already the church in Daventry had witnessed so many encounters between Christ and his people:

"It is the place where we kneel in prayer, where we listen to the God who speaks to us in the Scriptures, where our relationship with God is formed and developed in the sacraments and, above all, where the sacred mysteries of Christ's death and resurrection are at the centre, are the beginning and the end, made present at each and every Mass".

NEW NATIONAL SAFEGUARDING REPORT

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
