On the 8th December at 11.00am Northampton Cathedral will host the patronal Mass of Our lady Immaculate. The many titles of Mary shed light onto different aspects of our Mother and 'Immaculate' is no different. The solemnity of the Immaculate Conception reminds us that Mary, in preparation for being the Mother of Jesus was preserved from original sin from the moment of conception.

Our Lady Immaculate was chosen as a patron for our Cathedral because it was a title officially recognised by Pope Pius IX in 1854 only a few years after the establishment of our Diocese of Northampton in 1850.

The Mass will be live streamed from our Cathedral and can be viewed on our diocesan website.



REGULATOR

ROME PILGRIMAGE FOR SCHOOL RE LEADERS

The RE Subject Leaders from the primary schools in our Diocese were welcomed to Rome by Fr Kevin McGinnell during the final weekend of October.

The pilgrimage involved many trips to significant churches across the city for example: San Giovanni in Laterano, the Pope's Cathedral; San Luigi ei Francesci, which houses Caravaggio's painting 'The Calling of St Matthew' and San Giorgio in Velabro-Newman's title church as cardinal. Here, Fr Kevin led us in a reflection,

praying that, with God's help, we are guided in our own missions. Fr Kevin was relentless in his commitment to making the most of every moment, ensuring we visited every church on his list - walking in excess of 75km across the weekend.

We celebrated Mass in honour of St John Henry Newman in the College Church of the Venerable English College; a site steeped in history, starting life as a pilgrim Hospice before becoming a seminary. Forty four former students have been martyred and above the altar in the church hangs the Martyrs' Picture, painted in 1583 by Durante Alberti.

The group had the opportunity to visit the Vatican on several occasions, where we had the privilege of celebrating Mass at the tomb of Pope Saint John XXIII in St Peter's Basilica.

Dominique Smith, from The Good Shepherd, Northampton, delivered the prayers on behalf of the school communities of several of our schools to the Pope's police force. We hope that these will have reached Pope Francis to include in his own prayers.

One of the highlights of the whole trip was attending the Angelus with Pope Francis on Sunday, at the end of the Pan-Amazonian Synod. He told us to listen to the voices of the poor and the young, asking us to be conscious of the needs of others before ourselves: a message we

will bring back to our own schools to share with the children, staff and wider community.

This pilgrimage has not only been a spiritually uplifting experience for the Primary RE Subject Leaders, but has also been an opportunity to develop better links across our schools, which, in turn, will further opportunities to share good practice across our Diocese.

We thank Fr Kevin for his determination in being an excellent guide when showing us the city where he studied and worked; Anne-Marie McIntosh, Primary RE Adviser, who masterminded the trip and the Sisters of Maestre Pie Filippini, who gave us a wonderful welcome to Rome and made our stay comfortable. We look forward to sharing all we have learned and experienced with the children, staff and communities in our schools.



A NEW UK CITIZEN FOR HIGH WYCOMBE



FIRESTARTERS' GATHERING

In 2017, on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the birth of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal (CCR), Pope Francis told those gathered in Rome for the celebrations that the mission of CCR, as a 'current of grace', is to share the Baptism of the Holy Spirit with all those in the Church. He echoed this in June this year when he established CHARIS, a Public Association of the Church, established to serve CCR across the world. On that same occasion Fr

Raniero Cantalamessa, the preacher to the papal household, said: "Legally, we are his children through baptism, but experientially we become his children thanks to the action of the Holy Spirit that is ongoing in our lives." It's this sense of experience that helps us understand what the Church means by the term, baptism in the Holy Spirit. As the word 'baptism' literally means, we are to be immersed in the love of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.



On 5th October, leaders from CCR across the Diocese gathered in Flitwick to consider this commission that Pope Francis had given us. Each of us reflected on our own lives, and where we had encountered Jesus as a friend, and what difference that had made.

Building on that we spent much of the day in prayer for each other and for the diocese, that all of us - as the people of God in Northampton - would grow ever more open to the work of the Holy Spirit and the difference he wants to make in all our lives; to grow in confidence in the knowledge that "God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us" (Rom 5:5). The question that each of us was left with, as we seek to be obedient to Pope Francis, was how we might share this current of grace, this outpouring of the Holy Spirit, this Baptism in the Holy Spirit, in our parishes and local communities. Trusting in the Lord, it remains a work in progress, so we continue to pray in hope: Come O Holy Spirit; Jesus we trust in you.

They were one of 8 parishes to unite their Mass, Rosary and Exposition with others in the in the Diocese as we petition for this great cause. The Rosary Link unites such prayer around our Diocese on a quarterly basis.

Taking Our Lord at His word,
The Rosary Link for Vocations
was established in December
2004 at Our Lady of Perpetual
Succour, now our Diocesan
Shrine, as a collaboration
between Fr Damien Walne and a
parishioner from
Wellingborough.

The aim was simple: to pray for vocations by offering the Mass and the Rosary with Exposition. This has flourished over the last 15 years so that there has been a yearly average of 30 such gatherings around our Diocese in recent years, some attended by Bishop Peter who has been supportive and also encouraged by so many people across the Diocese who have been united

in this initiative.

As Father Andrew Behrens said at one such gathering at St Gregory's in Northampton, the effort we put in to praying for and nurturing vocations will be told in the results: the more effort and care, the greater the results. Whilst the cause for vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and religious life is a specific apostolate, Fr Andrew also reminded us all of our own unique and God given vocation in every walk of life; 'Whatever your work is, put your heart into it as done for the Lord and not for human beings...' Colossians 3:23

We believe that God has indeed heard our prayers and have been delighted that numbers of seminarians have steadily increased and maintained since 2004. We are blessed in this diocese to have many dedicated new priests including most recently Fr David Donaghue.

Fr Damien, our Chaplain, died in March 2015 and undoubtedly continues as an advocate in heaven. The Rosary for Vocations has continued and you are most welcome to join us for any of these local dates (some offering refreshments afterwards!).





AN OLD CHURCH WITH A VIBRANT COMMUITY





Last month I was invited to visit Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Aston Le Walls. The priest in charge, Fr James Evans had invited me to see the oldest church in our Diocese. Attending Mass in this small village on the edge of our Diocese, it became clear that the building may be old, but the congregation are vibrant, welcoming and faith filled.

Sacred Heart has had continuous service of a priest for almost 300 years! The church of the Sacred Heart was opened in 1827 and the school room next door four years later. Bishop Amherst, the second Bishop of Northampton consecrated the church in 1859. The church had a facelift in 1982, when marble chippings were added to the exterior. The church was extended in 1991, and therefore closed for several months. At the same time, the gallery was extended to increase capacity and Mass was celebrated at the local Anglican Church. Since 1688, there have been 33 priests resident or connected to the parish.



On the day I visited, it was Mission Sunday and Fr James, encouraged the parish to be church of mission, looking outward so that more people can know of the work and love of God. As a visitor, I was welcomed and introduced to many people and invited afterwards for coffee in the old school room. The servers were smartly dressed and clearly very proud to be serving Mass under the guidance of an excellent Master of Ceremonies in this most beautiful building. It was a joy to be part of a church community that smiled at visitors and clearly enjoyed the jokes of their pastor before, during and especially after Mass!







PEACE RESTORED

On a dampish Saturday morning on 12th October, Monsignor Tony McDermott rededicated the restored cemetery of some 80+ Sisters who had lived and taught many generations of pupils of the former convent school(demolished in 1975).

The restoration project was a joint effort by both the local borough council and the Notre Dame 'Old Girls' Association, the latter having worked tirelessly to fund raise and then organise both the event and a splendid reception which followed in the adjoining Friends(Quaker)Meeting House.

Among those present at the service were David Laing, Lord Lieutenant of Northamptonshire, the Mayor of Northampton, Cllr Choudary and three Sisters of Notre Dame, English Province.

Between 80 to 100 former pupils, some with their spouses also attended.



Following the ceremony, Monsignor Tony, who has now retired as the chaplain to the local Association, was presented with a cheque in recognition of his long service and support. Both Mr Laing and others present were loud in their appreciation of the NDA Association in keeping alive the spirit of the school's dedication to the history of first-class education in Northampton.

BUILDING RELATIONSHIP

This year our Diocesan safeguarding commission has been focussed on developing links with victims and survivors of abuse in our Church. It is hoped that these links will be a support for the victims as well as aiding the learning of our Diocese in the best ways of walking with those who have suffered at the hands of those in our communities.

For many years, Bishop Peter has met with victims and survivors both as Bishop and prior to his installation as Bishop. Recently, he has set more time aside in his diary to meet with those affected by abuse, either victims and survivors or their friends and supporters. A victim and survivors advisory group has been set up to guide the commission in their work.

The commission felt that it was important to accompany all those affected by abuse in prayer and therefore, a Mass with a focus on them was developed. It is hoped that the Mass will become an annual date in the diary and that many more members of our communities will come to stand in solidarity with our brothers and sisters.

After communion, each person present was invited to light a candle and place it at the foot of the cross as a symbol of Christ the Light of the World and Healer of All. Fr Francis Higgins celebrated the Mass and led those present in the prayer for healing:

God of endless love, ever caring, ever strong, always present, always just: You gave your only Son to save us by the blood of his cross. Gentle Jesus, shepherd of peace, join to your own suffering the pain of all who have been hurt in body, mind and spirit by those who betrayed the trust placed in them Hear the cries of our brothers and sisters who have been harmed. and the cries of those who love them. Soothe their restless hearts with hope, steady their shaken spirits with faith. Grant them justice for their cause, enlightened by your truth. Holy Spirit, comforter of hearts, heal your people's wounds and transform brokenness into wholeness. Grant us the courage and wisdom, humility and grace, to act with justice. Breathe wisdom into our prayers and labours. We ask this through Christ, our Lord. Amen



Scripture Notes

ISAIAH'S HOPES FOR A SAVIOUR

As the days shorten and we prepare for our celebration of Christmas, the Church gives us the season of Advent to help us get ready for Christ's coming. Although living conditions have greatly changed since Our Lord was born 2000 years ago, our human situation is similar in many ways. Our world is marked by conflict and division, yet we long for all the nations of the world to unite peacefully. Isaiah expresses this hope, which we believe becomes possible with the coming of Christ.

On the First Sunday of Advent (1st December), we hear Isaiah's vision of the Jerusalem temple raised up on a high hill, with all the nations of the world gathering to worship the one true God. From Jerusalem, God's message of love and peace will spread out to the whole world. In this vision, the nations will convert their military weapons into farm implements and will abandon their preparations for war.

We believe that Christ's coming makes possible this transformation from conflict to peace, because he reconciles us

all. We look on the baby lying in the manger, who softens our hearts from violence and points us to our shared humanity that unites us all.

We hear Isaiah's prophecy of a new king on the Second Sunday of Advent (8th December). In today's world of complex problems, we need the wisdom of this descendant of David, this offshoot from the stump of Jesse.

On him will rest God's Spirit, bringing gifts of wisdom and understanding, counsel and fortitude, knowledge and fear of the Lord. Baby Jesus will grow up to offer us God's wisdom, lived out with fortitude. By dying and rising again, he will enable us to receive the Holy Spirit who will give us these gifts. During Advent we pray for the Holy Spirit to make us new.

The Isaiah reading that we hear on the Third Sunday of Advent (15th December) offers a wonderful vision of the desert blooming with wild flowers and God returning to his people. As a result, the eyes of the blind will be opened,

and the lame will leap like a deer.

In our world of today, many people long for health of mind or body. When Christ came to this earth, he cured the physically blind and the lame. He also healed those blinded from seeing God or from recognizing their neighbour. He restored spiritual strength to those incapacitated by sins committed or hurts received. Our Lord still has the power to heal us today in body, mind or spirit, if we turn to him.

Finally, on the Fourth Sunday of Advent (22nd December), we hear Isaiah's prophecy of a royal baby who will have the name of Emmanuel, "God with us." In the prophet's own time, the people of Jerusalem faced a crisis of leadership. Many longed for a new king to guide them wisely into the way of peace. Isaiah promised that a maiden would give birth to a child, who would be a sign of God's presence with his people. In its original context, the prophecy probably referred to King Hezekiah, who became a wise and strong king for the people of Jerusalem.

But in Matthew's Gospel, the fulfilment of the prophecy goes beyond human expectation, because it is a virgin, Mary herself, who will give birth to the Saviour. Her child will be more than a sign of God's presence with us—he will be God's own Son living on earth. The royal child to be born will be not merely a human like us. He will receive the name Emmanuel, meaning "God with us." Whereas God was with the people of Israel in the Jerusalem temple, he now comes among us in a small baby. As St John reminds us: "The Word was made flesh and dwelt among us."

In today's tumultuous word, we long for peace and wisdom, for healing and good leadership. Christ can give us these gifts through his coming among us. Ultimately, he can lead us from the weakness of our earthly lives to the glory of heaven. And so, our Advent prayer is simple: "Come Lord Jesus, come and save us."




