FR WILSON SEBASTIAN RIP

Please pray for Father Wilson Sebastian who died very suddenly in Kettering on Thursday 7th November. Aged only 51 at his death, his sudden passing came as a huge and unexpected shock. Fr Wilson had been Assistant Priest at Kettering since September 2018, prior to which he served the congregations at Our Lady's, Corby. Fr Wilson was from the Syro - Malabar Archeparchy of Changanacherry in Kerala, South India. Bishop Peter celebrated the Funeral Mass at St Edward's on Friday, 22nd November and was joined by priests and parishioners from across the Diocese and beyond.

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DIOCESAN ADVENT REFLECTION DAYS



A wonderful Advent Day of Reflection with folk from across the Diocese at St Joseph's Gerrard's Cross. The theme for the day was the "God Who Speaks" - linking to the Year of the Word 2020.

We listened to Fr Matthew Blake OCD who gave two inspiring and encouraging talks during the day, which provided an introduction and historical context to the "God who Speaks ' by using references to scripture, the Lord's Prayer and Jesus's life – asking us to consider: Where is God in our lives ?

How God speaks to us through the Word, forming a relationship with us

How the Word of God changes us and has the power to transform our lives

Trust God when we do not see the next steps

Jesus in our hearts and minds...by our reading scripture He is forming us.

"The Freedom of Prayer – Face to face with God" prayer station displayed quotes from Jacques Loew and St. Therese of Lisieux – "For me prayer is a surge of the heart...."–, along with various prayer books and reflections. This was a moving and visually stimulating station with colours, lights and a grid of bars. "You do not have to be in prison to be in prison" (Bryn Haworth)

There was an Encounter Prayer station where those wishing to do so were accompanied in their prayers. Other prayer stations included a "Bible corner", "Scriptures to pray with", a station for "Welcoming God's Word into our hearts" in the words of Pope Francis, and the Light of the World and Holy Spirit prayer stations.

Overall the whole day was wonderful, a peaceful retreat to start Advent and by the shared feedback at the closing session everyone found the day enjoyable and helpful.

Thanks were expressed to all those involved with organising the day from the Diocese's Spiritualty network, the St Joseph's Parish team who were great hosts and especially to Fr Matt for his enlightening talks.

The next Spirituality Network event is on Sat 18th Jan at Holy Ghost Luton when Nicholas King SJ, one of our foremost scripture scholars, will give a talk in the morning that will be followed by a meeting in the afternoon of the Network and anyone who might want to join it to plan events for 2020. We were then able to reflect on the talks, questions and our own personal intentions as we visited the different Prayer stations in the adjoining Hall, Oratory and the Church. These stations had differing presentations and time was spent visiting them during the day.

The "O Antiphons" music prayer station and presentation of art was delightful and contrasted to the silent prayer in Adoration in the Oratory.

BISHOP PETER REFLECTS ON THE YEAR...

2019 has seen growth in many areas in the Church in the Diocese of Northampton. With the support of a Project Worker, Marriage and Family Life ministry is developing, the reorganisation of our Catholic schools is being implemented, there have been ordinations to the Priesthood and to the Permanent Diaconate, and in our parishes there is a focus on lay leadership and evangelisation.

Last July, I ordained a priest for the Diocese. How different will be the journey this new priest embarks on from my own experience. In a much more secular environment, the joys and challenges will be different but the call to priestly service is the same. There is a pressing need for vocations to the priesthood, and I am delighted that a young man began his seminary formation last September.

When we are thinking of vocations to the Priesthood, to the Consecrated Life or to Marriage, we have to begin with our families as schools of faith and love and as places of devotion where the culture of vocation is natural. God is calling each of us to something beyond ourselves. Our challenge is to pray and to listen to the voice of God as we discern the future together. a priority in the life of the Diocese. One very positive development is the opportunity to meet with victims and survivors, and for the first time there was a Diocesan Mass for the victims and survivors of abuse in October.

Together with our Catholic Schools, we are on a journey of transition towards new forms of multi-academy trusts. We are at our best when we work together, for each other, in service of the common good, embracing both solidarity and subsidiarity. Our Catholic Schools play a vital role in the life and mission of the Diocese. As ever, the annual Schools' Mass with representatives from most of our schools was a lively and joyous celebration. What a gift and what potential our young people and their teachers are!

Many people participated in a "Catholic Basics" course this year. It is an introductory course designed for those who wish to learn more seeking a bridge to the Catholic Certificate in Religious Studies. The four elements of the course; God, the Church, the moral life, and prayer have been well received. It is envisaged that the course will be repeated in the coming year.

The Bishop's Certificate for Catechesis was launched in

young people through events such as Lux residential weekends, Blaze Confirmation day, leadership programs, pilgrimages, monthly young adult brunches and much more. They continue to support parish youth ministers through training, conferences, informal support and offering resources.

As we seek to develop pastoral ministry in our parishes, I was impressed by the response to our invitation for pastoral areas to spend a day together reflecting on the life of pastoral area. As we consider together our strengths and weaknesses, I am heartened by the generosity of so many volunteers who help to bring alive our faith in their local areas.



Looking ahead to 2020, there are many unknowns, not least, a new Bishop! We ask God's blessing on us all in the Year of the Word. We look forward to the completion of the new Cathedral Centre, hopefully, by Easter. In the Year of the Word, we ask God's blessing on us all and on the initiatives and developments taking shape across the Diocese. Above all, may we act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with our God.

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In May, I offered my resignation to Pope Francis as I have reached the mandatory retirement age of 75. It will be a new adventure for me but, more importantly, as I give thanks for my time as bishop, with the Diocese I am praying for the appointment of a new shepherd.

Executive Headteacher, Garret Fay and school headteacher, Adam Palmer welcomed Bishop Peter and offered him a tour of the school. The exceptional facilities at the school include a high-tech

drama studio and theatre and beautifully designed sports hall. Bishop Peter thanked both Garret and Adam for all their hard work in designing, opening and organising the school to such a high standard. It is clear the difference the school will make to the whole Catholic community in Aylesbury and surrounding villages.



MASS OF REPARATION

The Romans carried out abortions and infanticide, so nothing much has changed from those times until now. The Romans were in a pre-Christian era, we are in a post-Christian era. This means that as Catholics, we need to do everything we can to defend Life. Our actions can have a lasting impact on those facing difficult decisions in their pregnancy. This was the theme of the homily given by Fr Patrick O'Donohue, FSSP, at the Solemn High Mass of Reparation for Abortion on Saturday 23rd

November at the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Bedford. 110 people had made their way to Bedford for the occasion, a significant increase on the same event last year. Some of whom had travelled from London and further afield; some were attending a Latin Mass for the first time and commented on its beauty and reverence.

A Solemn High Mass needs three priests; Fr Patrick O'Donohue was the celebrant, Fr Gabriel Diaz the Deacon and Brother Albert Robertson the Subdeacon. Two of our Bedford servers were joined by three from London and Oxford and the chant was provided by visiting singers. The Knights of St Columba as always were on hand to help.

In pride of place at the front of the church was the Relic Image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This is one of 220 copies of the original in Mexico City and has touched the original, enabling it to confer the same graces and blessings. Many miracles of conception and healing have been reported by those who have venerated our copy of the Image, and many of those attending the Mass of Reparation came forward at the end of Mass to venerate the Image.

This is the second visit by the Latin Mass Society to Bedford and hopefully they will be back next year. Meanwhile, for those in Bedford who appreciate the Latin Mass, this is celebrated at Christ the King, Harrowden Road, every Sunday at 8.30 am.
