#### India

The Bishops of the Indian state of Orissa have decided unanimously to establish "Martyrs Day" and dedicate it to the victims of anti-Christian massacres that occurred in the district of Kandhamal in 2008. As Fides learns from the local Church, the Day will be celebrated in the month of August each year. This is what the five Bishops of the state (of the Diocese of Sambalpur, Berhampur, Rourkela, Balasore and Cuttack-Bhubaneswar) decided during their annual meeting.

So far the local Church had celebrated a "Day of Remembrance" to remember the victims of the massacres.

"Those killed during the anti-Christian persecution in 2008 deserve our commitment, honor, respect and recognition: they died for their Christian faith and witness of Christ", explains to Fides Mgr. Sarat Chandra Nayak, Bishop of Berhampur. Mgr. Simon Kaipuram, Bishop of Balasore, told Fides that "the Episcopal Council of Orissa will ask the Bishops' Conference of India to extend the celebration of the Day the entire nation". "I welcome this decision. We must recognize the dead in Kandhamal in 2008 as martyrs of faith", said to Fides the lav Catholic John Dayal, secretary general of the All India Christian Council (AICC) and member of the National Integration Council of the Government of India. "It is important that the entire civil society in India remembers the massacres of Kandhamal: it is the most ferocious attack that Christians have suffered in history. And the victims have been betrayed by the criminal justice system", added Dayal.

In the violence that broke out on August 25, 2008 in the district of Kandhamal, over 90 Christians were killed, more than 350 churches and places of worship were destroyed, 6,500 houses destroyed, 40 women were victims of rapes and beatings, over 56 thousand Christians were expelled from their villages

#### Rome

Pope Francis has called on European parishes and religious communities to offer shelter to a migrant family. The Pope's appeal came during the Sunday Angelus in St Peter's Square today.

"Every parish, every religious community, every monastery, every sanctuary of Europe, take in one family" he said.

And appealing for this gesture of solidarity, he said this solidarity would start right here in the Vatican where two parishes will take in a family of refugees in the next few days

The Pope said that as we witness the "tragedy of tens of thousands of refugees

that flee death in conflict and hunger and are on a journey of hope, the Gospel calls us to be close to the smallest and to those who have been abandoned".

And reminding the faithful of the upcoming Jubilee Year of Mercy, he said that offering shelter to the needy is a "concrete act in preparation" for the Holy Year.

Turning specifically to European Bishops, the Pope asked them to support his appeal.

#### **Baghdad**

The victims of the 2010 attack on a Catholic cathedral in Baghdad will be put forward for beatification in 2016, a Church leader has said.

Patriarch Ignace Joseph III Younan said he planned to launch the Cause of the 48 victims next year. According to AsiaNews, he made the announcement at the beatification of Bishop Flavianus Michael Melki in Harissa, Lebanon, on Saturday. The attack, which took place October 31, 2010, led to the deaths of 48 Catholics at the Our Lady of Salvation Syriac Chaldean Catholic Cathedral. Among the dead were the two priests who had been celebrating evening Mass in the cathedral at the time of the attack. Speaking out against a perceived lack of protection of Christians in the Middle East by Western nations Patriarch Younan criticised the "passivity of the great powers" that "claim to defend lib-


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# 'I've enjoyed every minute of it'

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# Proclaim

Proclaim 15 is the response of the Bishops of England and Wales to the call to a new evangelisation by Pope Francis, who in Evangelii Gaudium says; "I wish to encourage the Christian faithful to embark upon a new chapter of evangelisation marked by this joy, while pointing out new paths for the Church's journey in years to come".

On 11<sup>th</sup> July 2015 in Birmingham an assortment of laity and Deacons along with 70 priests, 14 Bishops, 2 Archbishops and a Cardinal, totaling 850 in all. The day included workshops, sharing experiences, prayer and culminating in a wonderful Mass presided over by Cardinal Vincent Nicholls. To be with so many other Catholics joyfully singing and worshiping God was a moving and uplifting experience.

We were welcomed by Archbishop Bernard Longley who began by saying began by saying that we must be a welcoming church and that the message of reconciliation had to be a part of our message for today. A tremendous amount of damage has been done to the Church when we fail to speak with integrity. Scandal undermines our message. The renewal of the parish is the primary place of evangelisation and lack of unity with other Christians weakens our message of the gospel. There were several keynote speakers, including Nicky Gumble who has worked so hard to bring Alpha to non-church goers. Michelle Moran, President of the International Catholic Charismatic Renewal Services, and Cardinal Vincent Nichols, Archbishop of Westminster.

We each had three of eleven workshops to attend including a compulsory workshop on Prayer. The main themes were the need to reachout to those who were lapsed and to those who had no knowledge of Jesus and to energise our parishes to be evangalisers. But most important was Prayer and the need to reflect prayerfully before attempting each and every step, not rush-

ing in as we may be tempted to do, because we cannot evangalise successfully in our own power but only with the Holy Spirit working in and through

So what happens now? There are two "Legacy" planned in the Diocese, one at St Gregory's Northampton on Saturday 19th September and another at Immaculate Heart of Mary, Great Missenden on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> October both from 10am to 3pm. More information about these events will be available in the near future if not already, but the main thing is to pass on information and ideas from the Conference so that Parishes can form

their own programmes and teams for the purpose of evangalisation. We are ALL



called to evangalise, so please keep these dates in your diary.

# A Level success at St Paul's



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# Sicilian ordained for diocese

he sun shone brightly, Benedetto D'Autilia was beaming and Bishop Peter was a happy prelate indeed when he visited Saint Aidan's, Northampton on 1st August, to ordain yet another priest for the diocese, the second in a month.

Welcoming everyone to the service, Bishop Peter began with a bi-lingual greeting in fluent Italian followed by the English translation. This was to the evident delight of Anna and Mario, Benedetto's parents as they watched their son being gifted to the Diocese.

Visiting priests from several other diocese, concelebrated the Mass of Ordination, including Auxiliary Bishop Robert Byrne, Cong Orat(B'ham), along with Mgr Giacomo Pappalardo, Chancellor at the Sacred Congregation of the Cause of the Saints in Rome. The Rector and Vice Rector from Oscott, plus Canon Mark Floody and Canon John Udris, along with priest in charge of Saint Aidan's, Fr David C Clark and former parish priest, Mgr Paul Donovan had principal roles. The guest organist, Joshua Crunden, played throughout whilst AMICORUM, a ladies choir, sang beautifully as well as chanting the Litany of the Saints.

The congregation was enlarged with a contingent of parishioners from Saint Winefride's (Holywell), Saint John the Baptist's (Banbury), Saint Thomas Aquinas and All Saints (Bletchley), Saint Philip Howard (Cambridge) and from Saint Bernadette's, Brownhills, Birmingham, where Benedetto had spent some time on placement as a Deacon. Three Bridgettine Communities added a splash of colour as they arrived to take their places. Bishop Peter gave a thoughtful, even challenging address as



well as giving heart-felt thanks to Anna and Mario for the gift of their son to the priesthood (again in both Italian and Eng-

Fr Benedetto's journey to the priesthood began back home in Palermo when he was inspired by a Vocationist priest, Fr Vincenzo Amato, SDV, way back in April, 2005. In due time, Fr Benedetto made his first profession with the Vocationist Fathers at their Welsh community. As he began his priestly studies at Oscott, he became interested in the history of the English Church. It was during an extended placement at Saint John The Baptist parish, Banbury, that he came under the

influence of Canon Mervyn Tower and learned much of the life of the diocesan clergy. In February 2013, Benedetto applied to Bishop Peter, who readily accepted him for the diocese of Northampton. The rest, as they say, is history. Further inspirational guidance was given by Oscott College staff as well as encouragement from Mgr Paul Donovan, then parish priest at Saint Aidan's. Having completed his studies for his STB degree, he graduated, 'Magna cum Laude' (highest honours) which is a no mean feaat for any student to attain!


The day after the ordination, Sunday, second of August, Fr Benedetto celebrated his

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







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# GA EOD

# Canon Patrick Carey

Canon Patrick Carey, died on July 15th in Northwick Park Hospital in NW London a few days after sustaining a fall and fractured skull. He was three days short of his 97th birthday and the oldest priest in the Diocese. Born before the end of the First World War and ordained during the Sec-

ond (1942), he had served at St George's Norwich, St Josephs Aylesbury, Bletchley and then St Ethelbert's Slough (22 years at each), with his final few years of ministry at Bourne End before retiring in 1996. His Funeral Mass was on Friday 31st July at St Ethelbert's, Slough, at 2pm.

# Canon Denis McSweeney





Canon Denis McSweeney died peacefully at his home in Flitwick, in the early evening of 21 July after several months of illness. Having reached the milestone of 40 years in the priesthood, Fr Denis was a man of many talents and interests who dedicated his life of priestly ministry to the diocese of Northampton. He served as parish priest in a number of places.

One of four children born to Owen and Mairead McSweeney of the small country town of Kanturk, Co. Cork, after primary schooling locally he was sent to board at a private school in North Wales. Here his talent for music burgeoned, something that would lead him to one of his great interests in life.

After a period of teaching Music and English, Denis discerned his vocation for the priesthood electing to train at All Hallows in Dublin for the diocese of Northampton. Through his talent for music, he was permitted to leave the almost monastic environment of the seminary for his external studies and would often regale friends with tales of his experiences within the confines of the college and around Dublin in the early 1970s.

Ordained on 15 June 1975, he was called by Bishop Grant to join three other priests at the Cathedral in Northampton. Here his assignment to care for the hospital set the seal on a very important part of Fr Denis's ministry: that of visiting the sick, housebound and those in care homes.

In recent months, he was still maintaining this calling even while unwell. His next appointment as a curate to Kettering and its two communities of Rothwell and Desborough allowed another of his many talents to find expression. Here his sociability and

his desire to per-

form became part of the social life of the communities he served, and a stand-up entertainer was born.

Service with Fr Bustin in Leighton Buzzard for a further two years led Fr Denis to his first appointment as parish priest at Coffee Hall in Milton Keynes. Involvement with the Church of the Cornerstone encouraged his desire to work with other denominations and his fraternal friendship with ministers from all the main churches and faiths. Over the next few years Fr Denis served at John the Apostle in Sundon Park, Fr Francis's Shefford and then he became Dean of the Cathedral. Along this journey of ministry Fr Denis had time to be a chaplain to the TA, join The Royal British Legion and pursue his interest in vintage cars and motorbikes.

Four years of intensive work without the benefit of a curate, though with the support of retired priests, started to take a toll on Fr Denis's health. A diagnosis of diabetes, which grew steadily worse, led to the advice of the doctors to move to a smaller parish. After only a year as parish priest of Beaconsfield, prostate cancer resulted in an extended period of treatment and

convalescence.

In 2006, Fr Denis became parish priest in Flitwick. A visit to his home in Pope Close reveals his interest in collecting the unusual – antique telephones that he made to work, some fine wind-up gramophones, and an eclectic array of artwork. His photographic display featured another of his great loves, his motorbikes, and new parishioners were amazed to hear that he was a biker!

Fr Denis-simply Denis to many friends-was a man of immense wit, practised comic timing, an accomplished musician, expert in celebrating the Traditional Rite (Latin) Mass, a biker, a caring pastoral priest and a sensitive and participative leader of his parish communities. The Flitwick Town Council has recently conferred on Fr Denis the award of Honorary Citizen of Flitwick in recognition of his service in and care of the town, its organisations and its people. He will be missed by the whole of the local community and in the many other places he served.

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#### **Book Review**

### How to get more out of Holy Communion

By St Peter Julian Eymard


Sophia Institute Press www.SophiaInstitute.com

This is a 19<sup>th</sup> century spiritual classic, now reprinted by this enterprising Catholic publishing house, that repays reading and rereading. Tackling how the reverent reception of Communion brings the recipient constantly closer to the source of all love, as well as deepening one's friendship with Christ, are only two of the themes discussed by the author, a saint who, not surprisingly, founded two religious orders to

promote adoration of the Eucharist. Although the author's style seems old-fashioned to modern ears, his advice is penetrating and timeless. In a chapter entitled, "How Communion drives sadness from your soul", he reflects that such "sadness" is common to holy people, advising that "human consolation" is not enough, "especially if God has sent an increase of sadness to test you." The only sure remedy

is Communion, where "Our Lord…enters into us to give divine combat to our sadness." This edition, with its cover painting of St Teresa of Avila receiving Communion, would make an excellent Confirmation present. It is a work combining catechesis and insight into the author's own life of prayer.

He paid tribute to his predecessor, Thalia Milton, saying that she did a "tremendous job of nurturing the school". Simon Detre was previously Senior Deputy Head at St Anthony's School in Hampstead, which is a Catholic prep school. He lives in Chalfont St Peter with his wife and three boys. Before St Anthony's he was Senior Master at Westminster Abbey Choir School. He is also an inspector for the Independent Schools Inspectorate. St Teresa's is an independent prep school and pre-school for girls and boys aged 3-11.

# Requiem for Richard

A Requiem Mass was celebrated in the Anglican church at Fotheringhay on June 13th for the repose of the soul of King Richard 111. The liturgy, entirely in Latin, was celebrated by Oratorian priests, acting as celebrant, deacon and subdeacon. Even the scripture readings were in Latin, and the music sung by the Schola Gregoriana of Cambridge would have been used at the time of Richard's reign.

**Richard III** (was King of England from 1483 until his death in 1485, at the age of 32, in the Battle of Bosworth Field. He was the last king of the House of York and the last of the Plantagenet dynasty. His defeat at Bosworth Field, the last decisive battle of the Wars of the Roses, marked the end of the Middle Ages in England. His death gave the Tudors access to the throne.

After the battle of Bosworth Richard's corpse was taken to Leicester and buried without pomp. His original tomb is believed to have been destroyed during the Reformation, and his remains were lost for more than five centuries. In 2012, an archaeological excavation was conducted on a city council car park on the site once occupied by Greyfriars Priory Church. The University of Leicester identified the skeleton found in the excavation as that of Richard III as a result of radiocarbon dating, comparison with contemporary reports of his appearance, and comparison of his mitochondrial DNA with that of two matrilineal descendants of Richard III's eldest sister, Anne of York. Richard's remains were reburied in Leicester Cathedral on 26 March 2015
