

News beyond the diocese of Northampton



London

Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor, the retired archbishop of Westminster, died on September 1 at the age of 85.The youngest of three brothes who were priests he was ordained for the Diocese of Portsmouth in 1956. After service in parishes, and then as secretary to Bishop Derek Worlock, he was appointed Rector of the Venerable English College in Rome.At the end of his term he was named Bishop of Arundel and Brighton in 1977, and Archbishop of Westminster in 2000. He received his red hat from Pope John Paul that same year and served at Westminster until his retirement at the age of 76.

Hearing of the Cardinal's death Bishop Peter called for prayers for him. He went on: "When I began training for the priesthood in 1962, Cardinal Cormac was the Vocations Director and, after I was ordained in 1968, we were fellow priests in the Diocese of Portsmouth until he became Bishop of Arundel and Brighton

Cardinal Cormac ordained me as Bishop of Northampton in 2005, and has always offered me his warm friendship and wise counsel. May he rest in peace.

With effect from the first Sunday of Advent, two holydays of obligation are being restored. This decision was made by the bishops of England and Wales and has been confirmed by the Holy See.

The days are:

the Epiphany of the Lord on January 6 (transferred to the adjacent Sunday when it falls on Saturday or Monday):

the Ascension of the Lord on the Thursday after the 6th Sunday of Easter.

Pristine

Following a ten year construction period a cathedral-shrine to St. Mother Teresa was consecrated on September 5. The choice of date was intentional as it marked the first anniversary of the canonisation of the saint, as well as the 20th anniversary of her death.

'Divine Providence has made this building possible' said Mgr Lush Gjergij, Vicar General. 'And it is especially thanks to the donations of our faithful and of Albanians abroad'

The building plot was given by Pristine's town Council, with the support of the late President of Kosovo, Ibrahim Rugova. It is estimated that the Cathedral is the largest in the Balkans, 77.40 metres long from the zpse to the arcade, 42.30 metres wide up to the transept, 32.50 metres high, with two large steeples.

There are around 3000 Catholics in Pristina, and only 60,000 in the whole of Kosovo.

'We are all the more grateful for such a beautiful large cathedral, which is a source of joy also for the other inhabitants of the city, most of whom are Muslim' says Mgr Gjergij. In fact the shrine is already a tourish attraction and the bell tower offers a stunning view of the whole city.



The Opera Romana Pellegrinaggi will include the cathedral in pilgrimage iitineraries linked to the life of Mother Teresa, along with Skopje, her hometown and capital of Macedonia; Prizren, where her parents were born; the shrine of Letnica, where she decided to become a nun, and Pristine, which she visited five times.

The highlight of the Centenary Year of Our Lady's apparitions from May to October 1917, has been the canonisation at Fatima on 13th May of Francisco and Jacinta by Pope Francis, who thus became the first children in the history of the Church to become saints in the ordinary course of their family life.

To honour Our Lady, the World Apostolate of Fatima (WAF) has organised Visitations of the National Pilgrim Virgin Statue to the Cathedrals of England and Wales, together with relics of Saints Francisco and Jacinta for veneration, which began on Saturday 18 February, when Cardinal Nichols received, blessed and crowned the Statue in Westminster Cathedral. So many people came, that the doors had to be closed. Since then the dioceses of Cardiff, Southwark, Shrewsbury, Menevia, Nottingham, Plymouth, Arundel & Brighton, Birmingham, Hallam, Portsmouth and Leeds have received the Statue, and the Visitations will continue until mid-October.

In his homily Cardinal Nichols said that devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, so central to her message, "is a way for us to say 'yes' [like she did] from the depths of our hearts ... which is why today we consecrate afresh ourselves, our lives, our country, to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, so that we can always be saying 'Yes' to the Lord, with all our heart, with all our will, from the centre of our being. And only Mary can teach us how to do this."

He also emphasised the importance of the Rosary and of praying it in the family, which he recalled doing as a child.

On the weekend of 30th September and 1st October 2017 the Statue and Relics will be visiting The Catholic Cathedral of Our Lady Immaculate & St Thomas of Canterbury, Northampton, and the highlight of the weekend will be Holy Mass with a postcommunion Act of Consecration to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Mass will be preceded by the enthronement & crowning of the National Fatima Statue, and followed by veneration of the Relics of Saints Jacinta & Francisco, and enrolment & investiture of the Brown Scapular.

There will also be Fatima Talks and devotions over the weekend, including the Rosary. Full details will be published nearer the time at http://www.worldfatima-englandwales.org.uk/visitation.html and also circulated to parishes. Please make a note of the Visitation in your diary, and be sure to tell your friends and fellow parishioners about this important forthcoming event.

We left Kettering around 9.45 a.m. and were driven by our 'Honorary U.C.M. member, Ron Steele. Also we had the privilege of our Canon John joining us. This house has a special resonance with Northamptonshire. It was owned by the Ferrers family for five hundred years. There is so much to this place, especially its association with our Catholic faith dur-

ing the 1600's when priests and the faithful were persecuted. The family Vaux owned Harrowden Hall, nr. Kettering. It became a source of refuge for priests and laity looking for sanctuary away from London. The two sisters, Anne and Elizabeth Vaux, decided to rent Baddesley when things got 'too hot' and the persecutors became alarmingly close at Harrowden.

There are three priests holes at Baddesley of which only two could we see. cleverly incorporated within the structure of the house and are meticulously preserved. As an added interest, we have the church of Saint Nicholas Owen dedicated to this humble carpenter within our St. Edwards parish. His inspiration to make hideways inside some of the most prominent catholic houses of the day, notwithstanding the terrible price exacted from anyone harbouring a priest in those days of terror, it is the legacy these brave families have left us. St. Nicholas Owen endured a martyrs' death. After the tour around the house we were able to go our separate ways; some visited the book shop, some ready for a cup of tea and later, we had lunch in the restaurant where large and varied menus were on display. Thereafter being suitably replenished time to look around the beautiful gardens and moat. Plants were also on sale and a well equipped shop.

We also visited the church of St. Michael which lay some hundred yards away and discovered the tomb of Nicholas Brome. His family were the first owners of Baddesley. However, he was the murderer of a priest. For his sins he wished to be buried standing up. His plaque can be seen just inside the door of the church, so everyone who enters treads on his head !

The weather was very dismal with some intermittent light showers but it certainly did not spoil our lovely day at Baddesley Clinton.





BOOKQQ BEVIEW Fatima: The First Hundred Years

By Barry R. Pearlman

In the centenary year of the apparitions of Our Lady to three Portuguese shepherd children in 1917, author Barry R Pearlman has produced, as the subtitle puts it, "The Complete Story from Visionaries to Saints." It is well worth reading by those who are not yet acquainted with these events of such significance for the Church, which has long proclaimed them as authentic, and who require a book that is concise, readable and trustworthy. Pearlman sees his task as explaining the profound and momentous message conveyed by Our Lady to Lucia, Jacinta and Francisco, at the same time as relating the particular histories of the seers themselves.

He puts the apparitions within the context of the 1830 apparition by Our Lady in the Rue de Bac, Paris, to St Catherine Laboure and the subsequent promotion of the Miraculous Medal; her 1846 apparition at La Salette; and her apparitions at Lourdes in 1858 to St Bernadette. As he comments, "Throughout the history of the Church Mary has been solicitous in appearing at moments of historical urgency."

The year 1917 was one such occasion: Europe was embroiled in the First World War and Russia was on the brink of a revolution which would force atheistic Communism on millions of people in Eastern Europe as well as Russia. These world-shaking events were, of course, not known to the three children of Fatima, deeply immersed in a rural peasant culture that was at the same time profoundly Catholic; "a world that had not learned to separate religion from everyday life" and in which "Jesus, Mary and the saints, Masses, festivals and devotions" were second nature.

Pearlman relates how the apparitions, first of the Angel of Portugal in 1916 and then of Our Lady a year later, transformed the lives of the little seers; already humble and devout they gave themselves up to an astonishingly edifying practice of prayer and selfsacrifice in response to Our Lady's requests. Her messages were in some ways traditional – the pleas for prayer and penance and to "pray the Rosary every day in order to obtain peace for the world and the end of the war" – and in others unusual: her request for "the consecration of Russia to my Immaculate Heart" and her warning that "If my requests are heeded, Russia will be converted and there will be peace; if not, she will spread her errors throughout the world."

Pearlman relates the whole history of how and when the consecration of Russia finally took place, in 1984 during the pontificate of Saint John Paul II, and the extraordinary collapse of the Soviet



On 12-13 May 2010 Pope Benedict visited Fatima. He gave a Golden Rose to Our Lady of Fatima 'as a homage of gratitude from the Pope for the mrvels that the Almighty has worked through you in the hearts of so many who come as pilgrims to this your maternal home'.

The Pope also recalled 'the invisible hand' that saved John Paul 11. He said in a prayer to the Blessed Virgin Mary that 'it is a profound consolation to know that you are crowned not only with the silver and gold of our joys and hopes, but also with the 'bullet' of our anxieties and sufferings".'



empire which followed. In swift succession Leonid Brezhnev, Soviet leader for 18 years, died of a heart attack; his successor, Andropov, lasted a mere 15 months; and Andropov's successor, Chernenko, only survived one year. On 11 March 1985 Mikhail Gorbachev became General Secretary of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union and "the unthinkable began to happen": by 1989 1000 Orthodox dioceses were established, two new seminaries were opened and several monasteries were restored.

The author also makes it clear that the Third Secret of Fatima was fully disclosed in 2000, thus dispelling the views of conspiracy theorists who believe that parts of it have been deliberately withheld.

Obituary

Mr Michael Murray

Michael Murray died on July 22nd. His daughter Siobhan writes:

Michael was a committed and active member of the St Edward's parish for over 30 years since moving to Milton Keynes with his family in 1984.

Son of Eileen Margaret and Patrick Joseph, of Irish descent he was born and bred in the northern town of Warrington alongside a younger brother, Brendan, and sister, Maureen. A good education was high on the agenda and one he was committed to, a commitment rewarded by achieving a place at the De La Salle Grammar School in Salford, and then on to study at the University of Manchester where he graduated with a degree in law in 1966 and then to Wigan where he completed his Articles in private practice. It was a short stint in private practice because instead he committed his skills to public service.

Starting out with Crewe Borough Council Michael went on to join Chester City Council as Assistant Town Clerk. 2 years later and at the age of just 29, he progressed to the role of Chief Administrator. And as noted in a 1972 edition of the Chester Chronicle...Mr Murray is the youngest local government officer in the country to hold such a senior post. In 1984 he was to become the youngest ever Chief Executive of a major council in the country with his move to Milton Keynes, and by the end of his tenure one of the longest serving at almost 13 years with too many achievements to note.

On his retirement Michael went on to a part time CEO position with the British Osteopathic Association, undertaken with the full time commitment and enthusiasm as you would expect, for almost another decade.

Colleagues from over the years have shared many memories typifying the man he was, with words such as supportive, wise, providing good counsel, personable with a sharp and funny wit and always noting the way he dealt with people – with respect and patience.

Friends have described him as being like a brother to them and recall his intellect, fairness, high principles, generosity, his zest for life and eagerness to experience and learn new things, his ability to mix and make people feel special, a memorable host and guest of many parties, one of the nicest people you could wish to meet.

Despite his commitment to his career, this was rarely at the expense of hobbies, inter-



ests, family or voluntary interests. These were vast and varied over the years ranging fromamateur dramatics and the Christmas choir, to camping, rambling, climbing and cycling holidays all over the world. He was also a keen runner, keep fit enthusiast, cyclist, golfer, squash and badminton player, student, reader, historian, chess player, wine connoisseur, amateur chef and a committed supported of Private Eye, the Guardian and the RSPB. A diligent Deputy Lieutenant of Buckinghamshire for 19 years, he also dedicated time to magistrate selection and appointment, trustee and board positions across a broad spectrum of local causes, as well as actively supporting his local churches and parishes throughout his life.


