Pastoral Letter from all the bisops on abortion: summary

In 2015 alone, in England and Wales, 185,824 abortions took place. there is widespread unease among many people who recognise that a woman's decision to have an abortion carries with it tragic consequences. At the same time, there are strong voices that advocate a woman's choice.

2. What does it mean to choose?

The life of both mother and child are precious, valued and to be protected. Those who hold that the freedom to choose in the question of abortion must focus on the good of one of these lives alone.

A subjective desire is often claimed to be a rightful choice.. Following slogans is never a firm basis for good decisions. Rather, we hold that such decisions require a grounding in good formation and sound perspectives.

In making choices, we should always seek to do that which upholds human dignity in the service of human life. In the case of abortion, decisions

and choices need to acknowledge the duty to cherish human life and to foster its flourishing beyond the circumstances of any one person, however challenging these may be.

3. Recognising the difficulty of decisions

Deciding to have an abortion is a grave decision. The process of decision making occurs in diverse circumstances and is influenced by different considerationsIn such situations, the capacity to exercise choice can be compromised with a consequent limitation on a person's moral culpability. Pope Francis has written of those who have had an abortion:

"I am well aware of the pressure that has led them to this decision. I know that it is an existential and moral ordeal. I have met so many women who bear in their heart the scar of this agonising and painful decision. What has happened is profoundly unjust; yet only understanding the truth of it can enable one not to lose hope." (Letter to Archbishop Fisichella for the Year of Mercy, 1 September 2015)

Both Popes, however, recognise the burden of guilt that often accompanies the decision to destroy a human life in the womb. Both speak insistently of the unfailing mercy of God for all who turn to Him in repentance and with a desire for forgiveness.

4. The Intrinsic Value and Worth of Every Human Life

The challenge that faces our society today is to recover an understanding of

the immeasurable good of each unborn child and to value his or her life with even greater respect.

A particular contradiction occurs in relation to the legislation permitting the abortion of an unborn child diagnosed with a disability. after they are born. The past fifty years have witnessed a deepening of society's respect and understanding for people with disability, and legislation has helped disabled people achieve fulfilling lives. We hope that greater reflection and consistency in the approach to unborn children with disabilities will lead to a change in understanding, with greater protection provided through new legislation.

In comparison with fifty years ago, our society and Church have a much greater acceptance of single mothers, and often provide assistance for those who need it. Much more, however, needs to be done.

We recognize that there has also been an erosion of respect for those with conscientious objections against abortion. This has affected members of the medical and healthcare professions who face increasing difficulty in being able to combine their dedicated professional work with their personal conviction. So much talent is being lost to important professional areas. Personal conscience is inviolable and no-one should be forced to act against their properly formed conscience in these matters.

5. Learning to respect life

There is an urgent need to teach about the inviolability of human life, from conception to its natural end, and to help everyone appreciate the value of every human life, without exception.

We thank those generous young people who strive to promote pro-life values.

They are a real encouragement and inspiration, in the Church and in society. It is vitally important for young people to gain a deep understanding of the meaning of human sexuality and the place of the sexual relationship as an expression of love within marriage.

6. Giving thanks and looking ahead

We have the highest regard for every woman who, in difficult and adverse conditions, has made the courageous decision to continue her pregnancy and give birth to her child. We thank the charities, and those who donate to them, for their solidarity and support.

It is our desire and aim8 ptniversary needs to bring about a new debate to change attitudes towards human life in the womb, to promote what it means to make good and authentic choices, and to protect and care for mothers and their children.

As Catholics, we urge that, throughout our countries, prayer and fasting be used for the protection of human life, especially for life within the womb, for all expectant mothers, for fathers and families.

Let the final word come from Pope Francis, preaching in 2005 on the Feast of St Raymund, when he was Archbishop of Buenos Aires:

"All of us must care for life, cherish life, with tenderness, warmth...to give life is to open our heart, and to care for life is to give oneself in tenderness and warmth for others, to have concern in my heart for others. Caring for life from the beginning to the end. What a simple thing, what a beautiful thing...So, go forth and don't be discouraged. Care for life. Its worth it'.

Honouring the parish patron

"Welcome, Pilgrims!" was how we were greeted when a very comfortable, modern-day coach dropped off 24 pilgrims from St Edward the Confessor in Milton Keynes to the Feast Day activities in Westminster Abbey on Saturday, 14th October.it was a reverent greeting given to people who have celebrated the Feast Day of St Edward the Confessor for nearly 800 years.

Our church in Milton Keynes, named after St Edward the Confessor, decided to take advantage of Westminster Abbey's annual celebration for its founder (then King Edward), celebrated as close to 13th October as possible, to mark his Feast Day. Every year, the Abbey invites all churches across the kingdom with the name of St Edward the Confessor to come to an exclusive day of prayer and reflection at the Abbey. All other visitors are not allowed to enter the Abbey as the day is reserved for worship and not general touring.

The day is full of activities. Visiting pilgrims are welcomed with a rite of foot or hand washing on arrival at the Abbey. Throughout the day, pilgrims are able to pray at the Shrine, priests are on duty for individual spiritual counselling and the Sacrament of Reconciliation and prayer tours around the Abbey are available. There are even opportunities to renew baptismal promises and to participate in healing liturgies with the Laying on of Hands and Anointing. Healing is one of the main devotions for St Edward. For the children, a good number of activities are offered.

The custom to wash the hands and feet of pilgrims has been an age-old tradition of welcome when the faithful have come to worship after travelling for days on the dusty roads – many of whom would have walked when transportation would have been reserved for the wealthy or privileged classes.

St Edward is one of the saints that is venerated by the Roman Catholic Church, Anglican Church and Eastern Orthodox Church – so quite a few communities are invited to the Abbey, which itself is one of the primary churches for the Church of England. The shrine in the Abbey is the actual tomb of King Edward and has a promi-



nent place just behind the altar of the Abbey in its own alcove.

All the services are Church of England. These services would rival many a service in the Roman Catholic tradition with their pageantry, music and number of celebrants. The experience was inspiring and beautiful and reminded us that in the very beauty and majesty of the service is the peace and love we feel towards our One Father, and it was an amazing feeling to join in with other faiths to worship together in a way that transcended our difference

Saint Edward was one of the national

saints of England until King Edward III adopted Saint George as patron saint in about 1350. Edward is regarded by some as an unlikely saint, and his canonisation as political. Although some argue that his cult started so early, it must have had something credible to it. He was regarded as a saint long before he was officially canonized as Saint and Confessor by Pope Alexander III in 1161.

When Edward died in 1066 he was succeeded by Harold Godwinson, who was later defeated by the Normans under William the Conqueror at the Battle of Hastings, 1066.







Quality in Corby school

In May Our Lady of Walsingham Catholic Primary School was selected to show case our efforts in Health to several Northamptonshire MP's and Health and Sport Professionals. We were chosen as our school has worked closely throughout the year with Northamptonshire Healthy Child Initiative. We are based in a socially deprived area where Health is not particularly viewed as important. Previous attempts were not met with open arms. Not ones to give up we carried on trying to make changes to make our children and families part of a healthier school community.

This year Our Lady's School achieved the Gold School Games Quality Mark. We gained this quality mark through meeting the School Games Criteria. We entered above the expected number of level 2 competitions. We believe that the higher level quality of PE lessons being delivered in school has helped to raise the amount of competitions that we are finishing higher up in. As a school we had three teams qualify for the School Games Final at Moulton College – the only school in Corby to have three teams. Our children enjoy their PE lessons therefore are very keen to attend the clubs and competitions.

day over lunch organised and run by our own school leaders while the rest of the children of Our Lady's enjoyed a family picnic.

Our Lady's school was experiencing some challenging behaviour. We felt that these children would benefit from the values and discipline taught in kickboxing. We brought in a local kickboxing instructor who allowed these children to participate twice per week. Together they worked on many aspects such as respect and social skills. These children were not only being active they came away with the confidence and skills that they needed to manage their own feeling and behaviour better throughout the school day. This club had a huge impact on the children's behaviour and learning in the classroom. They were now experiencing a 'good' lunch time resulting in a positive start to the afternoon therefore improving their learning capacity. 6 of these children of now fully fledged members of the kick boxing club outside of school.

He graduated with a medical degree in 1967 and then worked in mission hospitals in Guyana, Nigeria, and Ghana. He was ordained as a Roman Catholic priest in 1974 and appointed to the Deliverance Ministry in 1986. In 1993 he co-founded the International Association of Exorcists. He has written many books and articles, and he lectures on the subject internationally. This work was carried out in conjunction with his role as a parish priest within the Westminster Diocese

He has been a friend and supporter to the Guardians since our conception and has been Co-Celebrant at the Feast Day Masses and many other celebrations. This year he



has agreed to be our Principal Celebrant at the Feast Day Mass on 12 December. His continuing works and ministry on behalf of the Pro-Life movement are well known, publicly defending the sanctity of human life through his preaching and active participation in Pro-Life vigils.

Father Jeremy was a founding member of the outreach counselling service provided until recently by Luton Good Council to women seeking or recovering from abortion by providing emotional support and aid in finding life-giving alternatives.

His extensive knowledge of Catholic interpretation and the workings of our Church will allow the Guardians to discern and evaluate decisions, moving forward with wisdom and certainty. We are very much looking forward to his ministry among us.

It happened to be the feast of St. Edward The Confessor and the readings reflected his feast; the call of David to be king, and Christ's proclamation of his mission in the synagogue in Capernaum. Bishop Peter picked up the theme: 'today we are thinking about how God chooses each of us. God looks at the heart and sees that we can be his friends. Pray that each of us will be faithful friends of Jesus.

At the end of Mass each school was invited to choose a prayer baton. It couldn't be their own. It had to be for a different school, for which in their own community they would pray regularly. And then, so to lunch, after much enthusiastic waving of school banners.

Obituary

Canon Michael Griffiths

Canon Michael Griffiths died at Swansea on November 2. He was 69. Michael was ordained on June 2, 1979 and served as curate at St. Patrick's, Corby, until 1982. He became chaplain to Our Lady & Pope John school until 1984. He then transferred to St. Joseph's, Bedford, and became parish priest of St. Clare's, Aylesbury from 1989 to 1992. This was followed by time as parish priest in

Towcester, Great Missenden, Bourne End and Wellingborough. He went to Our Lady's, Luton in 2003 and, after a brief spell as chaplain in the South Atlantic he moved to Biggleswade in 2008 and Our Lady's, Corby, until his retirement in 2014/ He was appointed an Honorary Canon in 2007.

Earlier this year we had Julian from Myanmar share his experience of working in the country and how difficult it was for the Rohingya people. Now over 500,000 people are estimated to have fled into Bangladesh to escape violence in neighbouring Myanmar.

Rajida had to walk to the border while heavily pregnant. She gave birth to her daughter in Bangladesh, under plastic sheeting in the middle of a rice paddy. She says, "When I saw that she was healthy, I was so happy. I gave thanks to God."
