t Thomas Aquinas Primary school in Bletchley is 50 years old and a year of celebrations has begun. The celebration began with a Mass of Thanksgiving on October 5 attended by parishioners and past pupils.. It was followed with a childrens' Mass on November 20th. An open day is planned for January 29th. Bulbs have been planted and an orchard of fruit trees will follow the new path around the football field .So flowers will bloom in the spring and there will be fruit to harvest in the autumn.

There are many stories from 50 years ago when the school opened. Apparently the school wasn't quite ready and the children had lessons seated on the floor until the tables and chairs arrived. The school was full, with 49 pupils in each class. This conytasts with the much smaller number of 30 pupils in each class today.

Mrs Fionnuala Fleming was one of our first teachers in 1967 teaching the equivalent of Year 3 today. parent and a great supporter of school events and activities. We asked her to reflect on the school opening



The prestigious Catholic Theological Association of Great Britain is holding a conference in Luton on 21st April. It will be looking at the topic of Liturgy & Beauty. The event will take place at the Holy Ghost Centre, Westbourne Road, LU4 8JD from 10.30 a.m. to 2.30 p.m. All those interested in liturgy and theology are invited.

The Chair of the Conference is Fr. Tom O'Loughlin, a professor at Nottingham University, who is currently Chair of the Catholic Theological Association. He will be talking about how best our worship can adapt to complex pastoral situations. Also speaking will be Mgr. Kevin McGinnell, on the translating of the Missal, following the recent Vatican document; Fr. Kevin Alban, O. Carm, will look at the various rites in the Catholic Church, especially the Carmelite Rite, on how they can express beauty; and Fr. James Cassidy, C.R.I.C, will be examining liturgy and law.

We had no furniture so we all sat on the floor. Yes, that really happened.

There was intense pressure for places as locals who had contributed funds for years, and had competition from the Inner London Education Authority, who gave a generous grant for each child re-settled in the school. This grant made the new school possible and many places were allocated to newcomers to Bletchley.

The smell of new paint in the early September heat made everyone a bit nauseous. The paint had been laced with an insecticide to kill flies. It reduced thousands of wasps to a soporific state. They lay in hiding under desks or climbing frames, benches and bags and caused a deluge of wasp sting

Morning and evenings were marked with the arrival and departure of buses, organising children from the different routes. It is surprising how soon we settled down, became a family, establishing traditions for uniforms, behaviour, football and netball.

The most striking custom of the school over the years has been the huge number of past pupils who return time and time again to re-live old memories and renew friendships. They arenalways received with interest and pride in their continual development. I hope that St. Thomas Aquinas school gave them a sense of worth and belonging with high ideals to strive for that served them well in the many roles they are called to lead. At St Thomas Aquinas school we often recall them with pride, sometimes with merriment, but always with grea fondness.

Some rivalry between the local schools led to our nickname 'The Holy Terrors'. Our football and netball teams certainly lived up to it".

Happy birthday Princess Diana



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"I was amazed given the weather conditions that people had come from as far as Crewe, Liverpool, Lincoln, Sussex and Kent but such is the power of their answer to Our Lady's calling" commented Coordinator Andrew Hinde the morning after the 2017 Feast Day Mass for Our Lady of Guadalupe at the Shrine in Bedford on 12 December.

The Guardians had been worried earlier in the day that because of the recent snow and hazardous driving conditions, not many people would make the journey to the Shrine in Bedford , but they were proved wrong.

The Shrine was packed with guests, including Supreme Grand Knight Bertie Grogan, his Deputy Joe Rodriguez, a number of Provincial Grand Knights and supporters from all over the country. Mr Vinod Tailor, the current High Sheriff of Bedford, was also an honoured guest, as were a number of visiting priests.

ning. All of the cars were on display as well as their development ideas and designs. The team couldn't wait to show off their hard work, demonstrate how the cars work and share their plans.. The STM Design & Technology department along with students aged 12-18 have designed & constructed two electric powered racing cars which, thanks

to the generous support of Mr Wiley and Mr Layram, can now be entered into the Greenpower International races at Rockingham Raceway.

Cars from all over the UK enter this competition and in previous years, our successes to date have included third place in annual

races as well as winning awards for the 'Best Looking Car' and the 'Most Interesting Technology'.

Powered by a 24 volt DC motor and two 12 volt batteries, the cars can reach speeds in excess of 30 mph, enabling the drivers to complete two, 90 minute races, with pit stops for driver change over.



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Two hundred years for the Religious of Jesus and Mary

Since 1860 The Sisters of the Congregation of Jesus and Mary have been working in the diocese of Northampton - in Ipswich and Felixstowe as well as in Thornton College, founded in October 1917. This year the school celebrates its centenary.

At the same time, events to mark the bicentenary of the Congregation (1818-2018) have begun, with representatives from its Provinces travelling to Agra in India to join the opening ceremonies and gatherings, sharing their local knowledge of the work and expansion of the JM communities worldwide.

Why Agra? Well, it was in 1842, five years after the death of St Claudine Thévenet their foundress, that a small band of intrepid Frenchwomen from Lyon set out on a long and arduous journey by sea and overland, responding to the invitation of the Bishop of Agra to come and work in his diocese.

As you know, this was not the epoque of easy travel and worldwide knowledge of distant places. The sisters, therefore set out, rather like Abraham - in faith and obedience, not knowing where they were going and, by today's standards, little prepared for what lay ahead.

So it was fitting, in the first week of October, for today's sisters to repeat that journey to Agra, marking the beginning of the expansion of the Congregation and opening a year in which all remember the goodness of God to them and those who went before them throughout the past two hundred years.

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Charlotte's bursary for Bolivia

On the 4th Sunday of Advent at the end of morning mass at the Catholic Church of the Good Shepherd in Haddenham, Michael Pitt-Payne of the Chiltern Catenian Circle presented a cheque for £650 from the Catenian Bursary Fund to Charlotte Evans. Charlotte has obtained a

Volunteering Placement for three months starting on 5th January 2018 in Bolivia where she will be leading a team of four volunteers working for Tearfund on educational based projects. Part of her duties will involve transporting young children who are living with their parents in prison to school and back to prison each day.

The Catenian Bursary Fund was established some years ago to encourage young Catholics to undertake voluntary work overseas. Each year the fund gives cash grants (nothing to repay) of over £100,000 to young Catholics between the ages of 16 and 24, who work as helpers on Diocesan and HCPT pilgrimages to Lourdes or volunteer to work on projects around the world. Michael has supported the Bursary Fund for many years and has been attending the Church of the Good Shepherd for the past 23 years. As this is the first time that a

member of the parish has been awarded a bursary grant it was a very special and happy occasion with Charlotte's parents and twin sisters on hand to give her their moral support.

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Help for the homeless

During Advent Term the RE Department at St Paul's organised a fundraising activity to help homeless people in Milton Keynes. The 'reverse Advent calendar' initiative was enthusiastically supported by pupils, staff and parents.

Each form room displayed a reverse Advent calendar showing a list of items that pupils could sign up for and bring into school. These included shoe boxes (to contain gifts), essential toiletries, clothing, treats and Christmas cards to write a message to the person who would receive the box. Pupils could elect to bring a single item or even do a whole shoe box themselves. The

idea was to encourage pupils to think about giving what they can during Advent rather than focusing on the things that we receive.

Laura Maw, Head of RE, said: "With the number of homeless people in Milton Keynes increasing by 500% since 2012 we know that the help we can provide is needed now more than ever. Thinking about this during the Advent season has helped pupils to remember the meaning of Advent and allow us all to live out our school motto of loving and serving others."

In total 110 shoe boxes were created and special thanks go to our Sixth Former stu-

dents who wrapped and filled them. The shoe boxes have been donated to Help Our Homeless MK, a group of volunteers who have been supporting the homeless community since 2014. Alongside a Soup Run a few nights a week they give out clothing, toiletries, bedding, and tents to the homeless. They also have a shop unit on the Lakes estate where they store stock and are able to sell some donated items.

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Come to me

Having time to spend in quiet reflection at the different prayer stations made for some very helpful opportunities to draw close to Christ and to think about his calling to each one of us. Appreciation for this was expressed when we gathered at the end of the day


Confession: The Healing of the Soul By Peter Tyler Bloomsbury £14.99

Peter Tyler is both professor of Pastoral Theology and Spirituality at St Mary's University and a psychotherapist. So it is safe to assume that his reflections on the sacrament of Confession will come from an unconventional perspective. He does not disappoint. Writing primarily as a Catholic psychotherapist who has counselled many people, he suggests that often they "lock up the forces of the unconscious and are terrified of opening up their contents..."

But what does the unconscious have to do with Confession? A great deal, says the author, for it is our unconscious scars and wounds, of which we are ignorant, that lead us to sin and thus to the need to confess. It is also the reason why, in the modern age, self-revelation and disclosure are very common; a "secular panacea", removed from its religious sacramental necessity.

Reflecting not only on the writings of the early Desert Fathers, but also on the mythological significance of the Arthurian legends — especially the story of Tristan - as well as the mystical experiences of men as various as the philosopher Wittgenstein, the Breton priest Henri Le Saux (later known in India as Swami Abishiktananda) and the Spanish Carmelite saint, John of the Cross, Tyler argues persuasively that they are all interlinked

The Fourth Lateran Council of 1225 codified the sacrament of Confession within the canons of the Church. It meant that the early Desert Fathers' practice of counselling and spiritual direction was joined with St Augustine's insight that confession was a transcendental encounter with God, to become the form as we know it today. In the



same century Gottfried von Strassburg began writing about the myth of Tristan, and the Carmelite Order was founded on Mount Carmel in Israel. For Tyler, these three key events throw light on each other and provide the key to allowing "the tortured 21st century soul to begin the process of healing it so badly needs."

He writes that the two essential elements of Confession, the psychological healing of the soul and the "window on the transcendent" became "yoked to the canonical requirements of the Sacrament". Counselling or spiritual direction can often be helpful when used alongside the Sacrament, in order to guide people in self-understanding and why they often act contrary to what they know to be their best spiritual interests. It is not for nothing that Tyler's book opens with the sentence, "We are strangers to ourselves".

Tyler quotes Dom Bede Griffiths, a friend of Henri Le Saux, who also went to India to explore the Hindu way of self-transcendence and who wrote, "It is Christ alone who can set us free from the unconscious" and that in our Christian life "the Holy Spirit should penetrate to the...ultimate root of being, and transform us."

The chapter on the philosopher Wittgenstein, whose tortured search for an authentic way of life drove him to live in isolated places and led him to multiple public "confessions" to his family and friends, is especially noteworthy. Tyler points out that confessions such as Wittgenstein's, "remind us that at the heart of true knowledge lies the confessional act." Similarly, St John of the Cross recognised that "all true examination of the divine must start with the groan of the confessional." To repent we need to know ourselves; and then the sacramental grace can heal and transform us. Otherwise, as the author points out, confession can easily descend to simply wanting a "clean slate", with the consequent repetition of the same sins, rather than the true, healing touch of Christ.

Empire gong for Leighton Buzzard colonial

In last year's Queen's Birthday Honours Bill Duperouzel, who has been a parishioner of the Sacred Heart Parish Church in Leighton Buzzard for more than 40 years and a Catenian since 2008, was awarded the British Empire Medal for services to Charity and the Community in Bedfordshire.

Bill was born in Western Australia where he qualified as a CPA accountant before moving to England in the early 1970's and spending his working life in the IT computer services environment. In 1991 he was inspired by his wife Janet who had founded Headway South Bedfordshire, a brain injury charity based in Luton, to become involved in charitable activities; working together they established an annual charity bike ride for Headway. This event ran for the next 16 years and raised more than £60,000.

Bill retired in 2006 and became the Administrator of the charity Workaid which is based in South Bucks. Workaid collects old tools and equipment which are refurbished by volunteers at its premises in Chesham.

Workaid tackles poverty by supplying disadvantaged people in Africa with the tools and equipment they need to acquire practical skills and become self-supporting. During Bill's period as Administrator Workaid acquired the Old Boot Factory in Chesham and he supervised its conversion from an abandoned building to a well organised storage and refurbishment workshop. Bill retired as CEO of Workaid in 2011 and is now a trustee of the charity and carries out public speaking engagements to promote its work. He is also a trustee and treasurer of a

local charity, the Centre for Health, Healing and Counselling in Leighton Buzzard.

The medal ceremony took place at the Putteridge Bury Conference Centre in Bedfordshire on 18th September 2017 and was conducted by Helen Nellis HM The Lord Lieutenant of Bedfordshire. This was a very happy occasion and Bill was supported by his wife Janet, their daughters, Adele and Suzanne and his son-in-law, Ernesto.


St Paul's Advent Service

Today, millions of refugees are fleeing war, natural disaster, poverty or persecution in search for a better life. The evening told the story of Aza, a Syrian Refugee, and her journey to find a safe and better future for herself and her 9 month old son. This was related to readings from the bible referring to Moses leading the people of Israel through the desert. At one point those who attended were invited to come to the Altar and light a candle whilst watching a video of refugee's fleeing war. We were asked to think of a challenging journey we had made or may be making this Christmas and pray Maranatha as we came forward.

Students and Staff took part in the various readings and the music was provided by the 6th Form Choir and members of the school Orchestra and music department.

After the service our Sixth Form Ambassadors provided refreshments together with mince pies donated by staff! Each year the school raises money during Advent to buy Advent World Gifts. 
