# Boots from Bedford schools

Students and families from St John Rigby Primary and St Joseph's & St Gregory's Primary of the Bedford Catholic Schools, have donated football boots, trainers and kit to children in the poor communities of Soyapango, San Salvador with the charity Avoca.

Avoca supports communities in Central American countries by raising funds for social and environmental projects which aim to help people improve their quality of life.

The football coaching side of the charity, Avoca Esperanza (Hope), now in its 10th year, was set up by Graham Millie, who used to teach at BCS, and Peter Bull

This year, Avoca Esperanza delivered coaching to over 500 children in one central venue during Easter week. The children came from different communities and would normally not be able to socialise with one another due to gang boundaries. They also delivered a coach education course for over 40 young adults, the aim being to create positive young role models in communities so troubled by gang and drug cultures.

'At the end of the week, all the children and community leaders came together for a large prize giving celebration where the children received certificates and the donations of boots/football shirts from BCS. The community leaders ensured every child that needed boots or trainers received a pair, whilst others were gifted a football shirt.

We are proud to be supported by the Bedford Catholic Schools and it is a real pleasure to be able to take across donated boots, trainers and football shirts. ## Mind your Data

If this Vine has come into your hands around the last weekend of May, the world of Data Protection Law has just changed in a fairly massive way.

On the 25th of May the Europewide General Data Protection Regulation came into force, enacted into UK law by a new Data Protection Act. We signed up to it in 2016, before the Referendum, so it isn't negated by Brexit and we all have to comply.

This affects the Church as much as it affects businesses, schools, Government departments and other charities.

It is all about raising the importance of our privacy and controlling how our personal information is

shared around. And it will require our Parish and Diocesan offices to be still more careful about computer security, mailing lists and censuses.

As with Safeguarding, it may mean more inconveniences in our lives and our offices. But as with Safeguarding, we will get used to it; and certainly we have a duty to our parishioners to act as Good Stewards of personal and sensitive information. Indeed, that duty has been very familiar territory to our Confession-hearing priests for hundreds of years!

The Diocese has appointed Brin Dunsire, who may be known to you as the website manager, Archivist and former Planned Giving adviser, as its Data Protection Manager. By the time you read this, he will have made a start on running a series of awareness-raising presentations around the Diocese, to be followed up by visits to all the parish offices. So guidance and support is available.

He and Tim Redding, the Financial Secretary, have been working on a national group helping to prepare the Catholic Church in England & Wales for the new regime.

## Bologna



The Swiss Guard has broken with centuries of tradition by adopting new helmets that are made out of plastic and created by a 3D printer.

The new helmets are lighter to wear and, at £740 each, around half the cost of the old metal ones.

Each pvc helmet is stamped with gthe coat of arms of Pope Julius 11, who founded the private afrmy of mer cenary troops in 1506 and was known as 'the warrior pope'. They are also resistant to UV rays. Guards spent much of their time standing outside the Vatican, halberds in hand. The new headgear was presented by Christoph Graf, trhe commander ocf thde corps ahead of an annual swearing

in ceremony in April.

Thirty two new recruits, all of them Swiss Catholic men under the age of thirty joined the force for a minimum of two years.

They wear distinctive striped blue, red and gold uniforms. For the most formal ceremonies they add a large whitde ruff, plate armour and an ostrich plumed helmet.

Although they undertake their ceremonial duties with swords, halberds and pikes they carry na range of modern firearms, including when deployed in plain clothes

The story of Edgardo Mortara, a Jewish boy seized from his family and raised as a Catholic - after Pope Blessed Pius IX learned he had been secretly baptized by a nursemaid - prompted an immediate outcry in 1858.

A century and a half later, the story has sparked a fresh burst of controversy, amid reports that a translation of Mortara's memoir, written after he grew up to become a Catholic priest and often expressed "gratitude" for the Pope's intervention, had been "doctored" to place Pius' decision in a more "sympathetic" light. Father Mortara's complex story is now the subject of an upcoming Steven Spielberg film, and a 2017 English-language translation of his "doctored" memoir has renewed debate over the Pope's actions.

The 6-year-old son of Jewish parents in Bologna, one of the largest cities of the Papal States, Edgardo was secretly baptized when he was an infant by his 16year-old nursemaid, after he fell ill and doctors feared he would die. When government authorities in Bologna learned what had happened, they followed Church law and decreed that he should be educated as a Catholic.

Edgardo was "sequestered" from his family and brought to Rome at Pope Pius IX's direction. Educated by the Order of the Canons



Regular, he later entered the order as a 16-year-old novice. Last month, David Kertzer, the Pulitzer-prize-winning Brown University was the first to raise questions about the Italian translation of Mortara's autobiography by Vittorio Messori, the Italian Catholic journalist "In reading the Italian text, I found many elements that were historically inaccurate, but I was not sure to what extent those inaccuracies were the work of Mortara himself ... or had been the result of changes in the Mortara text introduced by Messori,"

## Catenians support Nazareth House

A highlight of Northampton Circle's recent St. Georges Night Dinner and Dance was the presentation of a cheque to Northampton's Nazareth House. Northampton Circle chose Nazareth House as one of the four charities to support during 2017/18. A cheque for £500 was presented by President Terry Joyce to Sister Celine-Marie Donnelly, Sister Superior of Nazareth House who warmly thanked the Circle for its generous and continuing support. Northampton Circle's association and support for Nazareth House goes back for almost a century.

As Northampton Circle celebrates the centenary of its inauguration this year it is interesting to record that the following was reported in the December 1918 copy of Catena, the Catenian Association's monthly house publication "The Circle decided to undertake the arrangements for a Grand Concert to be held in aid of Nazareth House early in January 1919. Mr. Gervase Elwes kindly consented to provide the whole of the artistes. The members have raised a good sum of money amongst themselves and from friends towards this very deserving institution and have succeeded in relieving the re-

cent pressing needs which have been caused mainly by the withdrawal of contributions owing to the war".

The February 1919 Catena referred to "satisfactory accounts were given of various matters in connection with Nazareth House, Northampton. A Grand Concert, given by Mr. Gervase Elwes in aid of the building debt (the arrangements for which were almost wholly in the hands of a committee of the Circle), was a great success, over £420 being realised [equivalent to over £15k at today's value]. The general fund, started a few months ago to assist the Sisters tie over the winter months, has reached £340 [equivalent to over £12k at today's value] the greater portion of this amount being collected by members of the Circle". 
The conference got off to a flying start with eight members. They held their first meeting on April 5.







The parish laid on the warmest of welcomes. Parish worker Kieran McKeon had arranged an electronic display shown while people waited. It showed the finer points of the recently refurbished and extended church. Bishop Peter was, as usual, the principal celebrant and the local priests concelebrated. Readers, musicians and servers played their part to perfection.

Bishop Peter spoke of the vocation of marriage and the marriage covenant that strengthens the bond of peace, charity love and commitment to children. He went on to emphasise that from the marriage bond flows the gift of children, and it is from them that new priests are added to the diocese.

The Bishop then invited the couples to rededicate themselves to each other. We pledge ourselves anew', they said, ;to love and honour each other for better, for worse, for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in health, till death do us part. We pledge ourselves anew to love and support our children and to share with them all we value'. The whole congregation then continued 'we pledge ourselves anew to be loyal, considerate and forgiving to all those with whom we live, that in our home we may find Christ and in our lives others may see him'. The Bishop then prayed for the couples: 'bless them, strengthen their faith, confirm them in hope and let them grow in love'.

The Mass ended with the distribution of certificates to those celebrating significant anniversaries. Lots of applause went to those marking sixty or fifty years. But one couple were delighted to be celebrating their first anniversary. No matter what they were marking, generous tea and buns followed.



## St. Patrick aids Ecuador

A typical Irish-themed dinner dance at Our Lady's School in Chesham Bois was organised on St Patrick's Night – 17<sup>th</sup> March – to celebrate Ireland's Patron Saint and fundraise for the post-earthquake mission in Ecuador.

A total of £1,791.30 was raised during the night through a raffle and various donations which will enable a community in Manta (Ecuador) to buy a flat-pack wooden house for a family who was left homeless after a catastrophic earthquake. Bonds between Chesham and Ecuador are very strong thanks to St Columba's parish priest, Fr Alessandro, an enthusiastic Italian missionary priest who lived in Ecuador for 7 years and who

also leads the parish of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Great Missenden.

He said: "This was my first St Patrick's Night since I moved to the UK and I thoroughly enjoyed it. It was a very lively evening with over 100 guests of all ages and nationalities all living in this Pastoral Area. It was particularly good to see parents, grandparents and children involved in the preparation of the event and coming together to celebrate and help others who are less fortunate than ourselves".

.The joyful tunes (familiar to any Irish), were provided by a local folk band called *All Hands Around*, who kept people

glued to the dancefloor throughout the evening. Authentic, home-made Irish food and beer certainly helped create the merry atmosphere. A fabulous Irish dance display was part of the entertainment, performed by 6 very talented young children, some of which from Our Lady's school. Mark Holdsworth, headmaster of the school, added: "I was delighted to see this community supporting so generously such a worthy cause. This follows another Spanish-themed event in November 2017 hosted by our school that raised £1,200 for Ecuador. I am glad to be able to provide the space for this community to grow in friendship and service to others"



# Share the Journey #sharejourney

It is wonderful seeing so many parishes, schools, groups and individuals getting involved with CAFOD's Share the Journey campaign.

Why are they doing it? Inspired by Pope Francis' special concern for people on the move, they want to send a strong message and urge world leaders to protect the rights of refugees and migrants in the forthcoming global compacts on migration and refugees.

How are they doing it? Praying, signing a Petition to the PM and organising walks. By adding their voices and miles walked (we aim to walk around the world - 24,900 miles), they hope that world leader will also step up to protect the rights of refugees and migrants. Bishop Peter has also supported the campaign and signed the petition to the MP.

Some of the great campaigning that has gone on :

The central Beds. Pastoral area did the walk together. Under the very well organised 5 stage walk from each parish, Alban Macdonald from St peter's Biggleswade led groups each Saturday in Eastertide for about a 10mile walk. They had both very hot and very wet and cold walks which gave the walkers a very small experience of what some refugees face. It was also a wonderful opportunity to build community spirit! It was great that Andrew Selous MP joined part of one of the last stage too! All signed the petition to the PM as well.

Parishes have also stepped up and St Teresa – Princes Risborough was no exception. With the support of the amazing CAFOD group led by Marie Pennell, the parish held several walks. One was a sponsored walk (2.5miles) which raised well over £800 and the next walk will be held on 16 June. The parish walking group also decided to focus on Share the Journey for one of their walks.

Individuals are also keen on doing their part like 88 year old Andrew Milne from Dunstable. Andrew was sadly taken into hospital and as he was recuperating, decided he wasn't going to be left out partaking in the campaign. So, during his thrice-daily walk up and down the ward to recover his strength (20m), he prayed for refugees and migrants and his mile was added to the total miles walked. Andrew also got family to join him too! What an inspiration to all of us!

There are many events planned throughout the diocese in June and July. Refugee week is on the 18 – 24 June so if you can organise a walk then, all the better. The walk doesn't have to be long. It can be several rounds in the church. Resources are all on our website.
